
Deadline near for "Texas Midwest Day" in Austin

Sometimes, you believe in a principle. Sometimes you don't. Hopefully, you can be honest about when you do and when you

That's the ideal, I suppose. But, it turns out, real life is not ideal. Not that it is such a big surprise when people are not acting in an ideal manner, but it is no less disappointing when it happens.

Enough with the psychotherapy--what am I talking about?

Well, most business people have professed a desire for less regulation. This was premised on the idea that unfettered businesses would be able to serve the customer (and the world) in the best way possible, which would be in everyone's best interest. Sure, there would have to be a rule of law to level the field for all participants, but artificial market limitations designed to limit profit were simply impediments.

This was based on a principle, or so I thought--not just a popular idea and not just for self-serving reasons. Obviously, many businesses can benefit if there are less regulations, but the idea was for all businesses to benefit on a level and consistent basis.

Well, it appears from recent events that some businesses think less regulation is good for them but not for the oil and gas business. In fact, there are several powerful business lobbies who are pushing for new sub-cabinet nominees in the new administration that actually favor more regulation. And, the type of regulation favored is energy regulation.

Everything from price caps to additional profit taxes are proposed as answers to the "problem" of higher energy prices. Some businesses groups feel the best way to insure their profits in the future is to limit or even eliminate the profits in the oil and gas

The assumption is not incorrect on a mathematical basis. If you force someone to lower their price so that you can make a profit, then you will make a profit. But, the

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damage done by abandoning a principle is a danger to the future profits of all companies.

So, it is the energy industry right now that needs to be regulated. What if it is the agriculture industry tomorrow or the trucking industry next week or the manufacturing business next year? Will those companies willingly limit their opportunities to help the rest of us?

My guess is the next group selected for regulation will scream loud and clear that regulation is bad--on principle, I assume.

Too bad it isn't on principle. Turns out geese and gander are not necessarily due the same consideration, apparently.



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

Her name is Marva. About five feet, seven inches tall. About 50 years old. Blondish hair. I never got close enough to really see her. But I surely did hear her.

She was a bright light at our Seminary Convocation in St. Paul Minnesota, a couple of weeks ago.

Convocation is a "called together" time for graduates and former students, mostly clergy. It consists mostly of lectures, workshops, worship, and fellowship. There are class reunions, banquets, and some really good "bull sessions." In the past, it has been pretty heady stuff, and after three or four lectures, one's brain went into overload.

But this year was different. This year, they opened up the convocation to congregations and lay folks. And the theme of the gathering was "Following Jesus: The Congregation as a Healing Community." And the high point of the meeting was to be a Service of Holy Communion and Healing, Thursday evening, from 7 to 8:30 p.m.

Now, folks, for my Seminary to take such a step is nothing short of a miracle. To break the pattern. To have workshops like Retreats and Healing, Wholeness and Health for Leaders, Parish Nursing: Promoting Health In, With, and Through Congregations, A Place of Prayer, A Place of Healing ... blew my mind! Many of the workshop leaders were laypersons and many were women.

There was a new and different spirit of the gathering right from the beginning. If you didn't get to the main auditorium at least 15 minutes before the meeting, you had to stand or go to an area where you could see and hear the speakers on closed circuit T.V. The workshops were just that... where you learned by doing as well as just hearing. Where you worked, really did the stuff. One of the highlights for me was to be in a workshop led by a nurse who served with me for seven years as the first parish nurse in our denomination! Up there in Crookston, Minnesota. Obviously God was the inventor, and we were just His instruments. We had little or no job description, but did develop a working relationship. The Holy Spirit guided, directed, and empowered her, me, and the congregation. Now there are hundreds of them in our denomination. And Annette is one of their leaders. It was so good to see and hear her in action! God is so good.

But Marva Dawn, keynote presenter, really got into my head and my heart. When I first saw her, it was on the closed circuit T.V. She was speaking about the congregation as being a "reconciling congregation." And how after a church meeting, in which the congregation was divided over some issue... a vote was taken, and one side won, but there was some hard feelings. The chairman ended the meeting by banging the gavel and announcing, "The meeting is over." And Marva stood up and said, "No, it isn't. And it won't be until there is reconciliation, and both sides agree to be reconciled and carry no grudge against each other." Wow! There have been a number of church meetings in my ministry when I could sure have used a Marva.

But what got me most of all... here was a person who was keynote Mount Carmel for the nice dinpresenter at a Convocation on Healing... who had just come off a series ner. of chemotherapy treatments for her cancer, who was losing her eyesight, whose hearing was bad, and who was supporting her weakened sick body with a crutch. Hardly a model of health as the world defines it. A worn-down body encasing a disease. Speaking to us about the love of Jesus and the healing power of His Presence in our lives. I'll not forget the light that shined out of her as she led that august body in a praise song that proclaimed the healing power of the "Light of Our Life." It really was a bouncy one. We sang it just a bit more lively than a funeral drudge. She shouted "Stop the music!" And then looked at us through her half-dimmed eyes and blasted us with "He is worth praising you know, let's get with it"

And we all did.

The next day she led us in worship and preached the sermon. It was full of wonder and praise. You see, she was healed. Not cured. But healed. Full of the love of God. Full of light. You see, the true light that enlightens every one was coming into the world. His life is the light of all. His light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. I know. I saw it shine through the near blind eyes of Marva. And it took the dimness of my soul away.



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

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
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

selves — making the playoffs! As of Monday, January 22, Bangs and Eula were tied at 5-1


for first place in district 9-2A. Tuesday night the Blizzards faced Bangs in Dragon gym but results were unavailable at press



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Registering securities in firm name can be a bargain

In this day and age of \$150 designer purses, \$50,000 cars and \$1 million homes, bargains can be difficult to find. One bargain that's no secret, however, is registering securities in firm name.

- · Collects all interest and dividends from the securities for you;
- Provides regular updates on the status of your securities; Notifies you whenever your bonds are called or mature; and
- Furnishes one simple annual tax-reporting form.

All of these are attractive services; however, the biggest advantage of registering securities in firm name is the safety this service provides. When your securities are registered in firm name, you no longer have to worry about them being lost, stolen or accidentally destroyed.

Consider, for example, this true story of a Washington investor. This self-made millionaire invested regularly in bonds. Although he registered some of his bonds in firm name, he didn't trust his investment firm's computer system with all his bonds.

Unfortunately, this proved to be a costly mistake. When a group of children started a fire while playing with matches, the local fire department couldn't control the inferno. When the last ember had died, an entire apartment complex and 32 homes, including the home of the bond investor, were completely destroyed, even though the fire department was located just two blocks away.

Fortunately, no one was injured in the fire, but the bond investor lost \$1.2 million worth of securities in the blaze! Of course, the bonds could be replaced, but the cost of doing so was about \$24,000. That's an expensive lesson.

Some investors think its safer to hold onto their stock and bond certificates. If you insist on holding your securities, remember to keep written records of all your certificates. Record the description, amount and certificate number of each security before placing it in a safedeposit box. Then be sure to keep a close eye on the financial news to be on the lookout for bond calls, mergers, etc., in case you overlook an important piece of mail. And don't forget to notify each company of any change in your mailing address, even for a stock that does not pay

No one plans to lose a security, to have their property stolen or to lose their possessions in a natural or man-made disaster. Unfortunately, these are everyday occurrences. Why take a chance with your stock and bond certificates when registering securities in firm name is one of the best bargains available today?



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

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

Interesting history of Runnels County

The following history was noted by Neuman Smith in the January 13, 2001, meeting of the Runnels County Historical Commission. Neuman reported that he had shared the information with several friends and others who live elsewhere. Some who had specifically requested related information were sent detailed biographies or articals of interest.

Jack McGregar, a businessman who came to Ballinger in 1886, was a true leader for his church and community. He was the leader in getting the Carnegie Library in Ballinger started in 1908.

Estes Lynn, who came to Ballinger in 1912, worked as a bookkeeper for Vaugh Flour Mill. He also worked in a bank in San Angelo and later worked selling insurance. He helped many people in the community and served as mayor for many years.

Harry Lynn, who came to Ballinger as a child in 1906, grew up in the First National Bank and served there for 65 years. He was a true leader and served on many leading organizations including the school board, church, and oth-

H.O. Pearce came to this area before the county was organized in 1880. He helped to get it going and was a businessman in Runnels City until 1886. 



Wheat management update

range of ages in wheat crops this year. Some wheat was dry sowed in September, and other wheat was planted in mid-December. Some of it is not up to a stand yet.

The cool soil temperature is resulting in a purple coloration in some of the younger wheat. This occurred primarily from low phosphorus uptake by the plant. Root development on the mid-December planted wheat will be weak, and the plant will stress easily if soil moisture reserves are de-

Small grain fields which were planted early and had plants that were lush and actively growing experienced injury by the freezing temperatures. Most of the injury was on the leaf tips, and the plants should recover without a major impact to yield.

Much of the wheat planted in the Southern Rolling Plains was planted in late November through mid-December.

Late planted wheat will mature later than early planted wheat. Late maturity will expose the crop to higher temperatures and more drought stress during grain fill. The potential for disease such as leaf rust and stem rust is usually higher during the latter part of the growing season causing more risk to the maturing crop.

Seedlings which emerge in December and January are at much greater risk of winterkill. Wheat survives better if there is time to establish a secondary root with a nitrogen fertilizer.

Runnels County has a wide system and some tillus prior to extremely cold weather.

Wheat grows very slowly at low temperature and is essentially dormant below 40 degrees.

Keep all this in mind when making management decisions on your crop.

Base your fertilization program on long-term averages and not on last year's production. Moderate nitrogen and phosphorus rates have given economical yield increases in seasons of adequate rainfall. Small grains which are grazed usually need more fertilizer than ungrazed grain. Nitrogen increases forage production, but grazing also removes much of the nitrogen applied in the fall.

The "rule of thumb" is that each bushel of wheat requires 2.0 pounds of nitrogen for production. Therefore, a producer with a realistic yield goal of 30 bushels, for example, would need 60 pounds of available nitrogen to produce that yield. Part of that nitrogen is already present, so a good soil test would tell you how much additional nitrogen would be needed to produce that yield

Nutrient intake increases dramatically once tilling has occurred. Wheat uses 68% of its nitrogen by the boot stage. The remaining 32% is taken up between boot and milk stage.

Brush control traded for increased water yield

The State of Texas, for the first time, is considering providing a brush control cost share program for producers in Runnels County. Approximately 70% cost share for brush control is being consid-

The purpose of the program is to trade brush control for increased water yield. The principle being water yield is greater from land without brush than from land with brush.

A study report conducted by Blackland Research and by Texas A&M indicates an additional 249,584 acre feet of water annually could be gained from the Concho and Colorado River basins. This extra water could be added to groundwater recharge and to surface flow into existing reservoirs if a significant amount of brush was removed from the watershed.

This area of Texas had very little brush during the early days of our watch. God and Mother Nature originally provided us with a small part of the richest and most fertile grassland area in the world. The vastness was almost unimaginable. It was a huge area that stretched from the Texas coast well into Canada and from the Rocky Mountains to near the Mississippi River.

Nature stocked this area with an estimated 50 million bison. She grazed it with what amounted to a flexible deferred rotation system. These animals did not remain on one area all year. She burned it off on a regular basis. Numerous streams that are presently dry flowed yearlong then. The system prospered for thousands of years.

However, our use has changed it from grassland to farmland and, in some cases, from grassland to brushland. We killed the bison, fenced it off, stocked it with cattle, and forced these cattle to graze in one area yearlong. We largely stopped the fire. Brush, mainly mesquite and cedar, proliferated.

A couple of things come to mind when we producers think of controlling mesquite. The first is "something has got to be done." The brush is becoming thicker and thicker. The economics are simple. In short, a Runnels County producer can easily spend \$90 per acre to grub mesquite. However, according to most evaluations, a fair return (from extra grass) is not possible. In

short, we cannot afford to control brush on our own.

On the other hand, we have a lot of wildlife (including deer, turkey, and quail) because we have a lot of brush. Hunting lease return, in some cases, exceeds returns from livestock. This aspect needs to be considered when producers plan for brush control. Still, we need to somehow abate the relentless spread of mesquite and cedar.

Quail research, for example, indicates 75% of the mesquite can be mechanically removed from a brushy pasture without affecting quail populations. The key is to include the life requirements of quail (or deer, or turkey) into your brush control plan and then follow with proper management of the resulting habitat.

The State Legislature has the final say on where and if an estimated \$32 million will be spent for brush control. Seven areas of Texas, including Runnels County as a part of the Upper Colorado Project, will vie for the money.

State Representative Robert

Junell of San Angelo is chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and a key player as to who gets what. Mr. Junell, along with our other state senators and representatives, will determine if and how much money is allocated for use in Runnels County.

The Brush Control Feasibility Study prepared by the Upper Colorado River Authority in cooperation with Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and Texas A&M University indicated the following: "Unless profound and dramatic brush control methods are put into practice during the next two decades, specific communities of West Texas, including rural and some metropolitan areas, will not have sufficient water to meet existing demands for municipal, industrial, and agricultural uses.





Since that time Lancaster has been a proud fan of all Winters livestock exhibitors. He was and is concerned not only for the success of his children's animal projects, but that of the other Winters FFA members as well.

He thought it important that Winters exhibitors and their families eat together, and spend time together as a group at major stock shows-a practice that is continued yet today. In fact it was not uncommon to find him cooking for the entire Winters delegation at San Antonio or Houston.

Besides his support and concern for the youth and FFA advisors as a parent—his support carried over into his job as WHS principal and superintendent of the Winters ISD from 1976 until his retirement in 1996.

As an administrator, when the UIL introduced the 10-day excused absence policy, Lancaster was instrumental in seeing that the WISD spring break fell during the Houston Stock Show, allowing students more days to attend major stock shows. As superintendent he saw that the WHS Ag. program did not lack for supplies and equipment when it was needed.



Since his retirement, Lancaster has enjoyed his ten grandchildren and tending to ranch land and cattle near Talpa.

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
