We will once again be stopping by the nursing homes so if you know family or friends there, be sure and take them a Jesus poster so they can feel more a part of the march.


Thank you for your prayers, support and attendance for this very special day. We pray that God's will be done in us and through us on this day and all the glory be to Jesus.



O.B. Boone, Sr.

BALLINGER-O.B. Boone, Sr., 87, passed away Wednesday, May 28, 2003, in Runnels County Rehabilitation and Nursing Center at Ballinger.

He was born November 17, 1915, at Fort Chadbourne, Coke County, Texas, to Media Henderson Boone and Bigham Bob Boone. His father was a blacksmith, and he traveled extensively with his father's work throughout Northwest and Central West Texas. He married Frances Sovey on July 5, 1936, in Stamford, where they resided for over 49 years.

Mr. Boone worked as a welder in his father's shop and later in his own shop, Boone's Welding Shop, in Stamford for many years until his retirement.

Due to his health, he moved to Ballinger, Runnels County, in 1995 and has been a resident of Runnels County Rehabilitation and Nursing Center since moving to Ballinger.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 49 years, Frances, in November 1985; his parents; two brothers, J.D. Boone and Wallie Boone; one sister, Nora Williams; and one granddaughter. Reecie Holden Leach.

Survivors include four children and their spouses, Bob Boone and wife Linda of Ballinger, Betty Bushong and husband Bob of Midland, JoAnn Head and husband C.W. of Sweetwater, and O.B. Boone, Jr. and wife Carolyn of Sweetwater; ten grandchildren, numerous great-grandchildren; three great-greatgrandchildren; two sisters, Mary Patterson and husband Connie and Wanda Burkhaulter and husband Bob, all of Midland; and numerous nieces and nephews.

INCREASE REQUEST

TXU Gas Company (the "Company"), in accordance with the Gas Utility Regulatory Act as set forth in the Texas Utilities Code, hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of rates for natural gas service to be charged to all of the customers served by the Company in the incorporated municipalities and unincorporated areas in the Company's statewide gas utility system (the "System"). The proposed revisions to the respective rate schedules will impact all classes of service and all fees and charges presently being assessed by the Company on its transmission and distribution systems. As of the filing date of the Company's Statement of Intent to change rates, the proposed rates are expected to approximately produce a \$69,524,311 or a 7.24 percent increase in the Company's annual revenues from customers in the System. The proposed change will affect approximately 1,344,030 residential, 125,603 commercial, and 1.441 industrial sales and transportation customers in the System. The proposed change constitutes a "major" change as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. The proposed changes will have differing impacts on individual customers, depending on consumption and current applicable rate schedules. The proposed changes in rates will not become effective for environs customers until similar changes have become effective within the nearest incorporated city or town. A residential customer receiving a bill for 6 Mcf will see a bill of approximately \$41.69, which would constitute an average increase of approximately \$3.59 per month or a 9.4% increase. A commercial customer receiving a bill for 30 Mcf will see a bill of approximately \$173.04, which would constitute an average increase of approximately \$13.91 per month or a 8.7% increase. The effect of the proposed changes to rates and services for industrial sales and transportation customers, which may be significant for individual customers, will vary depending on type of service and consumption. The proposed change would constitute an increase of \$0.00 or a 0% increase in annual revenues to the Company for industrial sales and transportation customers. A complete copy of the Statement of Intent, filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas and all of the System cities and towns on May 23, 2003, is available for inspection in the Company business office located at 1601 Bryan St., Dallas, Texas 75201. Persons with specific area questions or who want information about this filing may contact TXU Gas Company at 1-800-460-3030. Any affected persons located inside of the city limits of a municipality served by the Company may file written comments or protest concerning the proposed change in rates with their respective municipality. Any affected persons located outside of the city limits of a municipality served by the Company may file written comments or protest concerning the proposed change in rates with Docket Services Section of the Legal Division, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, but have a limited time to do so. Pursuant to the Rules of the Railroad Commission of Texas, Title 16 of the Texas Administrative Code Section 7.230, any affected persons may file written comments or a protest concerning the proposed change in the environs rates with the Docket Services Section of the Railroad Commission of Texas, at any time within 30 days following the date on which the change would or has become effective. The Company is proposing to have these proposed rates become effective on June 27, 2003.

Let's make a joyful noise!

Psalm 150:6-"Let everything that has breath praise the Lord."

How important is it to praise God? It is extremely important to praise Him! God inhabits the praises of His people! So where there is praise for God, God lives there!

If you are singing and praising God, so you think He's not going to show up to listen? I assure you He is, just like you would if one of your children were singing a song to you about how much they love you!

When I first started attending church I remember lots of times thinking that I wished we would hurry up and get the songs over with so we can get to the message. 

The deadline for the application is June 15.



Environmental Quality Incentives Program available

Farmers and ranchers in Runnels County have until June 13, 2003, to make application for participation in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funded through the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). These funds are part of the conservation provisions contained in the 2002 Farm Bill.

Eligible program participants may apply for cost-share assistance for eligible conservation practices that address the natural resource concerns identified by the Local Work Group. In Runnels County, the resource concern in water quantity.

Conservation practices applicable for cost share to address this resource concern include terraces as the high priority practice in Runnels County and brush management as the medium priority practice provides a practical forum for in the county. Producers will go through a screening and ranking process to determine which applications will be funded, based on the selection criteria


> set up by the local work group. Cost-share rates for financial assistance have been set at 40% for general signup participants and first time farmers and ranchers and 45% cost shares 3415, ext. 3.

are available to limited resource producers.

Additionally, funding is available to address statewide natural resource concerns including animal feeding operations, wildlife habitat, water quality, and invasive species. Runnels County producers in the eastern two-thirds of the county are available to apply for statewide money addressing bobwhite quail habitat improvement through a prescribed grazing management incentive contract. Producers could be eligible for a 6-year contract that will pay \$3.00 for two years and \$4.00 for one year that includes two full years deferment from grazing.

Valley Creek producers above Lake Ballinger are also eligible for additional cost share monies to do brush control on rangeland. Depending on the number of requests for brush control, there also could be money available for facilitating practices such as range seeding, fencing, and water development.
