

#### Resolutions Of Respect.

To the Woodmen of the World Lodge:

We, your committee on drafting a memorial to the memory of
our deceased friend and brother,
Cecil C. Earp, who lost his life
in the tragic accident that took
him from the walks of men, beg
to submit the following:

First. 
