Bronte Gets Another Highway

The Ballinger Ledger in its last week's issue gave out some information that is good news to Bronte. The State Highway Department has notified Judge Paul Trimmer of Ballinger that the Department had designated the Ballinger-Bronte Highway. Ballinger had worked to get the road designated through Wingate to Sweetwater. But, as the Bronte-Sweetwater Highway was already in existence, the route Ballinger wanted the road to go to Sweetwater would parallel the Bronte-Sweetwater Highway, hence, instead of giving Ballinger what they had asked for, the Department designated the Highway from Ballinger to Bronte so that it can connect with the Highway to Sweetwater at this point.

That simply is fine. It puts Bronte right in "the middle of things." It connects Bronte with Ballinger with a Highway, so that our people can go there to trade with less difficulty as to roads and at the same time it

puts Ballinger on an almost direct line to Sweetwater via Bronte.

The Enterprise in behalf of all our people wants to thank the Ballinger people and also the Highway Department for this "plum" we were not even expecting. Sometimes, good things come to us when we don't expect them.

When we get irrigation and the cool, refreshing waters of the Colorado are flowing down the canals and Bronte becomes a town of several thousand with beautiful homes and parks, as result of an abundance of water, our good friends at Ballinger can drive out and have lunch in our parks, enjoy the beauty and loveliness of "the old home town." "Uncle Johnny" Pruitt Dies

All our people were shocked when the telegram came to "Uncle Bill" Pruitt, Monday that his brother, J. E. Pruitt, died almost suddenly at San Antonio early Monday morning.

Larkin Pruitt had carried de. ceased to San Antonio Sunday, where he has gone each winter for some years to spend the season with his daughter, Mrs. Mary West. They reached there Sunday night and "Uncle Johnny" seemed strong as usual. In the night he called to his nephew, Larkin Pruitt, and it was not long until he was dead.

The body was brought to Bradshaw and after religious services, by Elder McMillan, a Primitive Baptist preacher, with which church deceased was affiliated, was laid away beside his wife, who died some years ago.

Deceased was born in Alabama November 21, 1849. He came to Texas in 1865. About twenty five years ago he came to this section of country settling at Bradshaw.

Deceased leaves to mourn his going two daughters, Mrs. Mary West of San Antonio and Mrs. George Davis on Oak Creek, and one son, J. W. Pruitt of Taft, Texas; he also leaves three brothers. "Uncle Johnny," as he was affectionately called by all who knew him was one of the splendid types of men of the generation to which he belonged. Being blind, every one always was kindly towards him and he was always so cheerful that it was a blessing to one always to meet him.

He is gone, but not forgotten and their many friends mingle their sorrow with the children, brothers and other relatives in this hour of their sorrow.

"Grandpa" Benson died at the home of his son, W. E. Benson, at Hamlin, Friday morning. Deceased had suffered awfully from cancer of the face for a long time. 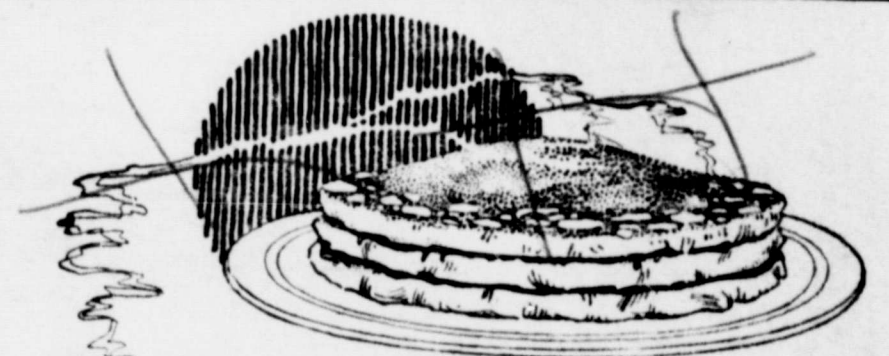

Prove Word "Skeleton" Borrowed From Greece

Omaha Leading World in Number of Phones

Justifiable pride may be felt by the American who considers the latest statistics of the telephone industry. The United States wins the international telephone championship by possessing 63 per cent of the telephones of the world. European countries have less than half that number—26 per cent—while the remaining 11 per cent are found outside of Europe and the United States.

Omaha, Neb., leads the world with 28 telephones to each 100 persons. The next 10 cities are in order: Stockholm, Sweden; San Francisco, Minneapolis, Denver, Toronto, Cincinnati, and New York. Paris appears twenty-third in the list, and London twenty-fourth.

Photo of Molecules Taken

The moving picture has been coupled with the ultramicroscope, enabling scientists to secure motion photographs of particles one-hundredth the size of bacteria, says the New York Times.

Applications of the kineo-ultramicroscope, according to a report to the American Chemical society, have been demonstrated by Dr. Elmer Kraemer of the University of Wisconsin.

"Just as dust becomes visible in a sunbeam," says the report, "these tiny particles become visible under the ultramicroscope. Preserved in a medium of jelly, they become immediately active and jump about the field when the medium is melted. This development is the only visible evidence scientists have of the existence of molecules. It is assumed that the lively movement of the particles shown in the film is due to a heavy bombardment of molecules after the melting of the gelatin."

Steam From Midearth Coming Motive Power?

What will happen when the earth runs short of coal and oil supplies? This problem was discussed by Prof. W. W. Watts in a paper on "Geology in the Service of Man." He suggested the possibility of a great new power which humanity may harness to its service—nothing less than the heat of the earth's nether regions.

A beginning has been made at Volterra, in Italy, where a new source of power has been found in the high-temperature steam from fumaroles, which has previously been used only as a source of borax. Now the steam is being tapped by boring, and its chief heat is employed in running great power stations.

This may be but the beginning of the application of a new and valuable source of power in which the services of geology will be required.

We are haunted by the fear that a limit will be imposed by high temperature to deep mining, while that very heat may provide energy as valuable as the material which would otherwise be mined—just as we dread the gas from certain coal seams, when the gas might, if it could be exploded, give a return equivalent to that of the coal itself.

Toulouse Geese

The Toulouse region of southern France raises a million geese a year. The City of Toulouse alone consumes 100,000 of them. It is the center of the goose-liver industry.

The so-called Toulouse variety of goose is said to be the largest of any known type. The average weight of a year-old goose is about 20 pounds, and the bird attains as much as 33 pounds when fully grown. In color the geese are gray with under parts white and beak reddish. The egg-laying season begins in January, the average total for the laying season being 45 eggs. Turkey hens are customarily used for the hatching.

The quantity of pate de foie gras exported from France in 1920, of which a good proportion came from the Toulouse district, was almost 2,000,000 pounds.

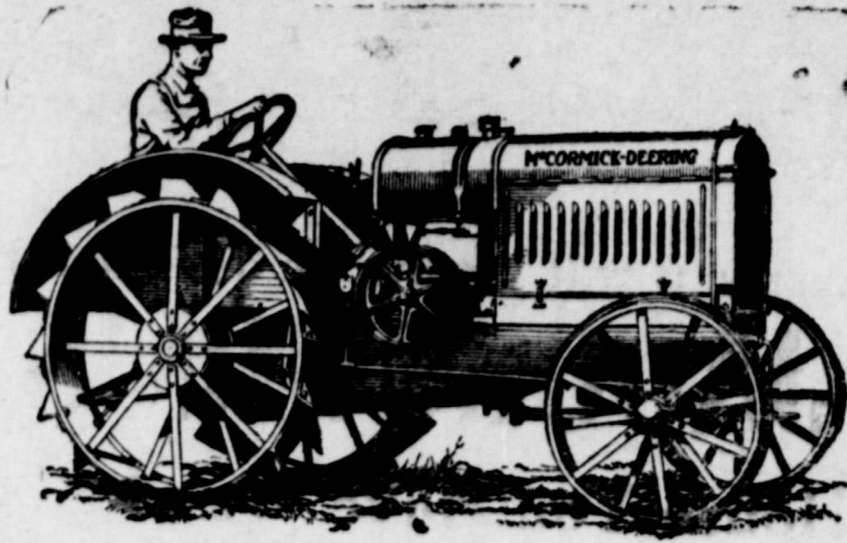
