Coke County Ships 12,000 Mutton

Floyd Modgling estimates that approximately 12,000 fat mutton from Coke county have been shipped out to market this season. And we know no one who is better authority on the question than Mr. Modgling, for he keeps close tab on the sheep movements in this part of West Texas.

Mr. Modgling estimates that the mutton averaged something like \$8.50 around, counting wool and the prices the mutton sold for on the market. This would make more than \$100,000 coming to the sheepmen of the county this season. A snug little bit of "terbacker" money, to say the least.

WINTERS BUSINESS MAN A VISITOR

Wednesday afternoon a stranger entered the office of The Enterprise and introduced himself. He said his name was Dawson and that he was in business in Winters.

The resemblance of the visitor to a family of preachers by the name of Dawson was so striking, we asked him if he had any relatives by his name who were Baptist preachers. He said: "Yes—Joe Dawson, pastor of the First Baptist church of Waco, and his brother, Ed Dawson, pastor of the Baptist church at Hico, are cousins of mine."

Thereupon we declared that he was no stranger to us, but somewhat as "one of the family"—that we had known his preacher kinsmen "well nigh on to forty years."

The two preacher Dawsons have been and are two of the outstanding preachers of their denomination in Texas and in the South. Dr. Joe Dawson has been pastor of the First church, Waco, for many years, which is one of the truly historic old churches of Texas, which ministers in spiritual things to the student body of Baylor University. In other years we were intimately associated with the "preacher Dawsons" and thru the years our friendship has continued.

NO DEAD DOGS!

The water in the city reservoir has had a peculiar odor and taste since the rain a short time ago. Because of the condition of the water rumors, thick and fast and increasing in proportions became current. The first was that a dead dog was found in the filtering plant; the second was that two dead dogs had been found in the city water supply plant; the third was that two dead dogs, many cats, fish galore and dead birds uncountable had been found in the filtration plant. The above rumors continued to circulate so persistent, only that Mayor R. E. Cumbie and Water Superintendent E. H. Mackey "got their ire stirred," and Mayor Cumbie requested The Enterprise to say for him that the rumors are absolutely without foundation. The peculiar odor of the water is due to the fresh rain water running into the water that was already in the lake. "There is absolutely nothing wrong with the water, and say to the people, please, that they have nothing whatever to fear from the water—it is wholesome and pure," said Mayor Cumbie.

MRS. A. R. HAYLEY DECEASED

Miss Leila Belle Taylor was born in Butler County, Kentucky, December 25, 1883 and departed this life in a sanitarium at San Angelo, May 13, 1937, making her to be 53 years, 4 months and 18 days old when death claimed her.

In early life deceased came to Texas and on September 3, 1905 she was married to A. R. Hayley at Robert Lee. Her husband preceded her in death, February 4, 1935. To the union four daughters were born, all of whom survive to sorrow over the passing of mother. The daughters are: Mrs. Mildred Lasswell, Fort Chadbourne; Mrs. H. M. Kirkland, Hayrick; Mrs. C. M. McCutchen and Mrs. Wesley Fields, Edith. Besides the daughters, the mother, Mrs. J. P. Taylor, Rochester, Kentucky; five sisters and a brother, Rev. Carson Taylor, Dallas, survive.

At the early age of nine years deceased professed faith in Christ and united with the Baptist church—her father was a Baptist minister. After her marriage she joined the Methodist church with her husband. The membership of both was in Hayrick church all the years of their lives after they united with the church. For fifteen years this quiet, patient, gentle woman was a sufferer, but always she saw the silver lining in the cloud. Often she forgot her own suffering to express good cheer to other sufferers and sympathy and kindly consideration for the sorrowing about her. In the columns of The Enterprise a few years ago we printed a tribute she wrote on her bed of illness the day her long-time friend, Mrs. W. A. Robbins, was buried. Not being able to attend the funeral, as the funeral procession moved by her home, seeing the funeral car in which her dear friend was being borne to the cemetery, she took her pencil and paper and wrote a beautiful tribute to the memory of her friend. And thus it always was with her. The world is enriched because she lived and not only her daughters, but all who knew her will cherish golden memories of her gentle, beautiful life. 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WOOL EXPERTS VISIT COKE COUNTY

J. Wiley Christie, of the Wool Division, Bureau of Economics Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., Stanley P. Davis, Wool and Mohair Specialist of the Texas Experiment Station, and G. W. Cunningham, Secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, visited the County Agent of Coke County last week, to secure some wool samples to carry out a wool scouring experiment.

The ranches of Wilkins & Powell were visited, where samples were obtained, as well as the ranches of R. E. Hickman, and Frank Percifull. No samples were taken at the Hickman ranch. Samples will be taken from several other ranches by the County Agent, and forwarded to these men.

The purpose of this experiment is to educate the ranchmen in regard to the type and grade of wool he is producing. Mr. Davis operates a very modern wool scouring plant at the A. & M. College, and he will take two samples, first a representative sample of 25 fleeces, from each of these fleeces he takes a small sample. These samples, the large or complete fleeces, and the smaller or a small amount from each fleece, will be scoured separately and a comparison made. If the small sample is found to be in close resemblance to the larger sample, it will make the work much easier, as then such a small sample can be taken each year, and a true scouring test made without tying up a number of full fleeces over a period of months.

Mr. Christie also took a small

sample from twenty-five fleeces to send to Washington to be scoured. The scouring test on his sample will be compared with that of Mr. Davis, and a comparison made.

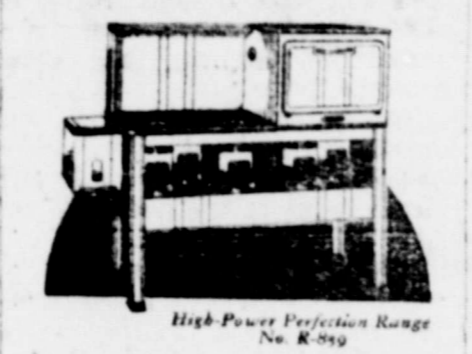
As far as possible the entire clips of each producer, where samples are taken, will be followed through all the trade channels to the final distribution of the wool.

This work is being carried on in two states by the Wool & Mohair Division of the Bureau of Economics, of the Department of Agriculture. The work is being done in Texas and Wyoming.

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H. J. R. No. 26.
House Joint Resolution
 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-c which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per month each, and providing for payment of such assistance or aid only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas and providing that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to such blind; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof and prescribing the form of ballot.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS
 Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Article 51-c which shall read as follows:
 "Section 51-c. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws to provide, under such limitations and regulations and restrictions as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application.
 "The Legislature shall have authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for assistance to the needy blind as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinabove provided."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Monday of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:
 "For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."
 Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
 "Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."
 If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.
 Sec. 4. The sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
 The above is a true and correct copy.

H. J. R. No 24
A Joint Resolution
 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article XVI, Section 61, providing for the abolishing of the salary method of compensating all district, county and precinct officers of this State, and further providing that such officers shall be paid in such manner and on such basis as may be prescribed by the legislature; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; providing for proclamation of said election by the governor; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
 "Section 61. All district, county, and precinct officers shall hereafter be compensated in such manner and on such basis as may be prescribed by the legislature."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the fourth Monday in August 1937. At which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots these words:
 "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize the legislature to fix the manner and basis of compensation for all district, county, and precinct officers."
 And those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots these words:
 "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize the legislature to fix the manner and basis of compensation for all district, county, and precinct officers."
 Sec. 3. The governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.
 Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.
 The above is a true and correct copy.

son; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application.
 "The Legislature shall have authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for assistance to the needy blind as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinabove provided."
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 Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
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 If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.
 Sec. 4. The sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

 Sec. 3. The governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

 proposing an amendment to Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas; providing that the Legislature shall authorize the incorporation of banking bodies and provide for the supervision and regulation of same; providing for all of the capital stock to be subscribed and paid for before charter issued; restricting foreign corporations from doing banking business; restricting corporate business to one place.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS
 Section 1. That Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
 "Section 16. The Legislature proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 52d; providing that the Legislature may authorize by law, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, the adoption of a plan for the construction of paved roads and bridges or both in Harris County and in road districts therein; providing for the levy of a tax to pay for such construction; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS
 Section 1. That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as follows:
 "Section 52d: Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for constructing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.
 "At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder.
 "The provisions of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds;" those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and the amendments thereto.
