cies of wildlife. Predators are not immune but can normally reimmune but can normally re-
cover. The spores are not affected by heat or cold and can live in the soil for at least 35 years

States will probably cause devastation in the livestock industry. Even one terrorist sneaking in and exposing one feedlot to the
disease could wreck havoct disease could wreck havoc to ev-
eryone that raises cattle. Ironieryone that raises cattle. Ironi-
cally we livestock producers are
the very cause we the very cause. We cause it by
feeding ground up animal parts from affected animals to our
growing cattle-we need to quit that practice.
Europe and Japan are in the
throes of the disease throes of the disease at present
causing large inventories of cattle to be destroyed and large areas to be duarantined. As soon as the word got out in Japan, the supermarket chains reported up to a 70
percent reduction in the demand percent reduction in the demand

States had an outbreak, consumers would do the same to our beef
