Long ago we made it an ironclad rule not to pick up hese gents- (not even the "ladies," if you please)- except nder much more than ordinary circumstances. We found him to be a shell-shocked soldier and "crazy as a bat." We had only started good when the fellow in the uniform decided that we knew absolutely nothing about driving a car. He requested that we

about how to get speed out of a car. We insisted that we were in no great hurry. Thereupon he made known that he had to be at a certain place a hundred or more miles away almost instanter. We then told him that our running gear was not in the best of condition, and hence the car would not stand for speed and that it would be more than dangerous, unless both of us wanted to die in a wreck, to tun the car raster han we were running ic. We had told him Whays had a deep interest in the " "doughboy." When we in isted that it would be dangerous to operate the car faster han we were running it, he reminded us that our being a reacher we shouldn't fear death. We informed him that we did not particularly dread death, but we did have a preference as to the method of our going, and one of them was not by wreeking a car. He tried to push us out from under the steering wheel and take charge himself. It was a des-
perate situation for a time. We argued with him to the perate situation for a time. We argued with him to the ef-
fect that we knew the road and he did not, and hence we could make better time than he could. But, in the mean time we were "stepping on the gas" to the full limit of the car's speed, seeking to reach the next little town on the highway, where we hoped in some way to get him out of the car.
Finally we reached a service station in the edge of the little naily we reached a service station in the edge of the little town and got assistance, and got hint out, and we went on our way "ever happy afterwards, for having been ate out being injured or killed. But, the other day we witnessed something we had heard about but had never seen-that some of the "smart-
er" of the hitch-hiking crowd carry a Bible with them and use as a flag with which to wave down the approaching motorist from whom the hitch-hiker wants to "mooch" a ride. A young fellow, in his late twenties, perhaps, fairly well
dressed and bearing marks of far more than dressed and bearing marks of far more than ordinary in-
telligence, was standing by the highway, his suitcase setelligence, was standing by the highway, his suitcase secame in sight of him, began to wave frantically to us. We noted that he had some object in his hand with which he was accosting us. As we drew nearer we saw the object in his hand was a book, and as we came up to him, the word in gilt, stood out on the back of the book that was turried to us, which he was holding aloft that we might see, was
"Bible." We passed him by. And we admit passing him by without any apologies.
The incident set us to musing along the line as to whether not the young fellow was a preacher. We think out, on a journey, it may have been a short distance, or on a long trip.
But, the question with us was and is: Should a preacher with any self-respect, except under most extraordinary circumstances, be a hitch-hiker, and should he parade his
