WHS graduation Friday evening

Baccalaureate and commencement ceremonies for the 2001 graduating class of Winters High School will be held Friday, May 25, at 8:30 p.m. at Blizzard Field.

The Pledge of Allegiance will be led by Kendra Hope, president of the senior class, followed by the baccalaureate devotional given by Father Obioma Obi of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church.

W. G. Cathey, Principal of Winters Secondary School, will make the presentation of the Pearl Jackson Memorial and Floy Hood Hodge scholarships and other awards.

Presentation of diplomas to fifty graduates will be made by Cheryl Bryan and Larry Walker, members of the Board of WISD Trustees.

Benediction will be given by Gabriel G. Hernandez, President of the WHS Student Council.

Texas spends \$4.2 million on welfare in Runnels County

The state spent a total of \$4,229,248 last year for major welfare programs in Runnels County, according to Barbara Evans, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$787,084 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) totaled \$131,831. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of

potential clients and non-clients and issues the Lone Star Card.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of the TANF to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$2,515,488 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$676,507 for Medicaid-related services and \$118,338 for non-Medicaid-related services," Ms. Evans said.

March for Jesus is Saturday, June 2

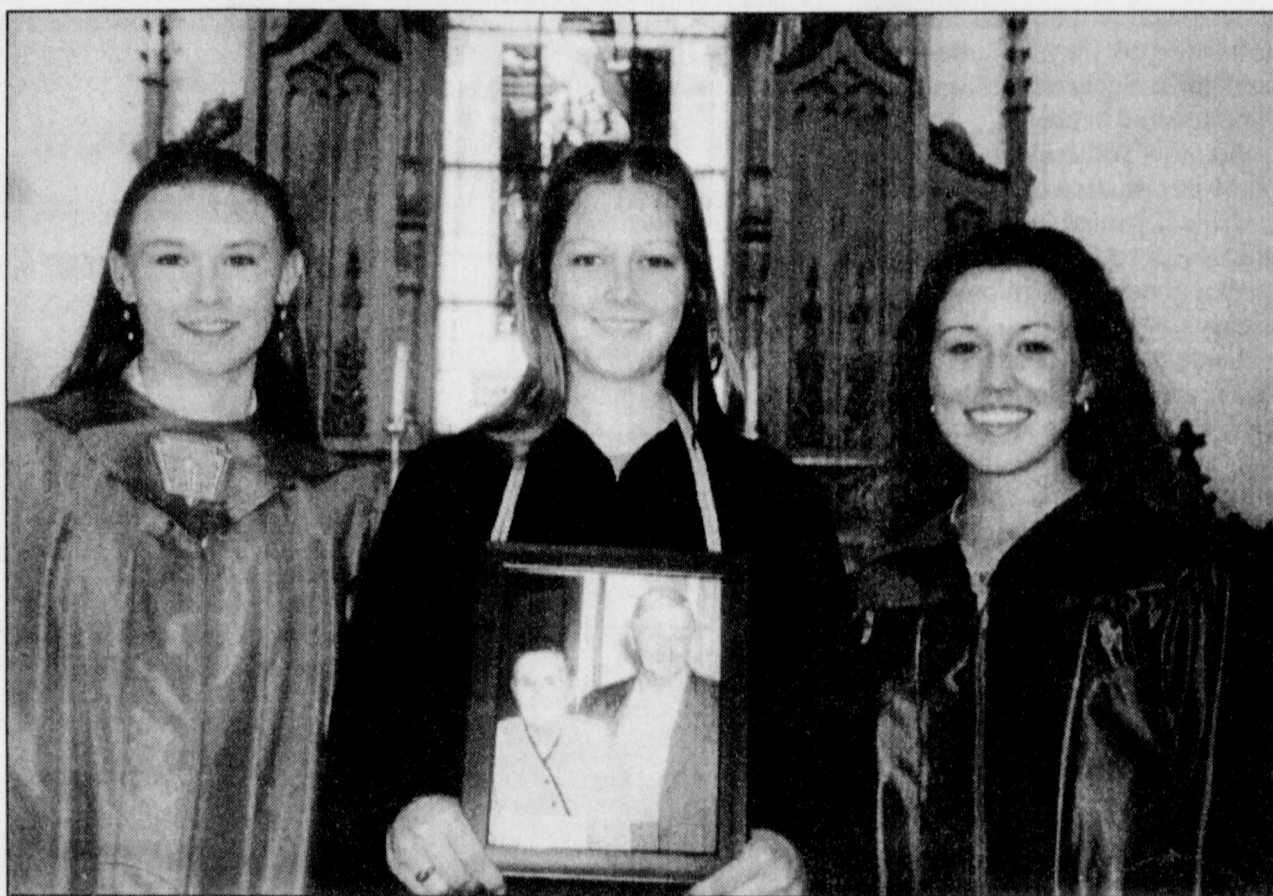

Runnels County's top students find academic honors are in their genes

With graduation time fast approaching it's come to my attention there must be something in these families' genes—some high powered knowledge passed down from generation to generation.

The fact that Runnels County has three valedictorians, three salutatorians, and one highest ranking boy is not news out of the ordinary. But what is interesting is the fact that all three valedictorians are cousins and descendants of Runnels County agricultural pioneers, Gus and Bertha Pruser. The story continues with an in-

teresting twist about the background of these honored high school graduates and the additional comparisons of the salutatorians and highest ranking boy.

Runnels County Valedictorians

Lori Bredemeyer graduates at the top of her class of Winters High School with a GPA of 97.495. She is the daughter of Rodrick and Jill Bredemeyer of Winters. She plans to attend Abilene Christian University to major in journalism with a minor in music.

Hailey Hausseker will graduate first in the Class of 2001 at Ballinger High School with a GPA of 104.25. She is the daughter of Joey and Gwenn Hausseker of Rowena. She plans to attend

Angelo State University to major in chemistry for a future career as a pediatrician.

Amy Geistmann is the number one graduate at Miles High School with a GPA of 96.47. She is the daughter of Doris Geistmann of Ballinger and the late Ted Geistmann. She will attend the University of Texas at Austin to major in genetic research.

Pruser Family Ties

Hailey's mother and Amy's father are brother and sister making them first cousins. They are the granddaughters of Tina Thormeyer Geistmann and great-granddaughters of Lela Pruser Thormeyer, one of Gus and Bertha Pruser's eight children.

City pool to open (maybe)

During their regular meeting Monday night, members of the Winters City Council voted to pen the city swimming pool.

Jack Davis, Jr., City Water Superintendent, reported after a visual inspection of the pool, that he could not see any major cracks or places needing repair. Davis did point out, however, that until the pool is filled with water, there is no way to determine if any leaks are present.

Glen Hoppe, Jr., local resident, is donating the 100,000 gallons of water needed to fill the pool. The water will be pumped from Hoppe's wells into the Winters water treatment plant.

Council members voiced their appreciation to Hoppe for the donation and noted that this will be the only way that the pool will be allowed to open in light of the continuing water shortage.

The pool, which has been dry since the summer of 1999, may possibly have leaks within the underground pipeworks or some other undetectable leak which will prevent it from holding water.

Davis said if the pool is in good condition and will hold water, that a very minimal amount of water is required to maintain the quality and quantity.

City Administrator Aref Hassan said that the opening date for the pool will depend on when a pool manager and certified lifeguards can be hired. Advertising for these positions has been placed in this week's issue of *The Winters Enterprise*. See POOL, page 3

Due to the Memorial Day holiday on May 28, *The Winters Enterprise* has changed deadlines for the May 31 edition.

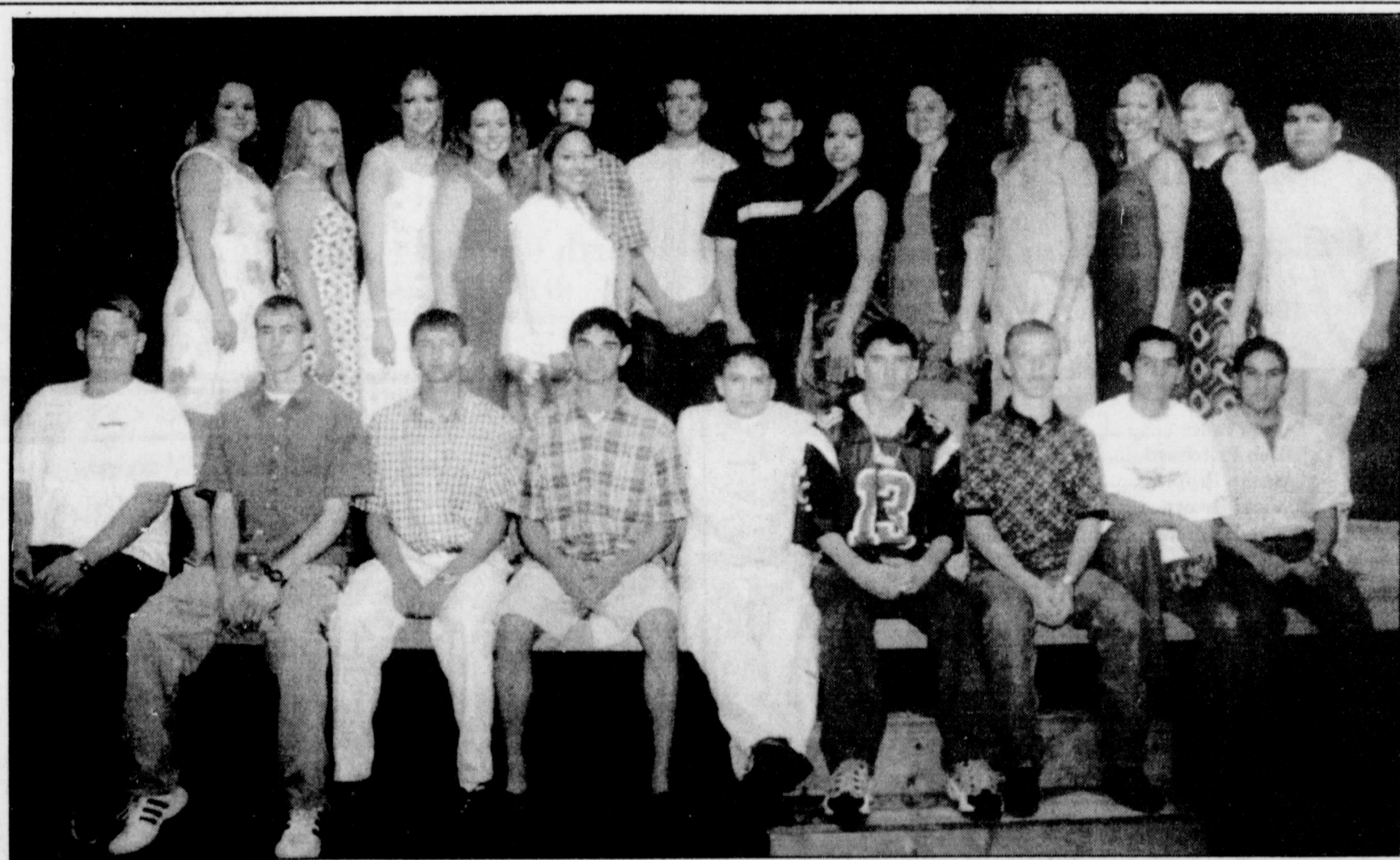

Oil Bidness

We continue with our discussion of what it takes to drill a well. We left off last time with a typical "oil and gas finder" having completed the process of picking a location and now building a case to support the expenditures required to drill a well.

He or she has used their technical expertise to take geological and engineering data, process it, and use it to project expectations for a new well. Once the case for why a well will encounter oil and/or gas of some significance is created, there must be some economic justification, as well.

Usually, a projection of expected production is made, along with operating costs, drilling costs, and other expenditures required to drill, complete, and produce the well. This projection is combined with price forecasts, cost inflation forecasts (if desired), and tax implications to show a return on the cost of drilling. If the return, however measured, is sufficient to meet the requirements of the company spending the money, then the well is approved for drilling.

Now, certain regulatory matters must be accommodated, including drilling permits, environmental impact plans, and contingency plans and permits. This usually takes several weeks or months. Once this is done according to principles and practices of the oil field in question, one is ready to start putting together the parts of the work plan that will allow a well to be drilled, completed, and (hopefully) produced.

First, you have to have the rights to drill. If you don't already own the lease for the property on which you want to drill, you have to send out someone (like a landperson, lease scout, or equivalent) to secure the lease for the property where you will drill. The negotiation of a lease is a topic in itself that we will save for another time. Let's move forward assuming the deal is done.

Now, you need a rig to drill the hole. And, you need pipe to complete the well (casing, tubing, etc.), so you contract for some. You also need to arrange for logging a well, perhaps someone to

mudlog the well while it is drilling, a company to provide cement for setting casing, and a company to perforate a well if it looks favorable. There are a ton of things you have to arrange or it won't get done, and my list is, by no means, exhaustive. That's why a drilling superintendent or company man is worth their weight in gold.

Finally, you are ready to "turn to the right," and the well starts drilling.

Drilling a well is always a test of faith, courage, and perseverance. There will be well kicks, stuck pipe, lost tools, absent service companies, weather delays, and some inevitable bad luck. Eventually, the well will get to bottom.

The task can be daunting, but, for the ones that do it successfully, they never give up, they never assume a well will be their last dry hole, nor do they assume they can't miss. Successful oil and gas people know better.

So, now you are armed with a bit of information on how a well is drilled. I must confess this is the "abridged" version, but don't let that give you the impression it is easy.

I only talked about the process, and it made me tired. Others out there make it really happen every day, and their skills can make it look easy but don't be fooled. They are truly professionals in a very complicated business.

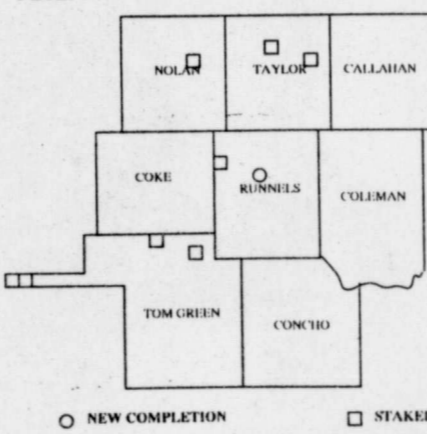

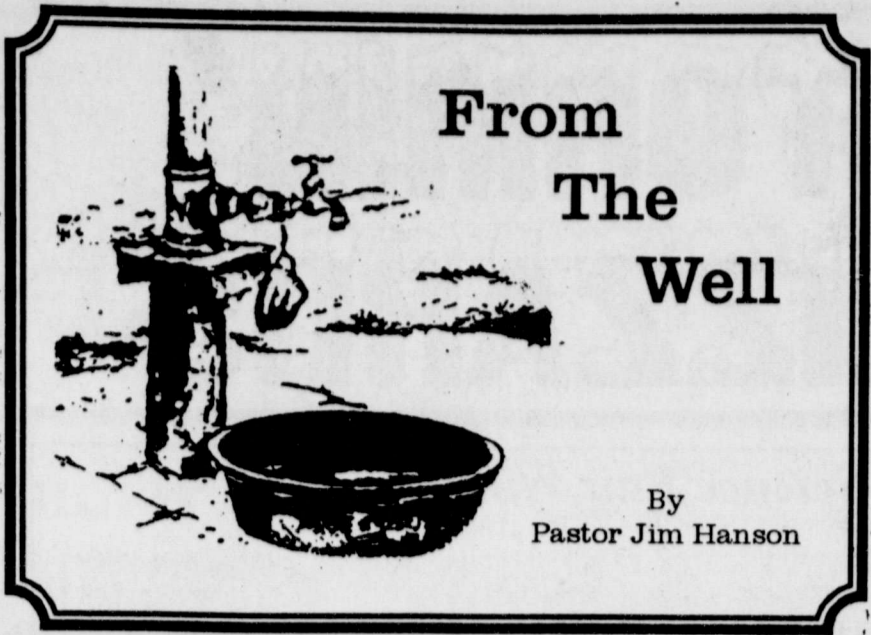

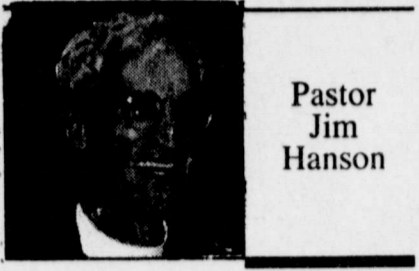

From The Well

This past week, Ramona and I found ourselves in a classroom. At St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Abilene.

No, we are not taking a class for membership there. Rather we were in a class called 55 Alive/Mature Driving. Sponsored by

American Association of Retired Persons.

The good folks at St. Paul's opened their doors to us and gave us the use of a classroom for four hours a day, two days in a row. There were about 20 of us, all retired. Nobody in the room was under 55, and quite a few were older than Ramona and me. Our instructor was Joe Houser, who has been teaching this course for many years... I think he said it was 18. He was really a fine instructor. patient. Kind. Understanding. And, "one of us"... retired and "mature."

He put us at ease right away by having us read the first chapter. Right away we started to laugh as we read some actual statements taken from Police Reports by some of those over 55 like us. Here they are:

"I collided with a stationary truck coming the other way."

"Coming home, I drove into the wrong house and collided with a tree I don't have."

"My car was legally parked as it backed into the other vehicle."

"An invisible car came out of nowhere, struck my vehicle, and vanished."

"The telephone pole was approaching fast. I was attempting to swerve out of its path when it struck my front end."

That was truly a "wake up call," for us even as our bellies shook with laughter, there were moments in our driving when we had barely escaped such kind of accidents.

It seems that as we age, we do have things going on in our bodies that make it seem like strange things are going on. Our vision starts to go. Our hearing gets worse. Our reaction time isn't as good. The number one traffic violation for us over 50 is "following too closely." And number 2 is "improper left turn."

So, we got into it for two sessions. We were provided a very good workbook, and we worked our way through it. It really covered the ground. Some of the chapter headings were "Judging Yourself," "Physical Changes," "Potential Trouble Spots"... like car phones, parking lots, backing up, and blind spots... where we don't see the care coming around us... on either side. One chapter was on Aggressive Driving/Road Rage. And we had to put that shoe on our foot, as well as those who seem to enjoy bugging us.

And then there were "Safety Considerations," "Signs... like 'Stop,' 'School Crossing,' 'No Passing'... what are the shapes and what are the colors?," "Taking Care of Your Vehicle... is it safe?," "Intersections," "The Freeway" (which I often refer to as the Valley of the Shadow of I-20), and a really good chapter on that moment that most of us don't even want to face "Driving Retirement." Why should it be so hard to "give up" my driving? I believe it's because most of us think that if we can't drive any more, we don't have our independence. I once knew a man who told his wife, me, and others, that when the time came he was not allowed to drive anymore, "I will commit suicide." And he did. Which was tragic. Most of the time it is our failure to depend on God and others that gets us into trouble. If I live so long that I can't drive anymore, I hope that I will see it as a "gift," a time of preparation. A training in "how to depend" on God.

There are reasons for the course being important. There are 50,000 drivers in the four county area surrounding Abilene who have had no driver training. Those of us who are 55 and older are involved in more crashes per mile than drivers 30-49. And, besides, if you take the course, most insurance companies will give you a 10% discount on your premium.

In Scripture, we don't have rules for driving donkeys or camels. I know of no speed zones. Life was pretty much at a walking pace. But we are admonished to love another as Christ loved us. I can't quite picture Him doing road rage. Or tailgating. Or anything like that. I can picture Him being "careful and considerate." And telling us, "Please don't drive faster than your angels can fly."

I can even imagine Him saying, "When you get in your car, and buckle up, take me along. Let me ride with you. And whatever you need to make this trip enjoyable, ask me. And make the highways... Heavenly!" Amen.

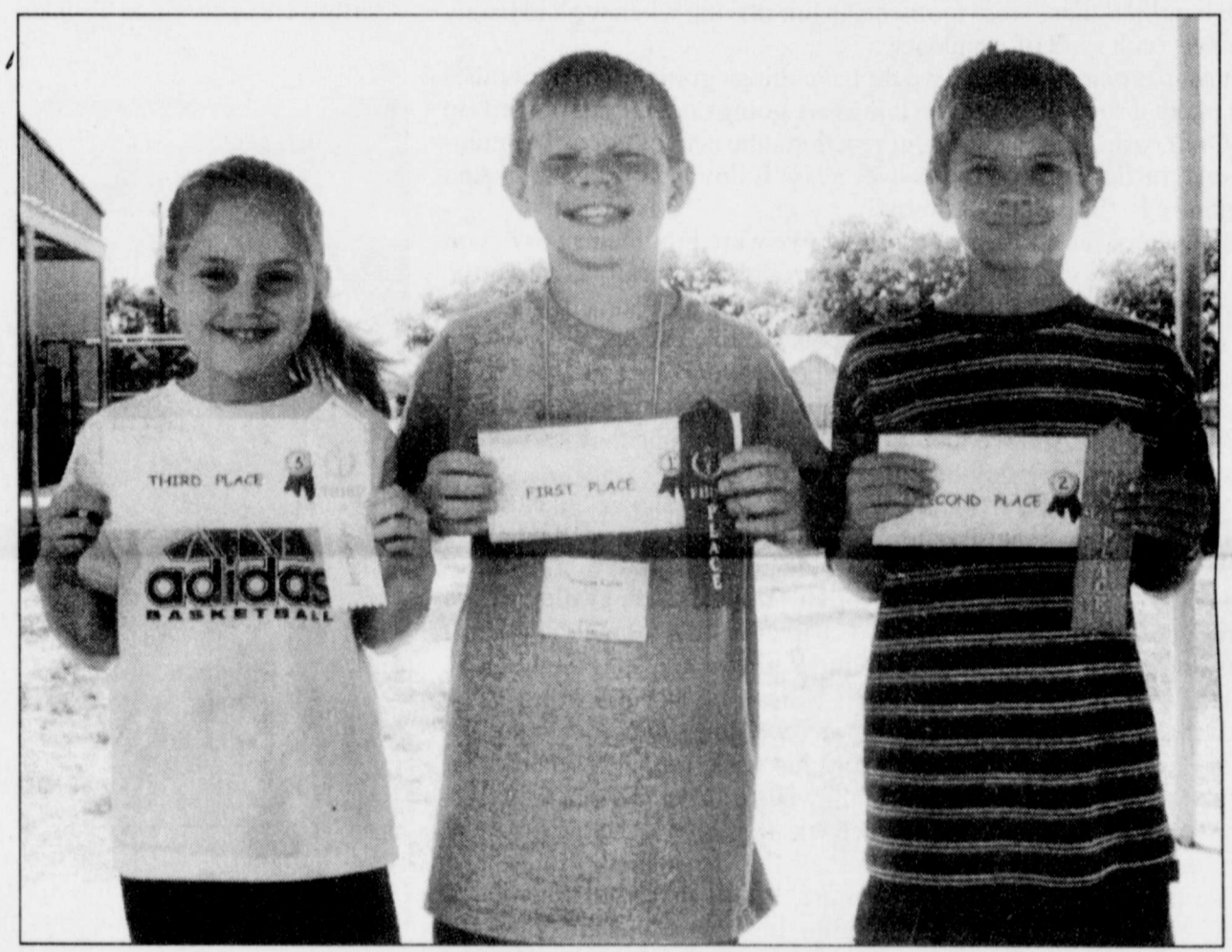
Lynette's mother (Stefany's grandmother) Joan Gesch, was salutatorian at LaCoste High School near San Antonio in 1952.

Jessica batted 417 in district play and had 7 RBIs.

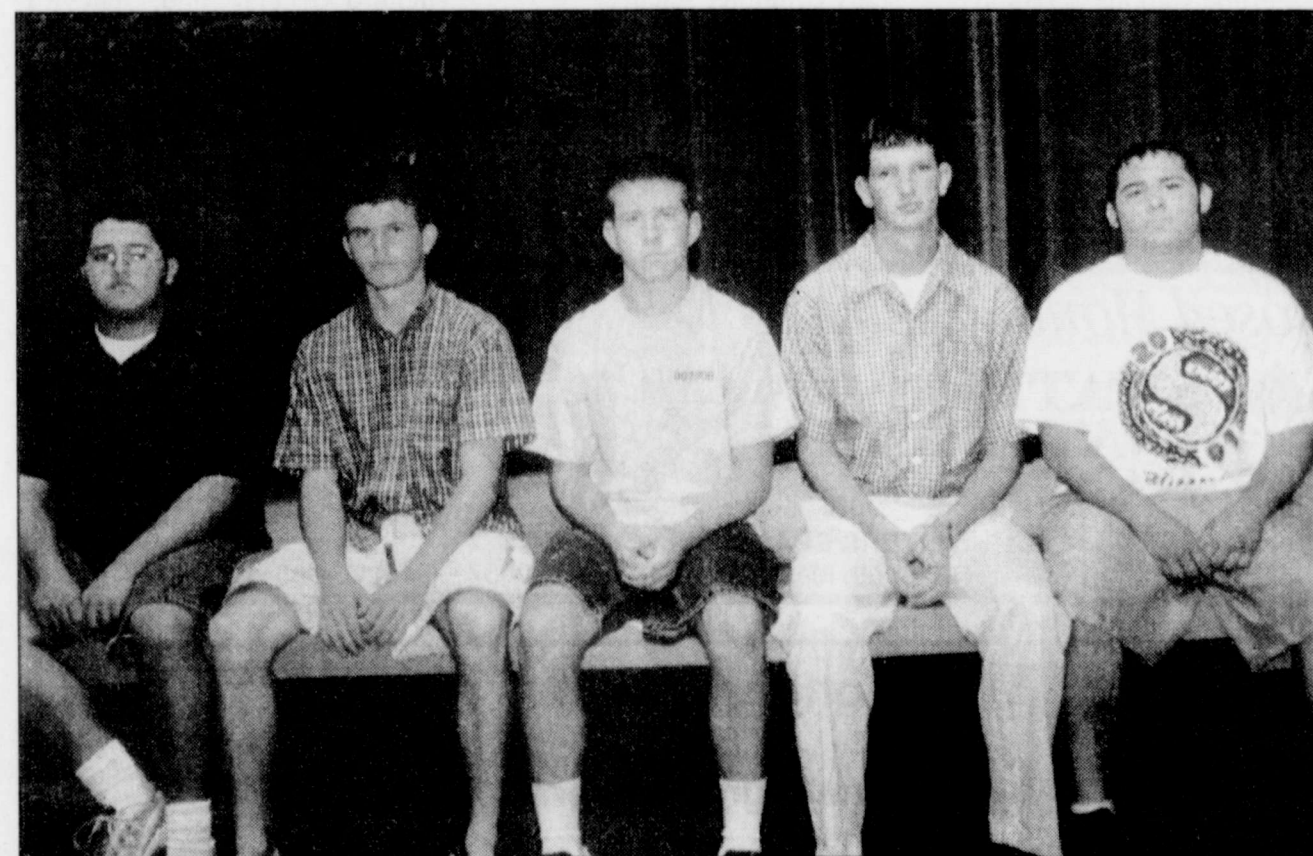
Batting 343 in district play, Amy anchored 7 double plays during the season and had 7 RBIs.

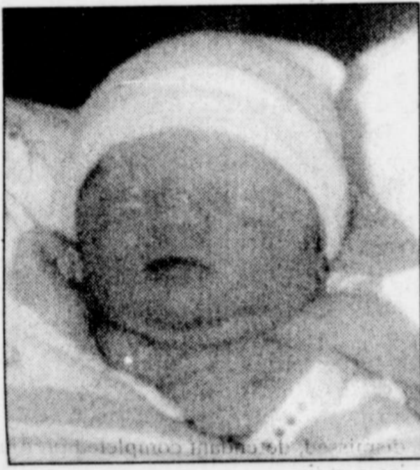

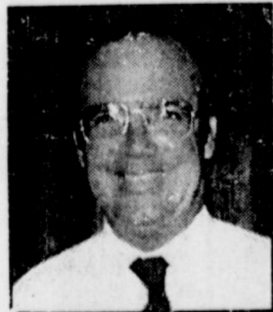

Bill Grissom inducted into McMurry Hall of Honor

Thirty five years after he left the campus, McMurry University still remembers William (Bill) Grissom.

Last month the Abilene school remembered in a special way. Grissom, whose mother Adeline and a brother Steve, live in Ballinger and who grew up and again lives in the Crews area, was inducted into McMurry's Hall of Honor.

He was one of three athletes so honored in an April 28 ceremony, a Hall that includes such names as Grant Teaff, the former Baylor University, McMurry, and Angelo State coach.

Grissom spent his adult life as a coach, earning a West Texas-wide reputation for rebuilding reputation for rebuilding football programs.

These days he says he's retired from the profession, but through the spring he drove back and forth to Coleman to help coach the school's track athletes. Then last weekend, some of his pupils performed at the state track meet in Austin.

Grissom, who just turned 58 last week, was an athlete of many skills at Winters High School, then took his football and track talents to McMurry, competing there 1961-65.

He knew, even before leaving high school, that coaching was where he wanted to be.

"L.G. Wilson (Grissom's high school coach at Winters) had a lot to do with me wanting to be a coach," Grissom said. "I always loved athletics. It (coaching) is about the only thing I thought

about. I felt it was the best thing I could do."

After finishing at McMurry, Grissom started his coaching career in junior high at Breckenridge. He moved from there to Winters for three years and Floy-

dada for four years as Wilson's assistant.

Grissom coached 12 years at Hamlin, eight of them as head coach, then followed as head man at Breckenridge seven years, Stanton for four, and Colorado City for three.

He tried to retire at Crews but returned at Coleman for two seasons. Again, he revived playoff interest, just as he had done at the other schools.

Breckenridge had been down when he arrived there, but he led the Buckaroos back to the playoffs. Stanton had been something like 1-19 before he arrived. The school went to the playoffs while he was there, then later won state after he moved on to Colorado City.

When he retired from the sidelines, he returned to Crews and now lives "200 yards from the house where I grew up."

Grissom compiled a 160-90-2 winning record, so does he miss coaching?

"I miss the (association with) kids, and I miss (the excitement of) Friday nights," he said recently. "I still try to go to games. I've gone to a bunch at Coleman since I know so many of the kids there. I've been to games at Colorado City and Stanton" since retiring.

Grissom admits you put up with some headaches, such as overzealous parental involvement. But, the goods far outweighed the not-so-goods ...

"It's all I've done for 25 years."

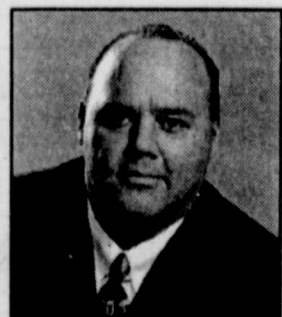

Surveys from pecan nut casebearer pheromone traps established in Runnels County indicate that the time to treat for this pest is now.

The first eggs were found May 14 and first significant nut entry should have occurred around May 16-18. Therefore, treatments should be made between May 17-24. This date is much earlier than normal.

Commercial pecan growers will need to continue monitoring pheromone traps and egg laying after the first treatment.

A second application may be needed this year. Trap numbers are very high and significant nut loss could occur.

Many pecan trees were stressed severely last year with the extreme heat and dry weather conditions. These trees do not need a heavy fruit load this year or it will further stress the tree.

It is recommended to foliar apply zinc to the trees several times during the earlier part of summer. This will encourage good shoot growth and expand leaf area. This is a year the trees will need lots of water and fertilizer to increase vigor and root

growth. We lost 30 to 40 percent of our root system last year due to drought. Be sure to remove dead wood from the trees to prevent borer damage later and this will also promote growth.

There have been several questions on what pesticides to use for pecan nut casebearer control. A short summary of insecticides labeled for pecan and their uses are:

Lorsban® 4E, chlorpyrifos, provides good control of most insects and good to fair aphid control. It is labeled for black pecan aphids, hickory shuckworm, pecan nut casebearer, phylloxera, fall webworm, and spittlebug. It is also labeled for yellow pecan aphids in combination with pyrethroid insecticides.

Sevin®, carbaryl, has several formulations. Early season applications tend to flair aphids and mites. Sevin® provides excellent control of pecan weevils.

Thiodan®, endosulfan, is labeled for black pecan aphids, pecan nut casebearer, and spittlebug. It is highly toxic to cattle, both oral and dermal. It is also highly toxic to humans.

Dipel®, bacillus thuringiensis, and other Bt products provide

good control of pecan nut casebearer, fall webworms, and walnut caterpillar. These biological materials are very easy on beneficial insects and will not flare secondary pests. Residual is short-lived.

Confirm®, Asane®, Fury®, Malathion, and Javelin are also labeled.

Before using any products you are not familiar with, be sure and read the label carefully for rates to use, mixing instructions, and precautionary statements.

Zinc should be applied to foliage of pecan trees when applying an insecticide for casebearer control. Regular zinc applications are needed for good development of pecans. When applying zinc, coverage is important because zinc does not translocate in the tree.

Symptoms of zinc deficiency are small leaves and rosette shoots. Elemental zinc is toxic to most plants other than pecans and grapes; therefore, avoid drift. Never spray young trees that are not actively growing.

TDA to hold public hearing on boll weevil quarantine

The Texas Department of Agriculture will hold a public hearing in San Angelo on Tuesday, May 29, on proposed changes and new rules establishing a boll weevil quarantine in Texas. The hearing will be at 11 a.m. at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center — 7887 U.S. Highway 87 North in San Angelo.

The proposed quarantine regulations restrict movement of regulated items, such as cotton harvesting and hauling equipment, vehicles and raw cotton, from areas of Texas that still have boll weevils into boll weevil eradication zones that have been declared suppressed, functionally eradicated, or eradicated.

"Texas cotton farmers are beginning to win the war against boll weevils — one of the most devastating pests in American agriculture," Agricultural Commissioner Susan Combs said. "The quarantine helps reduce the risk of reinfestation in zones where cotton farmers have devoted their time and effort over the past six to seven years to eradicate the boll weevil."

There are currently 11 active boll weevil eradication zones in Texas covering 6 million acres. The Southern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone was declared functionally eradicated in September 2000.

Under the proposed changes, functionally eradicated means inspectors have found no evidence of reproducing boll weevils in cotton fields in the zone. A suppressed zone can have some reproducing boll weevils present in quantities of .025 weevils or less per trap per week during the growing season. An eradicated area means inspectors have not found any boll weevils for at least one growing season.

The proposed rule changes were published in the Texas Register on May 4. TDA will take public comment through June 4, 2001. Written comments can be submitted to Ed Gage, TDA's coordinator for IPM and Citrus Programs, at P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711, or fax at (512) 463-1104.

Stewards of the Soil

Theft of lake water

There is a lot of water theft going on—theft of city water. And it is big time. A fellow named *Tamaarix* and his buddies are the culprits. They are getting the water largely from around the back end of the Winters Lake and nobody seems to notice it happening.

Tamaarix is the fancy name for saltcedar. Many of us do not realize what these plants are capable of doing. The following is a quick review. One mature saltcedar can use up to 200 gallons of water per day—five to ten times more than a big mesquite. Its roots can easily penetrate 25 to 30 feet—usually into the ground water table.

A solid saltcedar stand like those found around parts of the Winters Lake can use from 3 to 5 acre feet of water per acre per year. Saltcedar accumulates salt from the ground and deposits it beneath the plant. The salt buildup actually kills other plants.

One saltcedar can disburse 500,000 seeds in a season—both wind and water borne. It is also a prolific root sprouter. It is believed an east coast nurseryman made the first introduction of saltcedar into North America. The plant has now invaded 1.5 million acres including the entire drainage of our own Colorado River. Saltcedar rates along with fire ants as an expensive pest of the worst kind.

Let us try to calculate how many dollars this plant could be costing the City of Winters. Winters residents pay around \$3.00

per 1000 gallons of water. We in the country pay North Runnels Water Supply Corp. (NRWSC) approximately \$8.60 per 1000 gallons for city furnished water (not counting the monthly charge).

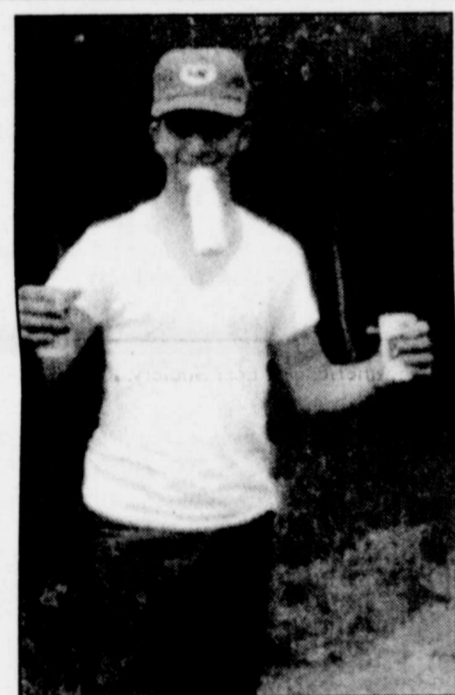
According to one source, the city uses from 13 to 17 million gallons per month (approximately 40 to 50 acre feet). Realize too there is a lot of brush using the water around the two Winters lakes besides saltcedar.

Assume the saltcedar would cover 100 acres of city land. Remember saltcedar can use from 3 to 5 acre-feet per year—we will calculate using the 4 acre-feet. Let's use the \$3.00 per 1000 gallons and not the \$8.60 from NRWSC. Thus one acre-foot of water would cost Winters residents \$977.55. The 4 acre-feet used by one acre of saltcedar could have a value approaching \$3,910.65 a year. This times the estimate of 100 acres of saltcedar could approach \$391,020.00 for the water used by this pest and not by folks in Winters.

Another way to evaluate is "if" just the saltcedar were removed (not considering all the mesquite and other brush infesting the area) there would conceivably be 83 percent more water available from either the lake or from city wells for use during these dry times.
