# Dallas Young Man Brought Back to Sonora for Burial

The early Saturday morning press reports brought information from Dallas tifat made the writer apprehensive. The reports stated that Francis Me-Gonagill, a young man of thirty, was found dead in the home of congregation set the date for ple in their spiritual needs, and prehensive lest the young man 18. was a member of one of the faniities of the dearest friends we ever had.

Saturday afternoon our fears were confirmed by a telephone call from the family in Dallas, advising us of the tragedy, stating that the body would be returned to Sonora, the baby hood home of deceased and the childhood home of his mother, for interment, in the family plat in the Sonora cemetery. Monday afternoon, and requested that we be present and speak the last words.

The intelligence of the tragedy was shocking to us beyond words-no particular shock at the manner of his death, for the press reports had given sufficient information regarding the matter, stating that the young man had been ill and was ill at the time of the tragic deed. 

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


