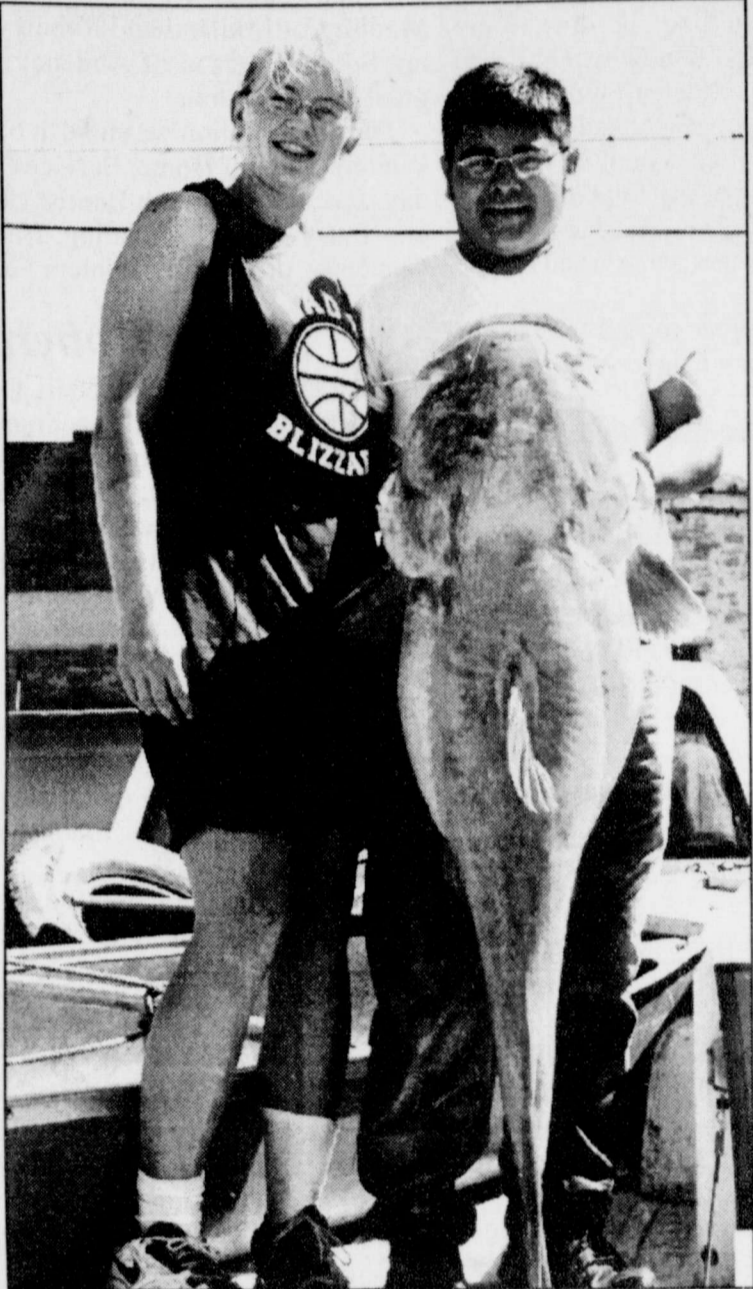

## WISD Trustees approve TIPS program, accept resignations

By the skin of its teeth, the TIPS after-school program will continue for at least another school year.

The unique program has faced an uncertain future due to financial difficulties. But because of significant debt recovery during the last months of the past school year, Trustees of the Winters ISD voted unanimously to allow the program to continue.

Program coordinator Fran Kidwell addressed the Trustees during the Monday night meeting and said she has commitments from various community members and businesses to help support TIPS, which has enrolled as many as 160 elementary students.

Elementary Principal Todd Newberry told Trustees that steps are planned to better handle the minimal payments required from parents of TIPS students. He said parents will be required to sign an agreement of payment terms, and violators will possibly be taken to small claims court.

J' Lynn Cooper, school nurse, gave numerous reports on several of the mandates required by the State concerning the health of school students. Information was given regarding hearing, vision, dental, scoliosis, and head lice screenings completed last year, as well as plans for upcoming

screenings.

Programs given to students during the 2001-02 year covered topics such as tobacco use, Having Healthy Habits, and dental care. Cooper was also involved in coordinating two blood drives through United Blood Services which helped approximately 125 local individuals. Hepatitis B and flu clinics were held for WISD staff members.

Cooper told Trustees that CPR training will be available for all teachers and staff next year at no expense to the school district.

Trustees accepted resignations from Ken and Marsha Fowler and Sherry Cavazos, and rehired under a second year probationary contract Jamie Seago as coach for boys' varsity baseball, junior varsity basketball and football. Deb Whittenburg, who has been with WISD since 1978, was named as girls' varsity basketball coach to replace Ken Fowler.

Other discussion centered on what to do about the chiller supplying air conditioning for the high school building. Superintendent Danny Clack told Trustees that three of the four compressors are now not working and the approximate cost to repair the chillers will be \$10-\$15,000 per unit. Clack also reminded them that there

are only eight weeks until teachers return for the upcoming school year. Trustees voted to put out for bids for replacing the chiller.

Principal Newberry reported an enrollment of fifty students in summer school which is being directed by Brilla Magee. The Summer Food Service Program has been having from 60-90 participants.

In other action, Trustees approved the changes to DEC Local, Personal Leave Policy for school personnel, approved an increase in the diagnostician salary schedule for 2002-03, approved a resolution for tax exemption by the Wingate Masonic Lodge, approved the 2002-03 annual agreement for CAP High School, and approved appointments of Cheryl Bryan as voting delegate and Jerry Sims as alternate to the 2002 TASB Delegate Assembly in Dallas on 9/28/02.

Manuel Vera received the oath of office as incoming WISD Trustee. Also present for the June 10 meeting were Trustees Cheryl Bryan, Shelia Paschal, Allen Andrae and Jerry Sims. Larry Walker and Bob Prewit were absent.

Andrae was re-elected as president of the Board of Trustees, Bob Prewit as vice-president, and Jerry Sims as secretary.

## Commissioners approve \$11,025 expenditure to ensure radio signals be heard throughout county

In their June 11th meeting, Runnels County Commissioners approved a bid of \$11,025 for a 120 ft. radio tower and base station for the dispatcher's office.

The City of Ballinger along with Tony King on behalf of the Ballinger Volunteer Fire Department had requested in a previous Commissioners meeting that something be done about ensuring that their radio signals reach out of the city.

The dispatch office used to be at the Ballinger Police Department, and by using a 100 ft. tower it was able to reach most of Runnels County. The dispatch office was moved to the county jail where the tower is

only 25 ft. tall. It works most of the time, but there are some places that it cannot reach.

The new 120 ft. tower and base station will allow all parts of the county to be accessed by radio.

The \$11,025 bid includes the tower, base station, headset, footswitch and a noise cancellation microphone.

After discussing the signal 120 ft. in the air, the agenda moved to 10 feet below the ground when the City of Ballinger requested a trap be installed outside of the county jail to restrict large objects from tearing up the sewer lift pump.

"Inmates flush any and everything down the commodes

and it causes problems," Sheriff Bill Baird said.

Robert Moore with Moore Plumbing suggested use of a heavy material trap made from cement with a screen. Moore stated this is what is used at other prisons to stop this problem.

Commissioners agreed that something needed to be done but thought more investigation was required about what type of trap should be built and where.

Moore was instructed to get prices on a pre-fab cement trap and also on a trap made with cement at the location.

The item was tabled until further information was ob-

tained.

Commissioner Skipper Wheelless then expressed concern about ownership and liability of the electrical outlets on the Courthouse lawn. These outlets are used for the Ethnic Festival, Christmas in Olde Ballinger, and decorating the Courthouse and square for Christmas.

Wheelless continued to say that the boxes were in need of repair and was afraid someone might be injured because of faulty, old wiring.

Wheelless had County Clerk Elesca Ocker look for any information concerning these outlets. The only thing found was

## Oil Bidness

Have you heard the latest? There really wasn't an electricity and natural gas shortage in California last year. It was all due to market manipulation by very bad guys at energy trading companies.

Fat chance. I am not denying that there may have been some bad stuff going on by some unscrupulous people. There very well might have been such things. I do have to say that everything that I have seen so far is really only evidence that there were weaknesses in the structure and regulation of the market that encouraged tricks by traders to push up prices.

But, really, that is beside the point. If there wasn't uncertainty about supply in the energy markets in California, none of the tricks or bad dealings would have been effective in driving up prices. Buyers and users are always worried about getting enough fuel in California.

This is a natural consequence of a suppressed market, where no one wants a power plant or fuel source to be developed inside of the state. This makes this area of huge consumption susceptible to supply disruptions, whatever their cause. A buyer could lose its entire source of supply if even one pipeline or one seller decides to go elsewhere.

This type of fear lights a fire under prices at the first hint of a contraction in the supply market.

The worst part about the current prevailing opinion relating to the energy crunch in California is that it allows the

state to continue its ongoing denial. Politicians there are so frantic trying to move blame for third-world-like blackouts and energy uncertainty to someone other than themselves, that truth is nowhere to be found.

Examination of that truth would show that the state is unbalanced. It pursues economic growth and the elite title that goes with it, but it pushes any undesirable (in a Californian's eyes) effects outside of its boundaries. In this way, California wants all the gain but none of the pain.

In fact, by pushing out most development of energy supply, those against energy development for aesthetic and environmental reasons would have to admit all they are doing is pushing the bad stuff into other states. This is made all the more revealing and compelling when one understands the growing consumption of such energy that goes on there.

California is in the top ten countries (if it were one) in terms of gasoline consumption, electricity consumption, natural gas consumption, and most other types of consumption. But there is little recognition of that impact on making energy supplies tighter in California, while squeezing off sources of supply.

Oh well, I've spent more time on the West Coast than I should. Next time, we get back to the oil patch.

## From The Well

Ramona saw this article in the St. Paul paper and was so impressed that she said, "Read it." And so, I did. The title was "Degrees Mean Nothing if You Can't Pass the RAT." And having read the article, I will pass on to you some of the insights.

They are worth considering.

First of all, "The RAT" is the title of a book. It is a test, like the SAT. Only this one isn't about graduating from high school. This one is "The Real World Aptitude Test: Preparing Yourself for Leaving Home." The author is Homer E. Moyer, Jr.; Publisher: Capital Books; cost \$19.95.

Mr. Moyer is an authority. He is a lawyer and a good one. But, most important, he is the father of four children, grown or nearly grown. And the book took eight years to write, starting when his oldest child was a senior in high school. He and his wife pondered how well their firstborn would do "away from home." It was to be a lighthearted book for her. It became a project just completed.

Scored on the same 200 to 800 scale as the SAT, his exam focuses on information that helps a person maneuver through life in "things worth knowing, things it would be risky not to know, things to give you an edge." Examples: "What is the best way to dry a wool sweater?" "What has the highest concentration of alcohol: beer, grain alcohol, whiskey, or wine?" "Define the term compound interest and demonstrate how \$100.00, earning 10 percent annually, would grow." Or "Sing the first verse of the Star Spangled Banner."

The battery of questions covers 30 diverse and challenging subjects from domestic skills and electricity to gambling and the fine arts. He not only gives his test takers the questions, he also provides the answers — in the back. In great detail. And, as a bonus, is full of good humor. And, "whatever your score, it will not be mailed in an official-looking envelope to employers or colleges."

The purpose of the book, according to Moyer, "is just another way to do what so many people do: to get prepared, to get ahead, to prepare for the bumps in the road, which we all have, and to make it fun." His personal favorites are the questions on automobiles, cooking, and etiquette. "These seem to me to be the most important practically. You step out the front door and you're going to find you need to know something about all of them."

He has discovered that young people are weak in the arts, strong on computers, and "abysmally ignorant of the Bible." The section on the Bible includes a quote from the Dictionary of Cultural Literacy that "no one in the English speaking world can be considered literate without a basic knowledge of the Bible."

It's not just for seniors in high school, or seniors in college. It's for senior seniors. One of the vice-presidents at Emory University in Atlanta who took the RAT said, "I'm not about to tell you how I scored." And the president of that same university said, "I bombed."

So, me thinks Ramona and I will have to buy this RAT. There's bound to be something in this 353-page paperback primer for us to learn to do right. And, who knows, it might even spark some thoughts in our minds on how to prepare to live life in heaven — the real Real World.

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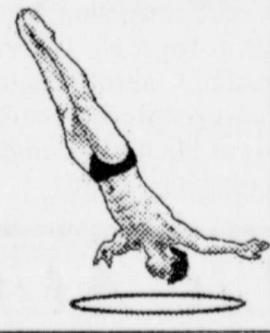

He has been a volunteer Chaplain at the Holzer Medical Center for the past eighteen years, and serves as vice-president of the Gallia County Min-

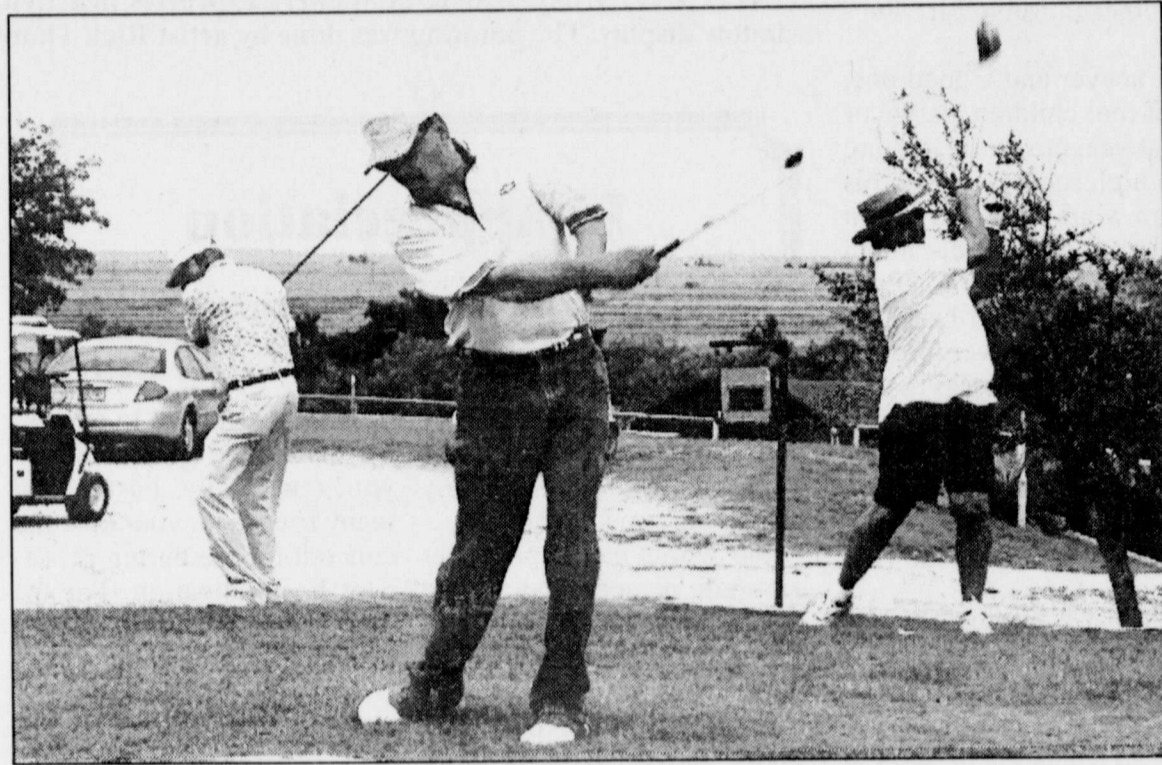
isterial Association. In the year 2000, he received the Ohio Hospital Regency Award. He is a Kentucky Colonel.

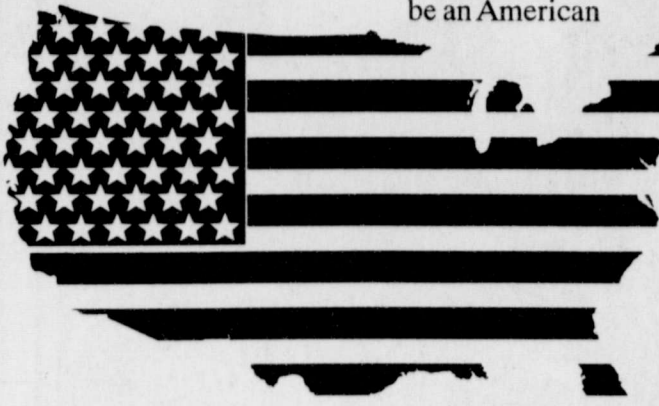

# Outdoors

## Pest Management News

by Richard Minzenmayer, Extension Agent-Entomology

### General Situation:

Cotton planting is in full swing this week. Prior to this week, cotton acreage planted was less than 10%. Cotton planting this year is two weeks later than normal. Several factors probably contribute to this later planting; one being extreme dry conditions and second an early wheat harvest. Cotton which was planted several weeks ago, has had a tough time since it has emerged. Cool night time temperatures, dry conditions and heavy thrips pressure has made plant establishment difficult. Several fields were treated this week for thrips. Remember, research has shown that the application of foliar sprays after significant thrips damage has occurred generally does not result in increased yields.

Grain sorghum and corn looks great and is progressing well with these cooler temperatures and has responded well to the improved moisture conditions where it rained last week. Greenbug numbers remain low in most fields. Most aphids found in sorghum this week are cornleaf aphids and

a large number of predators were found. This should help cotton producers later in the growing season.

### Cotton:

Cotton ranges from still in the bag to 6-7 true leaf stage. Most cotton, which is up, looks weathered. The storms last week, cool night time temperatures this week and heavy thrips pressure is making survival difficult for the young cotton plants. Scouting cotton trials this week in Tom Green and Concho Counties indicated thrips populations at 1.5-2 thrips per leaf. Most of this cotton is in the 2nd to 3rd true leaf stage. Control may be justified when the average number of thrips counted per plant is equal to the number of true leaves present. On cotyledon stage cotton, the threshold commonly used is an average of 1 to 3 thrips per plant. Orthene has provided good control of thrips at the 4 oz. per acre rate. Other recommended insecticides for thrips control include Bidrin (1-3 oz. per acre), Dimethoate 2.67 lb. (5-10 oz. per acre) and others.



**WHEAT HARVEST** seems to be coming to an end as Alan Cooper cuts a field northwest of Winters off the Drasco Highway. This year's crops have been reported as below normal due to the continuing drought and recent hail damage.

Wiley Guy, son of Barron and Donna Guy of Winters, competed in the Falls County Pig Extravaganza June 8 and 9 in Marlin, Texas.

Wiley won 6th place on Saturday with his light weight hampshire. On Sunday, he took a first place win with a light weight spot along with a second place win with his light weight hampshire.

Wiley will be a 7th grader at Winters this fall semester.

## Texas to receive \$4.6 million from USDA to beef up state defenses against foreign animal and plant diseases

The announcement that the State of Texas will receive nearly \$4.6 million from the United States Department of Agriculture as part of an effort to beef up state defenses against foreign animal and plant diseases is welcome news to Texas farmers and ranchers, said Donald Patman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

"The threat of a foreign disease like foot and mouth is all too real for Texas livestock producers," Patman said. "Such a disease could devastate the industry. These funds will be used as a front-line defense against foot and mouth disease and other animal and plant diseases that could wreak havoc on Texas agriculture."

The \$4.6 million allocated

to Texas — part of \$43.4 million in nationwide state grants to strengthen homeland security preparedness — was announced in San Antonio by U.S. Congressman Henry Bonilla, chairman of the subcommittee that funds USDA and USDA Undersecretary of Agriculture Bill Hawks.

"We applaud Congressman Bonilla's efforts in taking these actions to ensure a safe food supply for the American consumer and maintaining a strong agriculture industry," Patman said.

Hawks said \$1.8 million will go to the Lone Star State for emergency preparedness; \$458 million will go to animal disease surveillance; \$300,000 will go for plant disease detec-

tion and \$2 million will go for rapid detection and diagnostic work.

Historically, USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) has been responsible for diagnosis of foreign animal disease in this country. Currently, only one lab in New York can confirm a disease such as foot and mouth. Patman said USDA, acting in partnership with key agricultural states like Texas, would speed up response time during a foreign disease outbreak, where timely action is critical.

"Using Texas as a regional center that can diagnose a disease such as foot and mouth is just common sense," Patman said. "Through USDA's as-

sistance, Texas can bring our diagnostic labs up to speed. Training will be conducted and equipment will be in place to keep response time to a minimum."

The funds are part of the supplemental defense appropriation bill signed by President George W. Bush earlier this year.
