County awards bids on steel, concrete work at new jail site

In a short special meeting of Runnels County Commissioners Court on Monday, December 29, bids were opened and awarded on labor for installation of reinforcing steel and construction of the slab on the new county jail facility.

CM Construction Company of Ballinger successfully bid \$61,728.37 for the labor, and commissioners voted to allow Archisystems to enter into contract with CM for an amount not more than the bid.

In the second bid opening of the day, Gay and Sons of Granbury bid \$283,500 for masonry work on the new jail. Commissioners voted to allow Archisystems to enter into contract for not more than the bid amount.

No other items were on the agenda, and commissioners adjourned until their next regular meeting on Tuesday, January 13.

Lanny Bahlman purchased the brick for the Rock Hotel Walkway that put the Z.I. Hale Museum over its goal of \$42,000 by December 31.

The Meadows Foundation of Dallas is matching the amount raised for the museum by the deadline up to the amount of the goal.

Lanny bought the brick after lunch on Wednesday, just in time to get all of the necessary funds deposited in the bank before the deadline.

As of Wednesday, December 31, five hundred and sixty-four (564) bricks had been purchased for the walkway. The monogrammed bricks will be placed along the sidewalk under the porch of the Rock Hotel. Podiatry services to begin at hospital

A Podiatry Clinic will begin at North Runnels Hospital on Wednesday, January 14, 1998.

Podiatry services involve all types of problems associated with a person's feet. This frequently involves bunions, ingrown toe nails, Planter's Warts, conditions brought about from diabetes, as well as many other problems with the foot.

Appointments can be made through your physician or by calling the hospital business office at 754-4553.

The clinic will be operated by Jimmie Lummus, DPM, and John Welchon, DPM. They practice together in San Angelo.

Dr. Welchon was born in Bartlesville, Oklahoma. He attended Bartlesville Wesleyan, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, and the University of Nebraska prior to receiving his Doctor of Podiatric Medicine at

the University of Osteopathic Medicine and Health Sciences in Des Moines, Iowa. He then completed a three-year residency program at the University of Texas Health Sciences Center in San Antonio. He was the Chief Resident in the last year of the program.

Dr. Welchon and his wife, Darcy Lynn, have three children, ages 6, 4, and 1 year.

Dr. Lummus is a native of San Angelo. After high school graduation, he attended Angelo State University where he received a Bachelor of Science degree. City council hears from cable manager, water superintendent

During the last meeting of 1997, the Winters city council approved the transfer of the local cable franchise from TCA Cable to TCA Cable Partners II.

Speaking to the council on December 29, Larson Lloyd, general manager of TCA, stated that TCA is in the process of buying

some cable systems from TCI. TCA Cable Partners II is a partnership set up to allow TCA to purchase TCI's Texas cable holdings over the next five years.

A clause in the franchise contract with the City of Winters requires any ownership changes to be approved by the council. This

Oil Bidness

As a new drilling technique continues to gain momentum in the industry, much of its emergence is owed to the hands in the field who are improving its application.

The new technique is coiled tubing drilling (CTD), and it's taking the industry by storm.

Actually, it's not that new. CTD has been used from time to time over the last several years, but only recently has it become more widespread.

And, that growth in availability and use is due to a large extent to the improvements made to the technique in the field. By suggesting changes in equipment, pointing out weaknesses in the technology, and tweaking its application, field hands have done their part to make CTD economically viable.

CTD is advantageous because it is a continuous string of pipe. This has advantages in drilling in that it can be put into the well (right up to TD) or it can be pulled out at a moment's notice. No stacking of drill pipe in the derrick. It is just rolled and unrolled onto a drum from which it is lowered into the well.

It is also more flexible and can be guided somewhat easier than standard rigid drill pipe. This is becoming all the more important as directional drilling becomes more common.

Of course, this flexibility can create some disadvantages. It may break or it may kink or it might buckle. It carries little weight (compared to drill pipe) and can only support a few drill collars, so putting weight on bit is not all that easy with CTD.

At first, CTD was accomplished with standard coiled tubing units (used for specialty work) that were not really designed for the rigors of drilling to 10,000 feet and being repeatedly pushed and pulled.

Field hands noted the problems and now special drilling rigs have been built to better handle coiled tubing at the drill site. The reels are larger and the well insertion point is well above the rig floor to accommodate other rig floor activity.

Smaller diameter is preferred by drillers because they know that the larger diameter coiled tubing is more susceptible to fatigue failure. Underbalanced drilling conditions (pressure less in hole than in drilled formation) also proved to be a better deal, as observed by derrick hands.

It just goes to show you that all the technology in the world is worthless unless you have good people using it at the field level.

And, the more they care about their work, the more likely they will be trying their best to make the technology work to its maximum capacity.

P.S. to roughnecks only: don't try to get a raise by showing your driller or tool pusher this article. I'll claim I never wrote it.



Nursing home reform is now a reality

New legislation now includes a "Residents' Bill of Rights."

Among the 21 specific rights are:

- safe, clean, and decent living conditions
- privacy, including during visits and phone calls
- personal management of residents' own finances
- receiving mail unopened and getting help with reading or writing letters
- freedom from physical restraints or tranquilizers that aren't part of a medical treatment
- hiring a doctor of one's own choice and being fully informed about medical treatment.


While living in Ballinger, Ms. Gore worked at the F&M Bank and later moved to Dallas where she was the billing coordinator in a medical doctor's office.

From The Well

On the Sunday night before Christmas, Ramona and I were watching "Touched By An Angel" on T.V. It was a wonderful story about hope coming back to a person who had lost faith. A very important part of the story was when Monica (the pretty, young

angel) told about how Mark Twain's hope had come to him the Christmas his daughter died.

The light of the hope came to him when a little girl came to him at Christmas with the words of a poem written by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. He had been really depressed by the cruel miseries caused by the Civil War. In heaviness of spirit he wrote:

I heard the bells on Christmas day their old familiar carols play, and wild and sweet the words repeat of peace on earth, good will to men.

I thought how, as the day had come, the belfries of all Christendom had rolled along th' unbroken song of peace on earth, good will to men.

And in despair I bowed my head. "There is no peace on earth," I said, "hate is strong and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to men."

Yet pealed the bells more loud and deep. "God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; the wrong shall fail, the right prevail, with peace on earth, good will to men."

Then ringing, singing on its way, the world revolved from night to day — a voice, a chime, a chant sublime of peace on earth, good will to men."

As the little girl started to recite the poem, Twain joined in. And these words brought life and hope to him.

That T.V. story stuck in my well. It wasn't the words of the poem so much as that to which the poem calls us. The sound of the bells. The church bells. And how important bells have been in my life. Especially...church bells.

When I was a boy growing up, most of my life was spent in a house next door to the church. The parsonage. So, the sound of church bells was very familiar to me. Every Sunday morning, the church bells rang. Whenever there was a funeral, the service started after the bells tolled. On Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve — the bells tolled. When World War II in Europe ended, all the churches in town pealed for an hour. So also the same when the war with Japan ended. Church bells — ringing.

When Ramona and I were serving a large congregation in Crookston, Minnesota, the church building had a bellfry, but no bells in it. We had an old bell. It had rung out its message in a former church building. But that building burned, and the bell came crashing down — and cracked. It could not be fixed. So, a member of our church gave us a wonderful carillon. It played tapes of bells from all over the world. Every day, 3 times a day, we had a mini-concert, 3 or 4 minutes of bells playing hymn tunes and carols. People could hear it all over that town of 10,000 people. Often we'd get a letter or a phone call telling us how much the bells meant, and how they brought hope to their hearts.

There is something about church bells. They are a wakeup call...unique. They call us back home. Back home to God. Back home...to hope.

There is a hymn written by a Danish poet by the name of Nicolai Grundtvig. The old cracked bell in Crookston had these words from that hymn inscribed on it. The first verse reads:

Built on a rock the church doth stand, even when steeples are falling; Crumbled have spires in every land, bells still are chiming and calling;

Calling the young and old to rest, calling the souls of men distressed, long for life everlasting.

No wonder on Christmas Eve this year, at 11:00 p.m., it felt so good to pull the rope and make the bell at St. John's sing its one note from the angels' chorus — "Peace on earth, good will to men."





SPJST scholarship drive extended


The SPJST 100 Pennies Drive Scholarship Fund-Raiser, September 1 through December 31, has been extended through March 31.

Despite the official deadline of December 31, donations in the past have remained consistent through March. This fund-raiser funding to determine the amount of scholarships to be given the following fall term. Therefore, the deadline has been extended through March. This fund-raiser deadline SHOULD NOT be confused with the scholarship application deadline, which remains December 31 for requesting scholarships, and February 1 to turn in the requested paperwork.

The number of scholarships given in the General Scholarship Fund is directly proportional to the amount of funding raised during the year. The SPJST underwrites the administrative cost of the scholarship program. One hundred percent of the contributions are given for scholarships in the General and Technical SPJST Scholarship program to SPJST members. The SPJST also underwrites the SPJST Leadership Grants for students who have been active in SPJST Youth Clubs.

The SPJST scholarship fund received a record \$74,000 in donations in 1996. This past fall, the SPJST Supreme Lodge voted to increase the amount of the one-time scholarship to \$750. SPJST Scholarship Fund-Raisers include SPJST 100 Pennies Scholarship Drive, the SPJST Memorial Fund, and other various sources.

The original concept of the Pennies Drive was based on the fraternal concept of many individuals combining resources for the benefit of the group. In 1897, each member of the SPJST Society was assessed a due. This money was collected and paid to widows and orphans after the death of the husband.



Runaways and troubled youths urged to call statewide hotline

A statewide campaign was launched December 29, 1997, to promote greater public awareness about the runaway and troubled youth problem, according to Jay Smith, director of the Texas Runaway Hotline.

"In Texas, more than 120,000 children ages 7 to 17 run away annually," Smith said. "Whether they are in large cities or small towns, runaway youths are vulnerable to a wide variety of crimes including assault and sexual exploitation. Many youths call the Hotline to find food, shelter, or simply to hear a caring voice." According to Smith, Hotline staff and volunteers received 35,663 calls last year from troubled youth, their families and youth related organizations.

"Many people believe we only receive calls from runaways who are on the streets in large metropolitan areas," Smith said. "We actually receive calls from runaways and troubled youths all over the state."

Smith said statewide television and radio ads, billboards, and 150,000 pieces of runaway prevention materials for schools, truck stops, bus stations, and youth service organizations, are aimed at bringing the runaway problem to wider public attention and to make young people and parents more aware of services that are available. The toll-free hotline number is 1-888-580-HELP (4457).

"Runaway children are not running to something," Smith said. "More often than not, they are running away from difficult family situations."

A bucket of paint

When Alton Jones of Houston, who grew up in Winters, read a story in the newspaper about the Newton gang, he recalled that they had once robbed a bank in Winters.

Jones wrote his friend, Joyce Wilkerson, for some details about the Winters robbery. His letter was passed on to me and I gave him the story as was written in my book, "Runnels Is My County." He then searched for my book, but it is out of print.

When I wrote him I related that I had four grandsons and seven great-grandchildren. It reminded him of what he had read in Leon Hale's column a few days before. He has been a writer for the *Houston Chronicle* for many years.

He said that the best line he had read this year was in a letter from one of his readers. This lady wrote that she had "five grandkids, ten great-grandkids, and two artificial knees."

"Well, I don't have any grandkids but I can relate to the artificial knees, as I've had one replaced and one to go. We kid a lot about them, but they haven't caused a lot of problems — and I still go hiking frequently — usually to the Big Bend. That is my favorite hiking country. For several years, I have gone there in November because of the perfect weather at that time of the year.

"But not this past November, as I've been in the process of getting

a house built for myself. This has been going on all year because of an endless number of problems.

"I've tried to convince friends that I am building a mansion, but my story was shot down a few days ago when the neighborhood news described it as a 'skinny structure on a sliver of land.' Guess from now on, I will have to describe it as a 'skinny mansion.'

"Actually it is a small place — only about a thousand square feet with a loft overlooking a small courtyard enclosed by a stone fence. I had to squeeze it on a 25 ft. lot so I suppose 'sliver of land' is an appropriate description. The design is Southwestern — West Texas and Santa Fe all combined. The porch is supported by cedar posts and the stairway is made of logs.

"I retired in 1990 after spending 30 years with FTD — a job I enjoyed very much, traveling all over the U.S. and Canada — but I always kept my home in Houston. Several times over the years, there was pressure on me to transfer to headquarters in Detroit but I just refused to live up there.

"Yes, I remember the paint — and that apartment in Winters, and that got me started. When I came to Houston, I started buying old dilapidated houses in a run-down area near downtown, paying a few dollars down and the balance over a few years. Then I spent all my spare time fixing them up and making them livable. I did most of the work myself as it was too expensive to hire it done.

"Being near downtown, they have always rented well. In the early 80's, this was rediscovered by the young people — and they began moving here in droves. Now, there are all kinds of new houses, townhouses, and apartments being built in this area known as the Museum District, or as the writers say, 'the area has been gentry-fied.'

"After retiring, I started working full-time taking care of the rental houses and I hope I can continue doing just that. Doing nothing has no appeal for me.

"So, you see, that small apartment I built in Winters got me started on something that is still giving me life support, and some credit will have to be given to your paint."

P.S. He is referring to the left-over gallon of white paint from painting our house that I gave him. I had young people at home then and he was a sometimes visitor.

"Mild" Heart Attacks

People and doctors have always been relieved to find that a person had only a "mild" heart attack. There is less damage to the heart, the complications while in the hospital are fewer and recuperation is quicker.

Subendocardial heart attack victims may have trouble later

Now, however, we may be finding that people who have had these subendocardial heart attacks are more likely to have trouble later on. If only a small portion of the wall of the heart is damaged, there is often an area of heart muscle that is still being fed by the failing artery.

This portion of the heart that is barely getting enough oxygen will sooner or later have trouble with irregular heart rhythms or another heart attack. In the larger heart attacks, the muscle is replaced by a strong fibrous tissue which requires minimal circulation.

One study showed that people who had the subendocardial heart attacks needed bypass surgery about a third of the time — twice as often as those with full-thickness heart attacks. They were more likely to have another heart attack in the following years and also had more symptoms of pain.

Complications can be prevented with study and medicines

The news is not all bad though. The complications can often be prevented if proper studies and medicines are given. It appears that using certain heart medicines can do much to prevent the subsequent complications seen in the subendocardial heart attacks. Also, angiography may show an area of obstruction that may be treated with bypass surgery or dilated by doing angioplasty.

City's sales tax receipts increase 3.23%

The City of Winters' December sales tax rebate check of \$10,693.15, as compared to last year's \$11,695.34, is down 8.56% for the month. Year to date sales tax receipts for Winters totals \$154,026.65, up 3.23% from last year's \$149,194.65.

The City of Ballinger's December sales tax rebate check was down 9.58% from the December 1996 check. The \$32,279.93 check brought the total payments for the fiscal year to \$574,865.83, down 2.55% overall for the year. Last year's total up to this point was \$589,963.12.

The City of Miles sales tax check decreased 23.11% from last year's, with Miles receiving \$1,063.48 compared to \$1,383.20 last year. For the year Miles has received \$18,070.23, up 3.59% over last year's \$17,442.71.

For the year, Runnels County receipts are down 2.34%. This year's receipts are \$280,035.69 compared to last year's \$286,773.05. December's receipts were down 9.948%, with the county receiving \$18,102.49 compared to last year's \$20,109.95.

The December payments included local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on October sales and reported to the Comptroller in November. The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation is scheduled for Friday, January 9.

Health Notes

High Blood Pressure

What Causes High Blood Pressure?

About 90% of people with high blood pressure have essential hypertension, meaning that the cause is unknown. It can strike anyone, regardless of age, sex, race, economic status, or background. However, your chances of developing high blood pressure increase if you have a family history of hypertension or you are black, a man over age 35, a woman past menopause, overweight, or sensitive to salt.

For unknown reasons, blacks develop high blood pressure much more often than whites, and the disease tends to be more severe. It is estimated that one in every three blacks over age 18 years has high blood pressure. Other factors that seem to be related to high blood pressure are heavy alcohol consumption and lack of physical activity.

Women also have some special risks. Oral contraceptives can cause high blood pressure in susceptible women. If you are a woman with a strong family history of high blood pressure, have your doctor take your blood pressure before prescribing birth control pills, and then have it checked every 6 months as long as you take them. High blood pressure can develop suddenly during the last 3 months of pregnancy, endangering both mother and child if not treated. Prenatal care is important so that any blood pressure problems can be detected. After menopause, the chance of developing high blood pressure increases, even in women who have had normal blood pressure all their lives.

Latest air attacks on rabies began Jan. 6

Unprecedented decrease shows Texas experiment is working

The bright yellow planes from the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources were scheduled to lift off January 6, in the launch of the latest round in the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) multi-year aerial assault on rabies in South, Central, and West Texas.

Providing there were no delays due to inclement weather, the planes were scheduled to take off from Alice Municipal Airport loaded with small baits containing a concealed packet of vaccine that, once eaten by coyotes and foxes, immunizes them against rabies.

This is the fourth year for the baits to be airdropped over thousands of square miles of South, Central, and West Texas, and health officials are pleased with the success of the experiment. A deadly virus that was quickly spreading northward, rabies has been halted in its march toward more populated areas in Texas. TDH officials say the experimental bait drops and subsequent immunizations of coyotes and foxes against rabies are beginning to push rabies away from domestic animals and humans.

"Before the bait drops began, the virus was spreading northward," said Gayne Fearnemough, director, Oral Rabies Vaccination

Program, Texas Department of Health. "There was no reason why it couldn't spread throughout Texas and partially become a national threat. The bait drops have in just three years stopped the spread of a deadly virus."

Coyotes are the primary hosts for the virus which is easily spread from coyotes to domestic animals to people, but gray foxes are also targeted. In 1994, the year before the baits targeting coyotes were first dropped, 166 cases of canine rabies were recorded. Since then, the number of canine rabies cases has plummeted 98 percent to only three cases in 1997. Now up to 87 percent of the coyote population has been immunized, and no cases have been reported north of the bait drop zones.

"What began as an experiment here in Texas is now a model for other states that are having problems with rabies," said Guy Moore, director, Oral Rabies Vaccination Program for Gray Foxes. "They are using the program we have here to plan their own bait drop programs to fight rabies."

Since 1990, five human lives have been lost to rabies in Texas. In South Texas alone, two people have died from canine rabies and more than 2,500 people have taken post-exposure injections of rabies

vaccine after being exposed to a potentially rabid animal. Though treatment is effective if given in time, once rabies develops it is always fatal in humans.

The South Texas rabies epidemic in animals, or epizootic, began in 1988 in Starr County on the Texas-Mexico border and has spread to 21 other counties in its move northward toward more densely populated areas.

This year's airdrop follows similar TDH airdrops in 1995, 1996, and 1997 and is part of a five-to-seven year plan to first contain and then eliminate the canine and fox strains of rabies. TDH is working with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources, using Canadian-built Twin Otters to drop 2.6 million baits over 42,000 square miles of South, Central, and West Texas. The Canadians have virtually wiped out fox rabies in an area about the size of Texas, and TDH hopes to do the same.

Over the next five weeks, the planes will fly from Alice, Odessa, and Burnet. The small rectangular baits containing the vaccine used in the airdrop are made of fish meal and dog food and are harmless to other animals and humans.

Pesticide applicators reminded to obtain continuing education credits

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry reminds pesticide applicators to check to see if they have the necessary continuing education units (CEUs) to renew their license.

"Many private applicators, as well as all commercial and noncommercial applicators, face a Feb. 28, 1998, renewal date," Perry said. "I want to remind applicators to check their CEUs. There's still plenty of time to get the credits. Applicators can check with their Texas Agricultural Extension Service office for courses offered or call the Texas Department of Agriculture for a list."

Private applicators must renew their license every five years and obtain 15 CEUs during that period. Two credits must be in integrated pest management and two in laws and regulations. Applicators must self-certify their credits by listing them on the renewal form that they should receive by the end of January.

Private applicators also may

earn the required credits by passing a comprehensive recertification exam. This test costs \$50 for each attempt. After passing, an applicator will receive a certificate of completion for 15 CEUs.

Commercial and noncommercial applicators renew each year and must earn five CEUs annually, including one CEU in each of two of the following categories: laws and regulations, integrated pest management, and drift minimization.

"Education is vital for proper and safe pesticide use. It's important for applicators to stay informed of changing regulations as well as new products and new application methods," Perry said.

Applicators can get a list of approved courses by call TDA at 1-800-TELL-TDA or (512) 463-7548. More information about licenses, renewals, or CEU courses is available on the TDA web page <http://www.agr.state.tx.us/pesticide/index.htm>.

costs, maintenance and liability were also reasons for removal.

When water superintendent Jack Davis, Jr., was questioned as to why the reservoir was built, he stated that original plans called for two reservoirs that size but money was available for only one. The engineers who planned the lake and the new water system in the early 1980's convinced the city council at that time to build the single reservoir.

Expenses to remove the reservoir will be less than \$1,500, Hay estimated. The council instructed Hay and Davis to work out the details of what to do with the land after the reservoir is removed, and present this information at the next council meeting.

In another agenda item, Davis requested the council to allow Mike Scarborough to rent the water department house until Davis can find someone both qualified and available to live there.

The council approved a drafted rental agreement, with the city attorney's corrections, to rent the house for \$300 per month until April, 1998.

Housing Authority board chairman Bettye Pinkerton requested in

a letter the appointment of two new board members. Efrain Esquivel and Jessie Ruth Adams are retiring as board members and Pinkerton recommended the appointment of Dwayne Williams and Mary O'Rear as replacements. Council members unanimously approved the motion.

Winters resident and business owner Dean Burns appeared before the council to express her concern over what she considers to be dangerous conditions of the downtown sidewalks. After discussion of responsibility for repairing sidewalks — whether it belongs to city, businesses or the state — the item was tabled until the next council meeting.

Administrator Aref Hassan reported on the progress of construction projects on the city sewer farm — the irrigation system and construction of the new sewer pond.
