Mixed drink taxes are up

State Comptroller Bob collected by the Alcoholic Bullock said recently that Beverage Commission and collection of the state's 10 percent mixed drink tax during the second quarter of 1983 was up 5.4 percent over the same period last

Bullock said the state collected \$37.9 million in taxes on the sale of mixed drinks during the quarter.

Bullock's office is sending checks totaling \$11 million to 219 counties and 416 cities as their share of the gross receipts tax on mixed drinks for the second quarter.

The state's general revenue fund will receive the balance — \$26.9 million — of the tax money collected.

Texas cities and counties each receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed

drinks in the state. The mixed drink tax is
