

Good news

Aldermen grinning

Topping the good-news list was a report by Public Works Director James Killough that the city may be able to solve its nagging sewagetreatment problems by converting two old ponds instead of having to buy additional land and add new

'We went back in the books and found that under our old permit, we have two old ponds that were preexisting and permitted," Killough said. Working with Don Manning, district inspector for the Texas Water Commission, "We started an amendment to our present permit to let us use these two old ponds," he reported. "We could then go to our old aerator system when we need to, and only for as long as we need

The main problem with the present aerator-type "race track" plant is that its "biological oxygen demand" (BOD) level has been too high to pass muster with the state. The state would allow a higher BOD level with the two old ponds, which would utilize natural sunlight and oxydation to purify the

"This is a point we've been trying to meet for quite a while-to get the BOD raised," Mayor Wayne

bad at Monday night's meeting of Jack Thompson asked. (Mc-Morries' plan called for buying new land and building oxydation ponds to replace the "race track"

> "Yes," Killough said. "It will just use our existing facilities and not require any more room."

What's more, Killough said, the electricity demands of the altered plant would be just a fraction of what the present plant uses.

"It would cut the electrical needs drastically and would cut maintenance drastically," he said.

City Manager Reeford Burrous estimated the cost of reconstruction at \$50,000 "as a preliminary figure" -mainly to dredge out the old ponds, line them with clay and build up the dams around them to meet state flood-control requirements.

"Our year-to-date cost of electricity alone at the present plant has been \$32,000," Burrous said, so the city could possibly recover its reconstruction cost within two years on electricity savings.

"This seems to be the way to go," Alderman Don Sheffy com-

The board urged Killough and Burrous to continue to pursue this lower-cost option for the sewage treatment plant.

The good news outweighed the Morries had designed?" Alderman sales tax return on intrastate longdistance phone calls originating through Contel's Dimmitt office.

> The state currently collects 6.25% sales tax on intrastate LD service. Burrous reported that under the provisions of House Bill 1949, the city can get a penny of this tax starting in October if it enacts the appropriate ordinance by June 30.

"Are you sure it's just a return on taxes already being paid to the state, and not putting an extra tax on our local people?" Mayor Collins asked.

"I think so," Burrous said. "I'll double-check to make sure."

Burrous also reported good news in his year-to-date review of the city budget. He said the city is operating below budget overall, despite several major expenses that weren't budgeted.

Department costs are ranging generally from 33% below budget to 20% over, Burrous reported, and overall costs are running 99.54% of budget.

"Every department has worked real hard to keep their operations under the budget," he said.

The major cost overrun has been for natural gas to heat the city warehouse, which was utilized for maintenance work during the winter. Burrous explained that the warehouse hasn't been used much

Todd Hill and Kenny Kern capped their senior year with a successful defense of their doubles title, Traci Hill and Stephanie Brockman won the state doubles title, the fourth-straight year a Nazareth girls team has won that title, and Hart's Tammy Menchaca closed out her schoolgirl career with a double in the 1,600- and 3,200-meter runs at the sate meet Saturday in Austin.

Gone from this year's meet was much of the drama, and the rain, that prevailed at the 1986 meet. Hill-Brockman lost just 10 games in three matches, Hill-Kern dropped just 16 games, and Menchaca's closest competitor in both races turned out to be her schoolmate, Lupe Mijares, who finished second in the two-mile and third in the mile.

"The boys (Hill and Kern) played up to their potential Friday. They served and played the net well," said Sandy Heiman, Nazareth tennis coach. "Saturday we got off to a slow start and played sluggish. The team they met in the finals this year was not quite as good as the team they beat last

"The girls meet was a little more competetive than last year. The girls (Hill and Brockman) had a few problems getting their game going Friday but played as well as they have all year on Saturday," said Heiman.

Linda Birkenfeld finished fourth in the 1A 3,200, in 12:19.6, while teammate Rachel Huseman was fifth in the 400 in 60.5 seconds. Hart's Larry Brown did not place in the long jump.

"Linda ran her best time of the year, knocking off :15 off of her regional time," said Lisa Anglin, Nazareth girls track coach.

"Rachel had a tough time and didn't run very well. During her race, rain was puring down and the race was very slow," Anglin said.

Last year's 2A boys doubles semifinalists, Martin and Andy Castillo of Hart, were ousted in the quarterfinals this year by the Chambless brothers of Grand Saline. The Castillo's won the first set, 6-2, before dropping the last two sets, 6-

4, 6-1. Menchaca, who won the twomile and finished third in the mile last year, breezed to easy wins in both races this year. They were her second and third state gold medals of the year-she won the state cross-country title last fall in Georgetown.

In Saturday afternoon's twomile, Mijares was Menchaca's closest competitor, but Menchaca won in 11:41.7 to Mijares' 11:51.9, then came back three hours later to win the mile in 5:28.8, while Mijares settled for the bronze in 5:31.6.

"I was extremely pleased with the way both girls performed," said Hart track coach Mark Albin. "Going in I thought we had a pretty good chance of doing well, I just didn't know if the races (1,600and 3,200-meter runs) being just three hours would hurt us. The track was very slow because of the rain earlier in the day. There was water standing on the track in

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
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Immigration laws outlined at meeting

An Immigration and Naturalization Service deputy commissioner and a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist outlined legalization procedures for undocumented aliens and outlined employer sanctions Monday in a meeting at the Dimmitt City Hall.

Raul Osuna, a Dallas-based INS official, and Dick Edwards, the TAES economist, told about 40 persons at the meeting that employers should use more hiring safeguards, including the use of the new "I-9" form that will soon be mailed by the Internal Revenue Service, to avoid new hirings of illegal aliens, but urged employers who already use undocumented workers not to fire them but to help them become legal residents through the new Immigration Reform Act of 1986.

The I-9, which should be mailed to all holders of IRS tax identification numbers, must be filled out by all employees hired since Nov. 6, 1986 as soon as the forms are available "regardless of race, color, sex, anything," Osuna said.

The legalization effort for up to 12 million illegal aliens began May 5-Mexican Independence Day, a day selected by INS officials for its significance - for all but agricultural workers. Signup for agricultural workers who are not documented will not begin until June 1. Non-agricultural aliens have until May 4, 1988 to sign up

for temporary resident status-the first step toward becoming fullfledged citizens.

Agricultural workers will have until Nov. 30, 1988 to apply for resident status.

Undocumented persons must document their residence in the US for a four-year period with no single absence longer than 45 days and an aggregate absence of no more than 180 days. Osuna said almost anything can be used to document the residency - rent receipts, utility bills, affidavits from priests or employers, or even letters written from the US with the postmark on the envelope.

"We want to urge undocumented persons not to worry about filling in short gaps with false papers." Osuna said. "That would be fraud, and would ruin their chances of becoming legal residents.

"Many of the aliens are very suspicious of us, they're scared to come forward. They can receive assistance from volunteer agencies (in this area, any Catholic church or Catholic Family Services in Amarillo), and those agencies are acting not only as paperwork helpers but also as buffers between applicants and INS."

Osuna also urged aliens to think twice before using an attorney for their paperwork, and said some "sleazy attorneys in the Dallas-Fort Worth area are charging up to

ney to fill all of the paperwork forms are available.

Aliens applying under either program will need a medical examination from an INS-approved physician (\$50 to \$75, Osuna said), a fingerprint card (available from many police departments for \$5 to \$10), two passport - sized photofee - \$185 for adults, \$80 for children, but no more than \$420 for

One stumbling block for aliens— "They may be receiving a check for can, to make them legal residents." their children, and they would be disqualified," Osuna said. However, food stamps, public housing, Medicaid and free- or reducedprice meals would not lead to disqualification."

Another stumbling block: an applying alien must not have had a felony conviction or three misdemeanor convictions in the US. "We only want to keep out criminals or public charges," Osuna said.

For employers, they should keep the I-9 on file and have photocopies made of all documenting evidence of all new employees in the same file. Failure to have the I-9's can lead to a fine of \$100 to \$1,000 per employee who does not have the necessary paperwork. There is no

There is a grace period on sanctions for hiring undocumented workers - but only for the first offense, and only through May 31, 1988. Once full enforcement begins June 1, 1988, the first offense carries a fine of up to \$2,500. For subsequent offenses, employers may be fined up to \$10,000, and graphs (about \$10) and the filing may be sentenced to prison. Each fine and sentence is for each undocumented worker.



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



To effect a name change, a newly-married woman can use the original or a certified copy of her marriage certificate, showing both her old and new names. If she is foreign-born, she will also need proof of US citizenship or current alien status.

Social Security makes no charge for a name to be changed on its records. Some firms advertise that they will provide this service for a fee; however, Social Security offers this service, as it does all other services, free of charge.

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
