Package at convenience store brings in bomb squad

Members of the bomb squad from the Abilene Police Department were called at 1:15 p.m. on August 21, after the Winters Police Department received a call of a suspicious-looking package at the convenience store at 400 S. Main.

According to Officer Terry Johnson of the Winters PD, store manager Zelda Stewart had been told by a known customer that a plain brown package about the size of a small shoe box, wrapped in duct tape with "Zelda" written across it, was sitting on top of a pay phone located on an exterior package. wall of the store.

A bomb threat Monday after- areas were evacuated and the bomb squad from Abilene was called, arriving about 2:30 p.m.

> After donning 120 lbs. of protective gear, bomb technician Jay Pace carefully approached the package and rigged a PAND (Percussion Actuated Non-Electric Disruptor) to deactivate the pack-

> The PAND device shoots a highly concentrated stream of water, which is much safer and causes minimal damage, according to Sergeant Jim DeFoor with the Abilene PD.

Johnson continued, "The individual responsible for this showed a complete lack of regard for the (Wes-T-Go) employees, customers and citizens of this area."

Stewart, who was visibly shaken by the ordeal, said she wondered why anyone would do such a thing to her. "I've always tried to help everyone who comes in here," she said.

Winters Police Chief Carey Balentine said a thorough investigation will be conducted and possible charges filed. Fingerprints may be lifted from the cup.

Citizens say "no tax increase" at heated public hearing

In a called meeting on August 7, Councilmen voted to propose a tax rate increase of \$.04 per \$100 valuation. This 5.4% increase will make the tax rate \$.79, and comes on top of last year's 11% increase. The four cent tax increase would give approximately \$19,000 income to the

The consensus of visitors who spoke at the August 17 hearing is that taxes are already too high, and are vitually "impossible to pay" for many citizens, especially

One gentleman said, "I'm old, can't work any more, have gone through my savings. There's no more money to get from anywhere to pay any more taxes."

Additional comments centered around the already increased water rates, cable television rates and telephone rates. Some members of the audience said that due to the rising cost of living in Winters, they are trying to sell their homes and move elsewhere.

Another man at the meeting told council members, "We're in a crisis situation. If you don't take care of this now, there's not going to be anybody left here (in Winters)."

Councilman Steve Esquivel said, "We (present council members) inherited a lot of problems.

For more than an hour, several the elderly and anyone else on a Former council members used to spend everything they had and didn't save for these problems. Selling water and increasing taxes are the only ways for a city to

make money." Some heated discussion followed about consumers buying in Winters as opposed to spending money out of town. Several members of the audience said they cannot afford to buy in Winters because prices are so much higher. Alderman Esquivel answered, "If you don't spend money here, you don't get the revenue and that's a

big problem right there." Council members have asked for additional funds to cover several areas. Approximately \$5,000 of this money is earmarked for a new vehicle for the street department and \$5,000 is for a new vehicle for the police department.

City Manager Aref Hassan says the "new" vehicles are actually "used" vehicles to replace a 1983 Chevrolet pickup with 129,000 miles used by the street department, a 1988 Chevrolet pickup with 126,000 miles used by the water department, and a 1991 Chevrolet car with 210,000 miles which has been used by the police department.

Another \$5,000 will be used to replace depleted grant funds which have, for the past three years, provided the salary for a member of the Winters police department.

The remaining \$4,000 will go toward a 5% salary increase for city employees and to cover increased health insurance costs.

Davis submits status report on city water situation Five months supply left

the water status report from Water Superintendent Jack Davis, Jr., were presented.

According to Davis's report, there are approximately five months of water remaining in Elm Creek Reservoir.

Davis says, "We are going into our cooler months soon and this should help extend our water supply even longer."

On July 17, 2000, the transfer pump was turned off for water coming from Lake Winters to Elm

During the public hearing at Creek Reservoir, having transcity hall on August 17, copies of ferred 665,280,000 gallons. Davis said this raised the level of Elm Creek Reservoir 6.023 feet.

The cost to pump this water was \$39.69 per day, Davis reports. On July 24, samples from the

wells at the lake were taken by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Committee (TNRCC). Davis said these tests were more indepth than the previous tests. and the wells were allowed to start pumping again on July 24, 2000.

We have talked, off and on, about natural gas over the years. We've followed it through the early 1990's when it was touted as the next big thing ("just as soon as that gas bubble pops") and then to its fall out of favor (by virtue around the recent gasoline price of keeping those counting on a huge surge in demand waiting).

And, now, almost below the radar, the natural gas business in Texas is approaching boom status--this time for real.

low gas prices very closely, but a few of us have been focusing almost entirely on oil and forgot about checking the spot gas price.

While oil prices have climbed, fell, climbed back again, and steadied a little, gas prices have continued up and up and now stabilized. That "by-product" is now sold for \$3.50 to \$4.00 per MCF on the spot market. Some rich gas in remote markets is selling for \$5 per MCF.

So, it's all good news for gas producers, right?

Well, mostly, but there are some things all of us should think about when we talk natural gas. And, some of those things are not always positive.

But, first, the upbeat.

Properties with significant gas production are seeing an increase in cash flow. While there are some particular situations where producers can't realize higher market prices due to contracts or other limitations, most producers are seeing gas approach equivalency to oil in terms of revenue generated on a lease.

It starts with the end-user market, which is ever-growing (for many reasons) and trickles down to the gatherers who are doing everything they can to collect more volume because they have customers who want it. Gas is the fuel of choice because of its cleanliness, its abundance in the U.S. in business-friendly states (that doesn't include California, of course), and its efficiency and breadth as a fuel (power plants, heating homes, running automobiles, etc.).

As a result of this strong demand for natural gas (and the good prices that come with it), there is record-level activity in rigs that drill exclusively for gas and operators are looking for ways to produce more. At the same time, gatherers, transportation companies, and utilities are building infrastructure to handle larger volumes of gas in the future to meet the demand.

All of this looks very good for producers, for sure. It will also impact local economies where natural gas is plentiful and activity is high looking for new reserves. However, there are some worrying trends on the horizon which should prod the domestic

industry to do more work in finding new supplies of natural gas. These trends also, hopefully, will be understood by the public and politicians so as to avoid the really uninformed talk that went on surge when people start talking

about natural gas. That last part may be hoping for a bit much; however, I am an optimist. Next time, we will talk about some of the trends and what Now, I know some of you fol- they may mean to the oil and gas business.





His name is Joey. Actually his full name is Joseph Larson Hanson. He's six years old. Good looking. Well built. Strong. Athletic. He moves around the house like a gymnast. Leaping and bounding... from the counter-top to the table to the floor to the big

leather chair in the living room. He is almost perpetual motion.

Sometimes he yells. All of a sudden. For no particular reason. Loud. Piercing. Like he's trying to express himself only he can't find the words. And it's frustrating! Most of the time he does not talk in sentences. But he does communicate. For example, this past Memorial Day a bunch of us from our family went to Fort Snelling... a National Cemetery. Joey was there, along with his parents and younger sister. We went to visit the grave of my brother John. While we were there I led the family in a short worship service. Now, almost every time we visit, sooner or later Joey will come up to me and say, "Cemetery!"... with gusto! I can understand why. It is an awesome place, with thousands of white crosses, row on row.

He calls Ramona "Grandma Boo." Why? Because way back when... when he was very small, Ramona played "peek a boo" with him. And he never forgot. So Ramona is Grandma Boo.

He is very bright about some things. For example: one day he was at his speech therapist's office, having a lesson. On the wall, behind her desk, was a chart. It had the signs for signing those who are deaf. After Joey came home that day, he started using some of the signs that he had seen. Since his parents are somewhat fluent in signing, they were amazed that he could pick up so much so quick.

Joey, our grandson, is autistic.

When his father and mother first found out, they were devastated. And so was the rest of the family. But, after many prayers and seeking the help that is available, things are working out for Joey, and for the rest of the family. His cousins understand that Joey sees things different from us... his perspective is different, and he really isn't good at social skills. That goes with the territory. But this year, he will be going to school. To first grade. With all the other kids. He did very well in kindergarten, and just loves to ride the bus. Of course he will have a "tutor' in the classroom with him, who will be there for him and supply the assistance for the teacher also.

It was while we were visiting friends in Minnesota that Ramona saw stays and more surgeries. common than Down's Syndrome or childhood cancer. "Thanks to a simple screening test called CHAT (Checklist for Autism in Toddlers), a pediatrician can spot autistic disorders in children as young as 18 months. Some experts believe all kids should

"Autistic people have extreme difficulty perceiving, or even inferring, other people's thoughts, feelings, and intentions. In fact, autism is sometimes described as 'mindblindness.' Yet the condition is more than a disability. Autistic people excel at certain tasks.

"It's a profound mystery. Nearly six decades after autism was first formally recognized, the big questions — What causes it? Can it be prevented or cured? — are still wide open. But the pace of discovery is accelerating." The whole article was good for us.

No matter what, as long as he lives on earth, Joey will be loved and appreciated. For what he is. And for who he is... a child of God. God doesn't make junk. Joey's parents are totally committed to make their family the happy family they set out to be. For sure, there are many more supporting them in this endeavor. When the good Lord told us to love our neighbor as ourselves... He meant it for all our neighbors. Including those closest to us. Even those with autism. What would Jesus do? You know, and so do I. And for sure, when we do likewise... we are Blessed.





Ballinger Bearcats return with depth, adequate size and speed for District 5-3A playoff run the Bear 2000 season

Optimism comes in large portions at Bearcat Stadium as the 2000 football season opens.





Bearcats figure to finish in top of hunt for District 5-3A title in new district alignment

Ballinger, Wylie, Merkel & Clyde remain in district

and so have some of the names for Ballinger's district football opposition this fall.

Gone-from the district but not from the schedule—is longtime opponent Brady in the new district alignment assigned by the University Interscholastic League.

Expected to lead Sweetwater is quarterback Shane Mercer.

- Must stay healthy and eligible academically ----

Sam Boyd had the sprinklers going on the playing field on a hot August morning; both the grass carpet and the Paint Rock Indians were benefitting from the cooling 11 Six-man favorite Trent, which

Preseason workouts aren't coach, was giving his troops all the encouragement he could as they ran wind sprints through the sprinklers: "Keep pushing yourselves ... You're getting stronger ... Now's when you become win-

ners ... That's it, that's it ..." The challenge for Boyd and the Indians entering this year's six-man season is to get better. That comes from work, which they can handle; there's little he can do

about the numbers. At a small school, the enrollment dictates the squad size; it's Boyd's challenge to develop the talent.

"We're a lot further along than we were at this time a year ago," Boyd says, "because of the continuity and the kids' knowledge of what we're doing.

"We're just short on experience and numbers. We don't have

many kids. "We will have more speed this year, though."

Early workouts found Boyd and assistant Sammy Wyatt working with only a dozen players.

Contrast that with the District has 17 lettermen returning.

The continuity is having had Albert Booker. easy, and Boyd, the Indians' head the same coaches in place for two years now. Boyd is beginning his third year as head coach of the Indians.

A year ago the Indians finished with a 3-6 record. The year started well, with 18 players, but depletions via academics-known in athletics as no pass, no-play-cut into the depth playing a part in the season record.

Only one of the starters returns from a year ago, running back and linebacker Tobias Correa.

In addition to Correa, Boyd will have Willie Haney at quarterback and safety with letter experi-

And it's not just because of

Booker is just one of the six offensive and defensive starters returning at Trent, but he's a major one.

As defending state champion in the 100 and 200 dashes, he's probably the fastest young man in six-man football in the state.

"Out here last year, we had him hemmed in down there," Boyd said, pointing to far end of the field, "and he wiggled and juked and got loose and we couldn't catch him.

"He's something else," Boyd said.

That speed was the key to Booker rushing for almost 1,800 yards a year ago.

The District 11 race also includes Blackwell, which shared a district title a year ago-but lost out on the playoffs via the tiebreaker—and finished 8-2.

In other district action, the Indians will face Lueders-Avoca, Veribest, and Novice.
