And it may be by the time our readers receive their paper this week, it will have become a law in Texas that no man can with the consent of legal sanction in this state bet on a horse race, or any other form of gambling.

The thought has occurred to us that if the concrete evidence on the curse of legal liquor in Texas could be assembled and brought before the people, are there not enough red-blooded men and fair women who love humanity in this great old state to rise up and smite the whole liquor business hip and thigh, and thus say that they danot propose for such wreckage of human life and happpiness as well as the material interests of the people to be sacrificed in order that those who do not care for the morals and the higher interests of men may make "easy money" selling the ac-

There is no getting around it consistently, ladies and gentlemen, every person in this state who has given sanction and encouragement to legal race track gambling, not only has the blood of Senator Nelson's man and the happiness of his family on their hands. Personally it is a matter of deep pride to us that we have never in the least given endorsement to race track or any other kind of gambling. It is likewise true that every man and woman in Texas who has given sanction and encouragement to the return of legal liquor has the blood and shame upon them of all that liquor has wrought since it raised its infamous head legally in Texas again. Some will seek to satisfy their consciences by saying, "Oh, well, they will drink it anyhow-so, you had as well let them have it legally and get the revenue which the state needs." God of our Fathers-what an un-American argument! They will likewise gamble regardless as to whether it is outlawed by the state or not. If the gambling repeal bill becomes a law, it will not end gambling-but, it will do this: it wil relieve the people of Texas from being parties to any shame and ruin and death that gambling may bring. Likewise, when liquor was illegal in Texas, the people were not responsible—but how different now! Every crime, every death, every bit of the drunkenness and shame from the use of liquor now can be and should be charged up to the people of Texas.



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
