

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DISEASES OF THE HEART

Austin, Texas, March 27. Pumping fiften gallons of blood an hour is the astonishing work done by the heart, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. The heart is about the size of a man's flst; it never sleeps, loafs or takes a vacation from the beginnig of life to the end. The only rest it gets is be-tween beats. Yet with all the work the heart has to do it does not give out suddenly unless it has been injured or ill-treated.

Under the pressure of work the average person neglects his heart and unwittingly abuses it. The chief causes of heart trouble, aside from deterioration of old age, are rheumatic fever, acute infectious diseases, chronic infections, syphilis, too abrupt return to activity after a serious illness, too strenuous exercise ,and overweight may be a factor.

Many of the signs which you think mean heart trouble can be caused by some other disorder. Indigestion, lung trouble or nervousness may cause pain near the heart, shortness of breath, fainting, and irregularity of beat. If you have any of these symptoms, do not try to diagnose the condition of yourself, but go to your doctor for an examination. He will be able to find out what is wrong and may tell you that your heart is sound. Have an examination every year and follow your doctors' advice.
