

Editorial

Oil Bidness by Reg Boles © 2003



In places around the world where oil and/or gas have been discovered, there are many locales that suffer from lack of infrastructure. As a result, there are big hurdles to ever making a viable economic product in those conditions. Could this happen in the United States?

Not likely, but increasingly a try in the oil patch right here at

At a recent trade show, I couldn't help but notice that every other booth was either blue or red, the favorite colors of Schlumberger and Halliburtion, respectively. These two companies have gobbled up the specialists in the business (logging companies, technical consultants, core analysis, etc.) over the last decade, and there are precious few segments of the service industry not already dominated or completely consumed by these one or both of these companies.

To a large extent, this is the natural order of things, as there is less of a pie to cut up in the service business, and only the most efficient will survive. The biggest have consolidated their position to survive and thrive in such an environment, but there is some danger of reducing competition below some healthy level in all of this. That is a topic for another time, but suffice it to say it is entirely predictable.

The smaller entities left that pump wells, stimulate and cement wells, fix electrical motors, haul water, and pull wells are struggling to cope with reduced spending in the onshore U.S. fields. Many of them are closing or being consolidated into mid-size companies, if not subsidiaries of the mega-service companies.

The result is an infrastructure, while still very well developed and accessible, spread pretty thin with great distance between service points. Some operators have to call in completion and stimulation companies from several hundred miles away, instead of 30 miles down the road. There is no grand scheme to deprive local operators of services. No, the marketplace is just putting the squeeze on the resources available against the product that can be economically put down the pipe. For some of the same reasons there is no infrastructure in the jungles of Africa or the plains and mountains of Kazakhstan, the infrastructure is only as strong and supportive as the market will allow.

Like it or not, the U.S. onshore oil and gas industry has seen reduced influence in the worldwide and participant in many differoil market. So, too, is its influent interscholastic activities, I ence reduced in creating service have a special place in my heart industry jobs and commerce. That doesn't mean that the local oil patch is ready to dry up and blow away. It just means success will require more ingenuity, more planning, and more patience.

I know the operators around here are up to it, but I also know it will make life just a little harder than it used to be.
