

Santa Fe System carloading for the week ending, September 25, were 26,429 cars, compared with 21,717 for the same week last year. The Company received from connections 6,926 cars, compared with 6,278 for the same week a year ago. Total cars moved were 33,391, compared with 27,995 during the same week of 1936. The Santa Fe handled a total of 31,675 cars in the preceding week this year.
