
The morning service will begin at 10:30 a.m. Dr. James McGlothlin who pastored at Hopewell from 1968-1970 has been invited to preach at that service.

Oil Bidness

As a continuation from last week, we finish our discussion of the practical side of releasing oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR).

We left off by pointing out that looking at the world market for crude was the most indicative thing to review in understanding how a release from the SRP would fare.

As a barometer, consider recent plans to add up to 4 million barrels per day to the world crude market by OPEC. Prices hardly budged and actually increased for a time out of disappointment that more wasn't being released. This indicates that release rates must be at least this large (and probably higher) to impact prices world-

many analysts believe feedstocks SPRR Sur., A-310. of stored crude have become more important to the market to provide momentum to prices changes.

That would take a large cumulative overproduction (some say 300 million barrels) into the world market to bring up the levels of stocks many would see as assurance of instantaneous supply. This would deplete the SPR in two months.

There is a lot of oil out there. The piddly 560 million barrels in the SPR is small scale when compared to world reserves that run into the tens (maybe even hundreds) of billions of barrels.

And, finally, consider this: OPEC could just decide to keep their production low enough to make the release of oil from the SPR meaningless. The cartel could delay their increase until the SPR release is exhausted, and then where would we be?

I have refrained from mentioning that this stop-gap policy is just a band-aid on the problem of low domestic supply. Oops, I'll save that for another day. Back to the subject at hand...

By releasing oil out of the SPR,

the U.S. could be risking its security in a real emergency with what may amount to shooting blanks at a world crude market that answers to no one or no government, no matter how loud they cry foul.







The disciples never asked Jesus, "How do you walk on water? Would you show us how?" They never asked, "How do you turn five biscuits and two sardines into a meal for five thousand?" They never asked him how to cast out demons or how to heal.

But, they did ask him "Lord, how do we pray?" In fact they didn't ask him. They put it as a personal request, "Lord, teach us how to pray." And he did. What we have come to know as the Lord's Prayer was his response. And right in the middle of that prayer are these words:

"Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us," ("debts" or "trespasses," are better translated "sins.")

I think he did that on purpose. To show us that forgiveness is the center of our relationship to God...the heart and core of our connection to Him, and to others. It's what the Cross is all about—the forgiveness of sins. Both ways. Our seeking forgiveness from God or from someone we have wronged, and our granting forgiveness to someone who has wronged us.

At the present time "forgiveness" is getting good press. Especially our willingness to forgive those who have wronged us. It seems that counselors, therapists, and theologians have come up with the nation that forgiveness is good for our health. As one professor of psychology puts it "Forgiveness does not mean forgetting, ignoring, minimizing, tolerating, excusing, legally pardoning, liking, or reconciling. Rather, forgiveness involves relinquishing vengeance, and adopting merciful thoughts, feelings, or behaviors toward the offender. Though granting forgiveness is often difficult to do, it may paradoxically free us from the shackles of resentment and rage."

And, she is investigating the connections between forgiveness, faith, feelings, and physiology. She is measuring the immediate emotional and physiological effects of forgiving and unforgiving responses to real-life offenders. So far her findings indicate that unforgiving responses perpetuate negative emotions and physiological stress. In contrast, forgiving responses are associated with comparatively greater positive emotion, greater perceived control and less physiological stress. Her preliminary conclusion—stoking unforgiving feelings over the long term may backfire! Emotional and physical stress may come. By cultivating a forgiving heart we may reduce these risks and improve our health.

I know so. At one time in our life as a family one of our sons failed to forgive our daughter for some silly mistake she had made. For some reason he took a very judgmental stance. He would not forgive her. And, because he would not forgive her, I would not forgive him. His sin? Failure to forgive. Mine? The same.

It kept me awake at nights. Every time I thought of him my stomach turned sour. My mind would fill the whole gamut of resentment to rage. It affected our whole family. It could have destroyed it ...it was that

Finally, one night the Holy Spirit put on the pressure. Put on the heat. And I saw my need, my disparate need, to forgive him. And I did. And Ramona and I did. And-what a release it was. Peace of soul. Peace of mind. Eventually, the whole family was healed. I haven't really had resentment or rage against him or any of our family since. And by cultivating a forgiving heart, my health has improved.

Of course I should have known. Forgiveness is the greatest thing we can do because it is the test of love. When Jesus Christ died on a cross, his first words were, "Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they are doing." I can't believe it was easy for him to do. After all, he was human too, and his suffering had to be most intense. But he did it. And by so doing showed us the best thing we can do for those who have sinned against us.

And what is that?

To take up our cross, and forgive them. Thank you, Jesus.



This past Monday, March 13, Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickmann announced more aid for livestock and commodity producers to offset grazing losses, damaged pasture land, and loss of livestock due to droughts and other natural disasters.

Payments totaling \$191 million will begin this week for grazing and livestock losses that were incurred during 1999. These payments will be divided between the 700 livestock producers around the country that applied for disaster assistance.

In addition, \$40 million is being set aside to help producers who are struggling to re-establish

As the Texas drought contin- damaged pastureland. Pastureland is eligible if the damage caused by the drought will require reseeding to re-establish the forage crop where livestock would normally graze.

> The week of March 24, the Senate passed "The Risk Management for the 21st Century Act," legislation to overhaul the current crop insurance program. In essence, this legislation would significantly reduce the premiums farmers pay for federally subsidized crop insurance and would encourage producers to buy higher levels of coverage.

> The pilot program portion of the crop insurance bill would allow a participating producer to receive a payment related to his crop production if he, in turn, would agree to engage in at least two of several eligible risk management practices.

> Qualifying risk management practices include: using futures, forwards, or options to reduce price risk; reducing outstanding debt; adopting alternative pest management practices; and purchasing crop insurance without a federal subsidy.

> The measure must still go to the President for his signature.

Buckskin Brigade added to summer wildlife camps

sion Service's highly successful Bobwhite Brigade youth program is now being joined by a new sister program. The "Buckskin Brigade" wildlife leadership camp makes its debut June 11-15 at the La Bandera Ranch near Carrizo

The three Bobwhite Brigades and the Buckskin Brigade sessions are: Rolling Plains Camp-Krooked River Ranch, Abilene, June 25-29; South Texas Camp-74 Ranch, Campbellton, July 16-20, and East Texas Camp-Pineywoods Conservation Center, Lufkin, July 23-27.

All the camps are four day programs for high school students ages 14-17. The hands-on camps are designed to make quail or deer experts of their participants while instilling in them intensive communication and leadership skills.

Cadets are rigorously schooled in quail or deer biology and management by leading wildlife scientists and other experts from across Texas. After completing the camps, members are expected to present at least three educational programs on what they've learned in their home county.

The quail camps have earned several state and national awards for conservation education. Graduates have delivered over 2,000 educational programs since the camps began in 1993. The top cadets from the quail and deer camps will earn college scholarships ranging from \$500 to

"The success of the quail camps and the subsequent interest shown in a similar effort in-

The Texas Agricultural Exten-volving white-tailed deer prompted the formation of the Buckskin Brigade," said Tamara Trail, San Angelo-based Extension Associate for conservation and a program coordinator. "The white-tailed deer is probably the best known wildlife species in Texas. Young Texans interested in wildlife, and deer in particular, should take a look at this firsttime learning opportunity. They're guaranteed to learn plenty whether they are hunters, photographers or just deer admir-

> Dr. Dale Rollins, San Angelobased Extension wildlife specialist and originator of the deer and quail camps said he expects 400 applicants for the camps. All are screened by a selection committee. Only the top 30 applying for each particular camp are invited to attend.

Tuition for the camps varies among sites, with \$200 being the maximum. The cost covers meals, lodging and supplies. Cadets are encouraged to get all or part of their tuition from their local Soil and Water Conservation District, bank, civic group or conservation organization. Financial assistance is available on request.

The Bobwhite and Buckskin Brigades are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, USDA Natural Resources conservation Service, Quail Unlimited, local Soil and Water Conservation Districts, private industry, and landowners.
