"We want to urge undocumented persons not to worry about filling in short gaps with false papers,
Osuna said. "That would be fraud, and would ruin their chances of becoming legal residents.
"Many of the aliens are very suspicious of us, they're scared to

## Farmers should check pumps for efficiency

With planting season approaching, underway or past, depending upon the crop, it's time farmers should check their pumps for maxipump plant test pump plant test.

Actually, July is the best tie to conduct pump plant efficiency test, However, that's also the busiest time of the year. Pumps may be tested any time after the unit has
been in operation at least three to four days.
"By waiting, maximum drawdown occurs, and we have a better indication of the actual pumping assistant manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District. "In these actual conditions, we can accurately ob-
tain the unit's energy-use efficien-

The testing may be done by the irrigator, and instructions and formulas are available at the
HPUWCD office in Lubbock, but the test does take in Lubbock, but test will also be performed by the district on a first-come, first-served basis.
While testing is not required eve ry year, Carver recommends an evaluation of the pump plant at least every three years, as well as
monitoring of energy costs. When a monitoring of energy costs. When a
well requires a squeeze valve or booster pump, poor pump perfor mane may be suspected. "Opera tors should also watch for decreasing water yeilds, sand, or surging," Carver said. "When you have sev-
eral wells pumping into a common eral wells pumping into a common
line, be sure to check each pump. line, be sure to check each pump.
"By testing, the operator receive an indication of where his pump's maxiumum efficiency level is and can decide what action needs to be
taken. By bringing the pump taken. By bringing the pump to maximum performance, the farmer can often double his efficiency
while cutting fuel costs in half. Pump energy consumption is one area of farm management which needs to be as efficient as possibe." Carve Carver said wells in the region average $45 \%$ efficiency, while the
industry standard is $75 \%$. "Bringing the pump efficiency from $45 \%$ to $74 \%$ can reduce the fuel consumpion by $40 \%$."
