

But, in the mean time we were "stepping on the gas" to the full limit of the car's speed, seeking to reach the next little town on the highway, where we hoped in some way to get him out of the car.

Finally we reached a service station in the edge of the little town and got assistance, and got hint out, and we went on our way "ever happy afterwards," for having been able to get rid of our "hitch-hiking" soldier boy, and escape without being injured or killed.

But, the other day we witnessed something we had heard about but had never seen-that some of the "smarter" of the hitch-hiking crowd carry a Bible with them and use as a flag with which to wave down the approaching motorist from whom the hitch-hiker wants to "mooch" a ride.

A young fellow, in his late twenties, perhaps, fairly well

dressed and bearing marks of far more than ordinary intelligence, was standing by the highway, his suitcase setting at his feet, with his overcoat on his arm, when we came in sight of him, began to wave frantically to us. We noted that he had some object in his hand with which he was accosting us. As we drew nearer we saw the object in his hand was a book, and as we came up to him, the word in gilt, stood out on the back of the book that was turned to us, which he was holding aloft that we might see, was "Bible." We passed him by. And we admit passing him by without any apologies.

The incident set us to musing along the line as to whether not the young fellow was a preacher. We think there is no question but that he was-some young preacher out, on a journey, it may have been a short distance, or on ' a long trip.

But, the question with us was and is: Should a preacher with any self-respect, except under most extraordinary circumstances, be a hitch-hiker, and should he parade his Bible as an appeal to the passing strange motorist to "mooch" a ride

We do not think he should. We know the great old Book says: "Be careful to entertain strangers." But, the same old Book also says: "Beware of dogs." To speak mildly, far as we have contacted the average hitch-hiker. either male or female, he is not so closely akin to the angels that he has wings.

To say the least, the preacher who does such a thing is not proving himself to be worthy, by his course. The United States military regulations forbid the soldier even to accept a ride from a passing motorist, much less to "thumb" the motorist. Army officials have said that it is a reflection on the personnel of the military forces of the country for one of its soldiers to accept a ride, much less to "mooch" a ride. If that is a correct view-(and it is)-of the military officials, how much more then must it cheapen the ministry and the religion of the Bible for a preacher to roam about over the country and hold up his Bible to passing strangers, thus seeking by exhibiting his Bible, to get the motorist to do something concerning which most all motorists have an aversion and prefer not to do, namely, pick up a stranger and give him free transportation. The old-fashioned ideals of the evangelical churches relative to their ministers would not allow a minister to be guilty of such outrageous conduct-for, in those days such a course would brand the preacher as a "bum," along with the others of the road. And to express our private opinion in this public way on the question under discussion, the same sentiment should still obtain, and any preacher thus guilty should be given no recognition .- for he still is nothing but "a common bum." We are not saying anything, except "just preachin" to the preachers."






