City Council hires new police officer

With the exception of hiring a new police officer for the City of Winters, City Councilmen tabled most agenda items during Monday night's meeting.

Officer Kimberlie Hayes of San Angelo was hired as the newest member of the Winters Police Force, and will join the department in two weeks.

Choco, the drug-sniffing dog, was presented with his retirement papers from the City of Winters, and was honored for "keeping his nose to the ground and being a police officer of a rare breed."

Becky Roberts with Davis, Kinard & Co., presented the audit report for the fiscal year 2000-2001. She related that everything was in good order and that the "city employees had done a good job" with the city's accounting.

The Council approved the audit report.

Commissioners approve purchase of radar devices

sioners approved the purchase of three Stalker radar speed measurement devices from Applied Concepts, Inc. for the sheriff's department at their special meeting on Tuesday.

Commissioners had discussed the lease/purchase of the radars at their regular meeting last week, but delayed action until this week to buy the machines. Cost of the three units totals \$7,185 and will be paid with equal amounts from the road and bridge funds from each of the commissioner's precincts and from the sheriff's department budget.

In other business on the agenda, Commissioners accepted the Bloodborne Pathogen Exposure Control Plan for the county. County Judge Marilyn Egan told the group, "We are passing this mandated program in as limited a scope as we can." She estimated the total cost of the program to be around \$7,000. The program will be limited to the Sheriff's

Commissioners also approved entering into an agreement between the county and Carnegie Library in Ballinger. The county agreed to pay the library \$4,950 for the 2002 year; which includes elevator maintenance at the library.

The county also approved entering into an Interlocal Agreement for Information Resources and Technologies. The program is being implemented by the Texas Association of Counties and is at no cost to the county. Commissioner Keith Collom said his understanding of the program was the county could log onto a site on the Internet and get data on all counties in the state.

The group appointed Susan Jacob as the Information Resources Manager for Runnels County in conjunction with the program.

All commissioners were present for the special meeting on Tuesday.



Oil Bidness

It's time, again, for my annual prognostication exercise. No, it is not something recommended by my doctor for losing weight.

However, it is a good way to look foolish, I'm afraid. But, I've never let that stop me before!

Before I make my predictions for the coming year's product prices, let's cover a little history.

If you haven't watched prices closely over the last twelve months, there are few things you may have missed. Over the last 365 days, oil prices have been as high as \$32 per barrel and as low as \$17 per barrel. Meanwhile, natural gas prices have dropped from highs near \$6 per thousand cubic feet to less than \$2 in some local markets.

Oil and gas prices have flattened at just under \$20 and \$2.50, respectively, but there is an uneasiness that pervades coffee shop talk these days. Everyone agrees (or fears) that prices are subject to much downside risk.

I tend to agree but with a twist.

I think oil prices will fall as a result of reduced worldwide demand brought about by a lingering recession in the U.S. I don't see the recession ending until the second half of the 2002. With that assumption, the psychology is there for traders to let prices fall with every bit of bad news on the U.S. economy.

Gas prices will follow suit, exacerbated by the Enron debacle. Despite comments to the contrary, a strong open trading market for natural gas and, its stepsister in the market, electricity instilled confidence in producers and con-

But, the twist is this: the lower prices won't last more than a quarter. I think prices, and the economy, will rebound by the end of 2002.

What about specifics, you say?

OK. Oil prices will drop to \$15 per barrel sometime during the first half of the year. Gas prices will flirt with \$1.50 per million cubic feet. But, by December oil prices should reach the \$20 level again and gas prices will pull closer to \$3.

That's it. Do not, I repeat, do not take these predictions to the bank-figuratively or literally. I have been so wrong so many times, that this yearly column is worth more in entertainment value than anything else.

Many read it just to see how wrong I can be this time around.

But, with that said, you never know, even a stopped clock is right twice a day ...



Recently I read an article in one of my professional magazines, "Governing." The title of the article is "Small Town Prophets." The author is Alan Ehrenhalt. He brings examples from three authors for his point which is hope for small communities. Those authors are thank the judges, sponsors, Granville Hicks, Baker Brownell, and Rich-

Ehrenhalt documents that "in 1910, 62 peryear's Christmas parade a huge cent of Americans lived in communities with success. We couldn't have populations of 10,000 or less. In 1950, the figure was down to 48 percent. By 1990, it was 18 percent."

On the bright side: "The 1990s, however provided a surprise. Last year's Census data I wish to thank my friends are now in, and show conclusively that while and patients who showed their small town America isn't booming, it has begun a mysterious comeback.

"Altogether, there are 2303 counties in the United States that the Census labels as rural or "non-metropolitan." In the 1980s, a majority of them lost population. In the 1990s, threequarters of them gained people. They experi-

Until recently, this was not an option for most people for reasons of technology and communication. But the Internet, e-mail and the laptop computer have removed many of the obstacles.

Ehrenhalt uses the 9-11 tragedy as an example of being in big cities and concludes: " I am reasonably sure that millions of people will look at the situation another way, and decide that safety, security, comfort and community all dictate moving to a smaller place somewhere far from the skyscrapers, where they will know and trust their neighbors, and where quiet, walkable main streets can play the role that city neighborhoods used to play in their lives." They are welcome.

West Texas is like its mesquite trees. Although they look thirsty, their roots are way down in water and will survive for a long time.

Winters is the heart of West Texas with deep roots.

Let us work together to grow even stronger in 2002.




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

"What's the matter with you, kid? Were you born in a barn?" I don't recall how many times I had that question hurled at me. When I was a kid, living up north. In Brookings, South Dakota. Of course, there was a reason. It was winter time. Up north,

anytime after Halloween until Memorial Day in the spring was winter. I can still remember a blizzard that hit that town on November 11. I think it was in 1941. It lasted for four days. You couldn't see fifty feet ahead of you, and sometimes not even five. Almost all the time in winter it was cold. And the reason I was so questioned was because... I had left the door open. For whatever reason ... and the cold air rushed in . And it sure cooled off the locker room in a hurry...with the guys standing around, half naked. The icy blast seemed to freeze their knees and other parts of their bodies, but it sure ignited their wrath. "Hey kid...SHUT THE DOOR ... YOU BORN IN A BARN?"

I often wondered why it made me feel so bad..."born in a barn." It must have been some questioning of my birth place. Nobody would want to be born in a barn. As I grew older, I thought about what it would be like to have your birth certificate list as your birth place ... a barn, 7 miles north of Bemidji, Minnesota on County Road N. How awful! Or, even worse, it might suggest that there was something about my parents that was out of order ... maybe I was born too soon. Or maybe my dad couldn't afford a house for us to live in.

As a matter of fact my oldest brother Paul was born in an old vacant bank building. There was no parsonage for my folks when they moved to a northern Minnesota town called Middle River. And they were poor. But it was a shelter, and he was born there with a mid-wife doing the delivery and my dad bringing the hot water from the stove. No running water, no indoor toilet facilities, no real kitchen, or bedroom. Kind of like a barn.

As I grew older, and went to college... I remember on Christmas Eve, when my dad was preaching. And he spoke of Jesus, as one who was born in a barn. And it changed my thinking. About the thorny old question, "Hey kid, shut the door! You


Until this year. A poem found me. Written by Leslie Leyland Fields. The title is:" Let the Stable Still Astonish." Here it is:







Air Force Airman 1st Class Oscar Martinez Jr. has graduated from basic military training at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas.



Bio-terrorism in Runnels County

think we are immune to the effects of terrorism. It is easy for us to think we are so far back in the sticks and so removed from the awful things that have happened in New York that terrorism does not affect us. It is just not so!

It is true the actual acts of terrorism, although terrible, affect very few people directly. However, the economic ripple touches us all. It has negative economic effects to most other countries as well. There are some things we terrorism at its worse. It did not are not immune to-let's look at a few.

Anthrax

We here in Runnels County have lived with anthrax since we first set foot on the soil. In fact, anthrax has been here probably as long as animals have walked the earth. Folks familiar with livestock and wildlife have always been aware of its presence. Not normally a problem to most of us, it is important to know a eryone that raises cattle. Ironi- one teaspoon can kill 100 adult little about this fast acting disease.

All livestock including cattle, sheep, goats, and pigs can succumb to its effects along with dogs, cats, and most grazing species of wildlife. Predators are not immune but can normally recover. The spores are not affected by heat or cold and can live in the soil for at least 35 years (Western Livestock Journal, Dec 2001). Anthrax can be ingested in contaminated meat. Insect bites can inject the spores. The spores survive best in soils with a pH higher than six—Runnels County calcareous soils usually run a pH of 7 to even as high as 8. Spores survive better under drought conditions

Ironically, good soil steward-

Some folks here in West Texas ship can help prevent the spread of anthrax.

> Scientists consider the spores always present in the soil. Overgrazing force livestock to eat closer to the ground and thus ups the ante of being exposed. Even plowing causes naturally occurring spores to become airborne by dust and aeration.

> What has really hurt the folks in the northeast is that a lab somewhere has refined the aeration aspects and concentrated the spores into a fine and easy airborne dustaffect many people, but as a result the entire country became apprehensive.

Mad Cow Disease

Mad Cow Disease or BSE is something we do not want. Even one confirmed case in the United States will probably cause devastation in the livestock industry. Even one terrorist sneaking in the very cause. We cause it by feeding ground up animal parts from affected animals to our poison as far back as 1972. Howgrowing cattle-we need to quit ever, concerned groups think that practice.

Hoof and Mouth Disease

This disease is another thing we do not want. We have experienced this disease before in this country-we know what it can do. It affects just about everything with a split hoof. Domestic livestock can be isolated and slaughtered-not an easy job, but it could be done. However, deer, exotic wild animals, or feral hogs would be another story.

Feral hogs are especially effective at spreading the disease. Ask Freddie Grohman how difficult it would be to gather up all the feral hogs running wild here in Runnels County. I think he'd tell you it would be almost impossible and he is about as good at gathering feral hogs as anybody anywhere.

Charitable giving in Winters remains strong despite less dollars


Giving to local charities remains strong, even though some organizations are receiving less dollars in donations in 2001. Some local non-profits have seen significant declines, while others have experienced increases.

The Winters Relief Fund is up 25% at \$5,400+ from the recent mail campaign. Cash and food donations for the Winters Food Pantry are up considerably, especially with the food drive conducted by school students early in December. Donations to the Winters Ministerial Alliance are up slightly from previous years.

Most churches in the Winters area are indicating that they are seeing a slight increase in giving during 2001, a trend which continues for the past few years. There are 20 churches in the Winters area.

The greatest increase in giving has been to North Runnels Hospital Auxiliary, since there has not been a significant attempt to raise funds in recent years. Over \$7,000 was raised at the December 9 benefit and with other donations to the hospital, the total is now over \$13,000. A donation campaign will be held after the first of the year to help North Runnels Hospital.
