

Memorial Service For Sgt. Vance Harwood Murphy

There will be a Memorial Service for Sgt. Vance Harwood Murphy, Sunday, August 12, 1945, at 3:00 P. M., at the High School Auditorium in Dimmitt. Sgt. Murphy was in the 8th Air Force, 445th Bomb Group.

The mission that cost Sgt. Murphy his life was staged over a target in Germany, August 9, 1944. The Government reports that his plane was fired upon by the enemy and that the crew met death on that day. He had been in the armed forces since before Pearl Harbor formerly in the Coast Artillery, but deciding that he was not doing enough for the promotion of victory, asked for a transfer into the Air Corps. He left the States in the latter part of May, 1944.

Relatives declared that "We are asking any and everyone to attend this service in honor of our Loved One. All men of World War I and II are asked to come early and occupy certain seats reserved for you. All of our boys who are yet in uniform are especially urged to occupy these seats."

Swimming Pool Opening Delayed

Formal opening of the Dimmitt swimming pool, which had been tentatively set for Saturday, August 11, has been temporarily postponed. Although work on the pool is practically completed it was decided by school officials to postpone the opening date until all work was completed.

An appropriate program is being arranged for the opening date which will be announced in the next issue of the news.

DISTRICT OPA OFFICE TO BE ABOLISHED

Tentative plans call for the abolishment of the Lubbock District office of OPA and combination of the 71-county territory with that of the Fort Worth district will become effective September 15, according to an announcement made this week by Earl E. Kerr, director of the Lubbock office.

Kerr said that action involving the Lubbock office was part of a national reorganization plan of the OPA which will result in the abolishment of 31 districts over the nation. Three of these district offices, Lubbock, Tulsa and Shreveport, La., are in Region Five.

Object of the move, Kerr said is "to shift staff and resources in the field to the major points of population concentration and to key production and distribution areas, so as to make possible better service in the reconversion period to the largest number of businesses and to protect the greatest number of people with effective enforcement."

"So far as we know there will be no duty stations in what is now the Lubbock District and unless desire to be transferred to other personnel of the Lubbock office points, their period of employment will be terminated September 15, the date now tentatively set for closing the Lubbock office," Kerr said. The office employs a total of 128 persons.

There will be no change so far as local boards are concerned, Kerr said, other than that they will work under the direction of the Fort Worth Office after the effective date of the change.

Social Security Board Office Offers Help

Sometimes young widows, aged parents, and orphans do not know they are eligible for benefits and lose money through delay in filing their claims.

In addition to the monthly old-age benefits payable to the insured worker himself at the age of 65 or after, the Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance system provides for monthly benefits to members of his family. Benefits are also payable to his family at his death, whatever his age.

A safe rule is this: When in doubt about your right to old-age and survivors insurance benefits, visit the local office of the Social Security Board. No matter where you work or live, you're probably not very far from a Social Security Board field office or from one of its part-time service points.

The Social Security Board field office servicing this area is located at Amarillo.

DROUTH BROKEN BY RAIN TUES.

Castro County received its first general rain early Tuesday morning since last December. The drouth that had held sway for the past several months, curtailing the production of wheat, eliminating the planting of row crops and threatening obliteration of pasturage of both wheat and grass, was definitely broken in the county Tuesday by rain amounting from .87 to 2 inches and more. It is believed that moisture is sufficient in all sections of the county for the planting of wheat and reviving pastures.

The rain gauge at the Hays Implement Company registered 1.20 inches while the gauge at the home of Mr. Edwin Ramey, east of town, registered .87 inches, the lightest rainfall reported in the county.

After sweeping the enemy out of Sicily in 37 days of hard, fast fighting the Seventh became the Mystery Army of the European Theater until revealing its power in the invasion of Southern France.

OCTOBER FIRST IS DEADLINE FOR RECORDING BNS.

Following is an excerpt from a bulletin notifying ranchmen that all Texas Livestock brands must be re-recorded before October 1st, 1945:

"The Texas State Legislature provided in 1943 that all livestock brands in the state of Texas must be re-recorded by October 1st, 1945. House Bill 170 is the law providing for such re-recording. The 1945 State Legislature passed Senate Bill 309 which provides that owners of livestock may record more than one brand or mark.

"Only two months now remain in which livestock owners may re-record their livestock brands or marks as provided by the legislation passed by the 1943 Legislature of the State of Texas.

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association urges livestock owners to be sure and see that brands which they wish to retain are re-recorded by October 1, 1945. If such re-recording is not done there is danger of losing the brand since the law provides that brands not recorded by that date are subject to registration by any person and the first person to record the brand after October 1, 1945, shall be the owner of the same."

"Old Hickory" Invasion Veteran Coming Home

Pfc. Frances G. Wilhelm, of Rt. 2 Happy, Texas, is enroute home from Europe with the "Old Hickory" Division, which broke up Germany's supreme counter-offensive in Normandy, is now being processed at Camp Oklahoma City, an Infantry redeployment center operated by the Assembly Area Command.

Pfc. Wilhelm is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Wilhelm of Nazareth.

Old Age Pensioner May Get Raise

Temple Texas, Aug. 8—Old age pensioners in Texas stand to receive an average of \$5.50 per month more than their present payments if a proposed constitutional amendment is passed. August 25, raising the ceiling from \$15 per month to \$20 per month. State legislators of Texas are pointing out.

Under the new arrangement, the solons say, the state could pay an average of \$2.75 more to each of the 170,000 old persons on the rolls at present, and the figure would be matched by federal funds.

The state constitution now limits the total that may be paid to destitute children in one year to \$1,500,000 and limits payments to needy blind to \$15 per month, the law-makers explain.

Last year \$3,000,000 was paid out for these two purposes, and should no increases be made for these two projects there would be \$32,000,000 a month for old people now being used, or an increase of about \$6,000,000.

The old age and other public welfare projects amendment will be voted on by Texas citizens August 25 at the time three other amendments to the constitution are considered by the people of Texas.

CORN YIELD LIGHT IN STATE

The 1945 Texas corn yield may be the smallest since 1934, according to the July 1 crop report of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Quoting this report, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at Austin, gives the estimated corn acreage as 4,128,000, or 17 per cent below that of 1944. The indicated yield on July 1 was 15.5 bushels an acre for a total production of 63,984,000 bushels. This would be more than 5,000,000 below the 1944 yield, and more than 13,000,000 bushels less than the 10-year average.

The following school board members were appointed for the Hart Independent School District: Hubert Lilley, Howard Bridges, Roy Pyent, Homer Garrison, Al Sharp, Jess Newsom and Willis Hawkins.

The board appointed are temporary and will serve only until the April election.
