"When you review the whole thing, I think you'll have to agree with (Assistant Secretary of Agriculture) John Ford, who said this would be good for West Texas," Texas Corn Growers Association President Carl King said of the government's new Payment in Kind (PIK) program.

President Reagan chose the National Farm Bureau Convention in Dallas as his forum to announce the initiation of the program Tuesday.

The PIK plan — to pay farmers with surplus commodities instead of money for cutting back further on their production — originated with the Texas Corn Growers Association, which is headquartered in Dimmitt. The TCGA board proposed the plan to the USDA in November as a way to reduce crippling surpluses, cut government storage and price-support costs, stem overproduction and help farmers weather the cost-price crisis that has driven many out of business.

The PIK plan is similar — but not identical — to programs used in the 1930s to help curb cotton production and in the 1960s to help ease a feed-grain surplus.

The program applies to five major US crops — wheat, cotton, corn, grain sorghum and rice.

A farmer who grows any of these commodities and who is participating in the government's acreage set-aside program may, under the new PIK plan, take additional land from production and receive surplus commodities to make up part of the lost production.

The replacement ratios announced by the Administration were higher than program backers had dared to hope — 80% of projected yield on corn, cotton, grain sorghum and rice, and 95% on wheat. The high replacement ratios are intended to insure widespread participation.

Signup will begin Jan. 24 and end March 11. Signup for previously announced acreage reduction and land diversion programs also have been changed to March 11.

The PIK program will piggy-back on the original set-aside program, and a farmer must take part in the original program to be eligible for PIK participation.

Under the original program, a farmer must set aside 20% of base acreage and will be paid for 10%. The PIK program will enable the farmer to divert an additional 10% to 30% of his crop base and be paid "in kind" with crop surplus of similar grade.

So a farmer will be able to lay out up to 50% of his crop base acreage, and on most of it he will be paid with 80% to 95% of the commodity he would normally expect to produce on that acreage, without any risk or production costs.

The farmer will receive his CCC commodity at normal harvest time ("crop availability date"), but does not have to take title to the commodity immediately. The CCC will pay storage for up to five months after the PIK availability period begins. After that five-month "grace period," the producer will be responsible for storage and warehouse charges. Also, a producer can opt to take title to his payment commodity at any time after the availability date. The producer may use or dispose of his PIK commodity in any way he wishes.

Just as the replacement ratio was a key to the prospective acceptance of the program by the nation's farmers — especially those in the Midwest — so is the \$50,000 limitation factor in this area.

Under the original set-aside program, no individual farmer can receive more than \$50,000 in government crop diversion payments. But Secretary of Agriculture John Block said in a press conference in Dallas Tuesday that the \$50,000 limitation will not apply to the PIK program.

According to first analysis of the PIK program by Commodity World News, a producer whose payments are reduced because of the \$50,000 limitation on the paid diversion portion of the program has two options. He may request a proportional reduction in his total conservation use acreage requirement, and plant that "extra acreage" to a non-program crop such as soybeans or sunflowers; or, under the PIK program, he may forego this reduction for a "special PIK compensation." The compensation is 50% of the farm's program yield for the applicable crop multiplied by the conservation use acreage that would have been reduced for that crop.

"I don't think the \$50,000 limitation is going to be a big 'problem,'" King said Tuesday. "I hope that by the time for

### County eliminates automatic raises

County Commissioners held the line on salaries Monday when they met in Castro County Courthouse.

Commissioners voted to leave everyone's salary as it was in 1982. They also voted to eliminate the automatic \$50 six-month-raise previously granted to county employees, and to grant merit raises only.

Commissioners also decided that county employees going on expense-paid trips could present the bills to Commissioners' Court after the trip and then be reimbursed for expenses.

After much discussion, commissioners decided to join the Job Training Consortium Partnership Act, a group of 25 Panhandle counties. The job training program will replace the CETA program, starting Oct. 1, 1983.

Loretta Kindsfather, of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, met with commissioners to explain the new program, although specific details have not yet been worked out.

"Congress has been working to improve the job training program," Mrs. Kindsfather said. "CETA has not worked as well as everyone hoped it would."

Mrs. Kindsfather explained that the new program will come in the form of a block grant, and a portion of that money will be sent to Texas.

The governor will appropriate money for the program, and he will designate the areas the state will be divided into.

Local officials in each area will appoint a private industry council and the governor will certify the appointments.

The state of Texas will be in charge of the program, which will no longer be involved with the US Department of Labor.

Mrs. Kindsfather informed commissioners that they could join with the other Panhandle counties to ask the governor for a certain portion of the money. She said if they did

### Kiwanis gives \$6,680 away

At Monday's meeting, the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club gave away \$6,680 to six causes, presented plaques to six landowners, and heard a program by Dimmitt High School AFS exchange student Kim Vercueil of South Africa.

The club presented high school ag teacher Larry Gray with a check for \$2,500 for the Dimmitt FFA.

Another check for \$2,500 was presented to County Agent Charles Hottel for the 4-H program.

High School Principal Alex Glass accepted a \$350 check for the Presidential Classroom program.

Special Education Director Corky Lockmiller was presented a check for \$330 to enable local students to participate in Special Olympics competition.

\$500 each was donated to the Traci Hatla Medical Fund and the Jo Kirkpatrick Medical Fund.

Plaques were prepared for landowners who allowed the club to use their land for the

annual pheasant hunt project. Those present at the meeting as guests of honor were George Sides, Bill Clark and representatives of the Bruegel family. Others not present included Greg Sides, Donny Nelson and the Marble Brothers.

"My ancestors were among the earliest Dutch settlers of South Africa, and were the ones to first introduce a strain of flowering trees to the country," Miss Vercueil told the club members in a slide show and talk she presented about her home country.

Her father is a managing director of Dowson and Dobson Companies, and her mother is a Bible college lecturer. She has two brothers, Graham, 15, and Pierre, 13, and "both are very good looking and unattached," Miss Vercueil, 18, quipped.

She is staying with the Robert Benton family while attending Dimmitt High School.

### School board looks at four new classes

At Monday's meeting of the Dimmitt School Board, members voted to implement four new classes and eliminate one, decided to take out a maintenance contract with IBM, and renewed the contract of Superintendent Robert Ryan.

The board decided to begin implementing a computer science course, remedial reading and speed reading courses for the high school. Also, the gifted and talented class at the high school will be dropped, mainly because of lack of participation by qualified students.

Ryan told the board that he estimated a beginning cost of \$10,000 to set up the computer science class. He added that the main obstacle for that class, as well as the two reading classes, is lack of available classroom space. He said that the three classes could use the same room, once one is found, because the computers could be used as a reading laboratory. Plans indicate that high school English I and Resource

teacher Linda Lowe would teach two sections of remedial reading and one section of speed reading. A teacher would have to be recruited for the computer class.

Ryan said that federal funds would be available to help pay for the remedial reading classes, while funds now being spent for the gifted-talented program could be used for the speed reading course.

An estimated budget of \$2,000 will be required to support a gifted and talented unit for grades 7 and 8 for next year, which the board also approved.

The class will be structured the same as the unit operating for the past two years in grades 4-6, meeting for one three-hour session each week. The new unit will be taught by Carol Schroeder.

In a vote of four in favor and three against, the board voted to pay \$4,500 for a yearly maintenance contract with IBM on the new large computer system the district purchased. The 90-day war-

ranty will expire soon, and Ryan asked members whether they wanted the maintenance contract, which will provide coverage for parts, labor, mileage, etc. on problems arising from defects in manufacture, as well as semi-annual routine maintenance.

The board renewed Ryan's contract through July 1, 1984.

A Trustee election has been called for April 2, with the terms of Fred Bruegel Jr., Deanne Clark and Stanley Nelson expiring.

In other business, the board:

—Approved the tax addition-deletion report, which showed \$1,557.19 in deletions due to errors in assessment; and the addition of \$107.44 due to property that had been left off of the tax roll.

—Heard a report from Mrs. Clark on the Panhandle Area Association of School Boards, including a questionnaire concerning various proposals to be brought up at the group's next meeting.

—Saw a demonstration of computer use in classroom situations by teachers Gainell Minnick and Dorothy Street.

### Voting is Saturday

Three area men are up for reelection to their posts with the High Plains Underground Water District service area (Precinct 3), and voters will go to the polls Saturday.

W. W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell is seeking his sixth term on the Board as a District Director representing Bailey, Castro and Parmer Counties.

George Elder and Floyd Schulte, both of Dimmitt, are seeking return to their posts as Castro County Committeemen.

Voting in Castro County will be at the following locations: the American Legion Hall in Nazareth, Mrs. Leo Ehly presiding; Judge; the City Hall Community Room in Dimmitt, Mrs. Oleta Gollehon, presiding Judge; and the Farmers State Bank in Hart, Mrs. Sarah Hart presiding Judge.

### Zoners to make recommendations

The Dimmitt Zoning Board is planning to make several recommendations to the city board of aldermen concerning ordinances regulating mobile homes and their placement in the city.

The zoners decided to move the boundaries for Zone 1 and Zone 2 as designated for mobile home placement. Formerly, Zone 2 was bounded by the alley between West Fourth and Fifth Streets and the east side of West Sixth Street, and Zone 1 was any area east of Zone 2. Placement requirements are stricter in Zone 2.

Zoners will recommend that Zone 1 be changed to indicate any area of town east of Broadway, while Zone 2 will include all areas west of Broadway to the east side of West Sixth Street. All designations include both the north and south portions of the streets named.

Recommendations will also include that all mobile homes be legally tied down, and also be skirted, regardless of zone or date of placement. Some of the other regulations, if

adopted by the city, will not apply to mobile homes already placed.

Other recommendations to be presented include:

—All mobile home lots in either zone should have a minimum frontage of 50 feet.

—No requirements be placed on minimum square footage or age of mobile homes in Zone 1.

—In Zone 2, mobile homes must have a minimum of 750 square feet, and must be manufactured in 1975 or later.

—Other minor wording changes.

The city aldermen will receive the recommendations at their meeting Monday at 7 p.m. in the city hall meeting room.

### Cats record moves to 20-0

The win was a milestone in the already illustrious career of coach Kenneth Cleveland. This is the first Cleveland coached team to finish pre-season play without a loss. The Bobcats are 20-0, going into their district opener Friday at Abilene.

In his 22 years, Cleveland has had teams which won 16 district titles, 9 bi-district, four regional and two state championships, and two teams which finished in the state finals.

But, this is his first team here to go undefeated in pre-season play.

The Bobbies, who led the entire game, shot 39% from the field and 75% from the foul line.

Friday, the Bobbies, now 7-10 and 1-0, travel to Abilene for their second district contest.

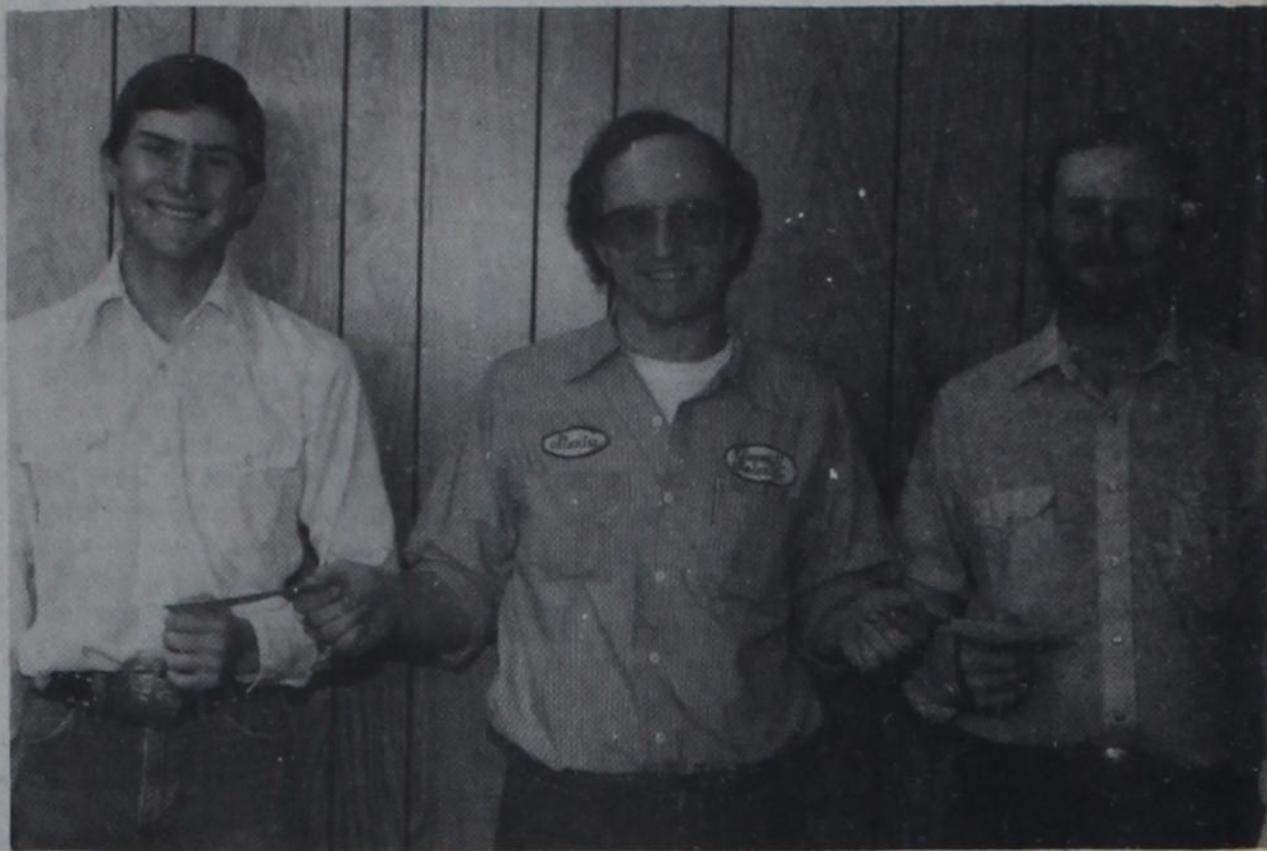

### Accident statistics reported

Sergeant Joe Rex Smith, Area Department of Public Safety supervisor for Castro County, has released statistics on accidents in the county and the Panhandle for the month of December and for the year of 1982 as a whole.

Castro County registered a total of 13 accidents in December, bringing the year's total to 98. Of the December accidents, only three involved injuries, with seven people reported injured. The other 10 were property damage accidents.

Of the year's 98 accidents, six resulted in the deaths of eight persons, 33 resulted in injuries to 60 people and 59 involved only property damage.

For the 31-county area of the Panhandle, 404 accidents were reported in December, making the year's total 2,903.

Of the December accidents in the Panhandle, seven accidents resulted in the deaths of 10 persons, 140 accidents resulted in injuries to 264 people, and 257 resulted in property damage.

In one year's time, the Panhandle area saw 78 fatal accidents in which 97 people were killed. In 1,070 injury accidents, 1,831 people were injured. There were 1,755 accidents resulting in property damage.

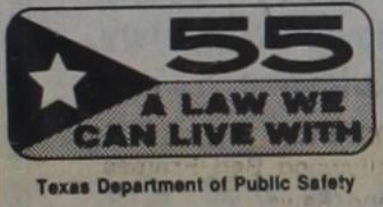

the final sign-up (March 11), we'll get that \$50,000 limitation erased by Congress as far as PIK is concerned."

Producers can receive PIK grain in two ways: (1) Those with outstanding CCC loans (regular and reserve) must forfeit the loans for the PIK payment. (2) Those with no outstanding CCC loans may receive their PIK by acquiring the commodity from an approved warehouse.

PIK quantities will be made on a bushel-for-bushel or pound-for-pound basis unless the loan was made on a grade or quality different from the base grade or quality used to determine the PIK. In that case, the quantity will be adjusted to reflect that difference.

In addition to taking the 30% PIK diversion plus the 20% original set-aside, a farmer can bid to divert his whole crop acreage base. However, no more than 50% of the crop acreage base for any county may be diverted, so these extra-diversion bids will be subject to acceptance by the USDA.

The Texas Corn Growers Association has copies outlining the PIK program available to local producers at its office at 112-A W. Bedford St. in Dimmitt. Congressman Kent Hance's office provided the program outline by telex after consulting with the USDA.

"We're still studying the provisions of the program," King said. "After reviewing the PIK program in its entirety, the farmers and commodity groups in our area, will recommend to the Administration any changes we feel are needed in this program."

King emphasized that the finer points of the program are still being ironed out, and urged individual farmers to make their recommendations through their commodity groups or directly to their congressman or to the Administration.

On Jan. 21, King will join Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Ford and spokesmen for other commodity groups and farm organizations in a series of PIK call-in programs in Lubbock and Amarillo.

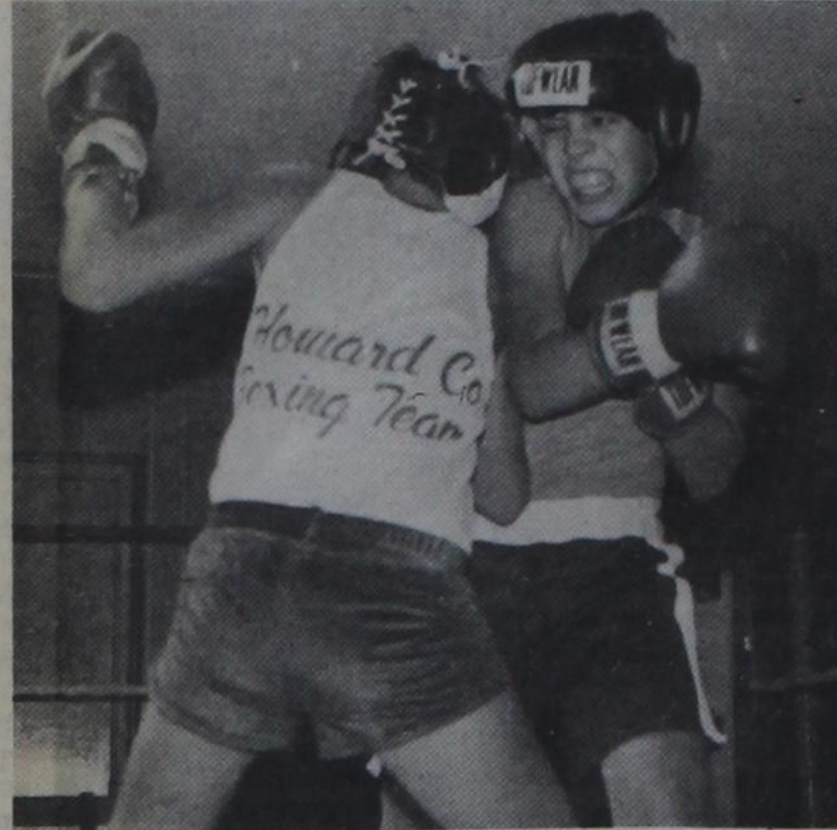
"That will be the biggest chance for farmers in this area to get their licks in — to tell Mr. Ford what they like or don't like about the PIK program and to get some changes in it," King said. "Mr. Ford is from our area, he understands our situation here and has been very responsive to our suggestions."

One major part of the program that still must be worked out, King said, is how the PIK commodities will be marketed after farmers take possession.

"We've got to work out a lot of problems regarding the orderly marketing procedure," he said. "We're recommending right now that farmers market 10% of their PIK commodities per month, but it's not written in as part of the provisions. That's something we're going to have to discuss with the Administration."

At least a hundred other questions are likely to be asked about the program, and we're willing to work with anybody who wants to give their input," King said.

He added, "Just because the Texas Corn Growers played a major role in initiating this program, that doesn't mean that what we have is everything we recommended. But the concept is there, and we are high on this program. It isn't a complete cure, but we feel like this is a first step in alleviating surpluses."

**Observation wells will be checked**

Castro County's 89 water level observation wells in the High Plains Water District's network will be measured and tagged with an identification sticker during this month by Jerry Funck.

The wells are part of a large network of more than 950 observation water wells located throughout the District's 15-county service area. They are annually measured for their "static" depth-to-water levels.

Since its creation more than 30 years ago, the District has kept records of the annual change in water levels and the rate of change of the water table in the aquifer. This data is used for making projections of water use rates, for determining the amount of water left in storage, and as a basis

for the income tax depletion allowance claims on landowners' tax returns.

In 1982, the average change in depth-to-water in the portion of Castro County within the District was a decline of 2.23 hundredths of a foot. Readings of the depth-to-water table below surface ranged from a minimum of 84 feet to a maximum depth of 321 feet.

**Roadwork is slowed**

Highway reconstruction work in progress around Dimmitt has been hampered by the unfavorable weather conditions of the last week and a half, according to Rhea Bradley, Supervising Resident Engineer of the Littlefield Residency, State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation.

W. D. Turner Construction Co., the contractor for the work on SH 86 from east of Dimmitt to the Swisher County line, was only able to work seven days during the past month.

On that project, base material has been placed to within five miles of the Swisher County line, while surface material has been placed from Dimmitt up to six miles east.

Salvaging and replacing base on the SH 86 project west of Dimmitt has progressed one mile from the Parmer County line east. Also, work of extending culverts is near completion.

Estimated completion dates for the two projects are the summer of 1983 for the east project and September of 1983 for the west project.

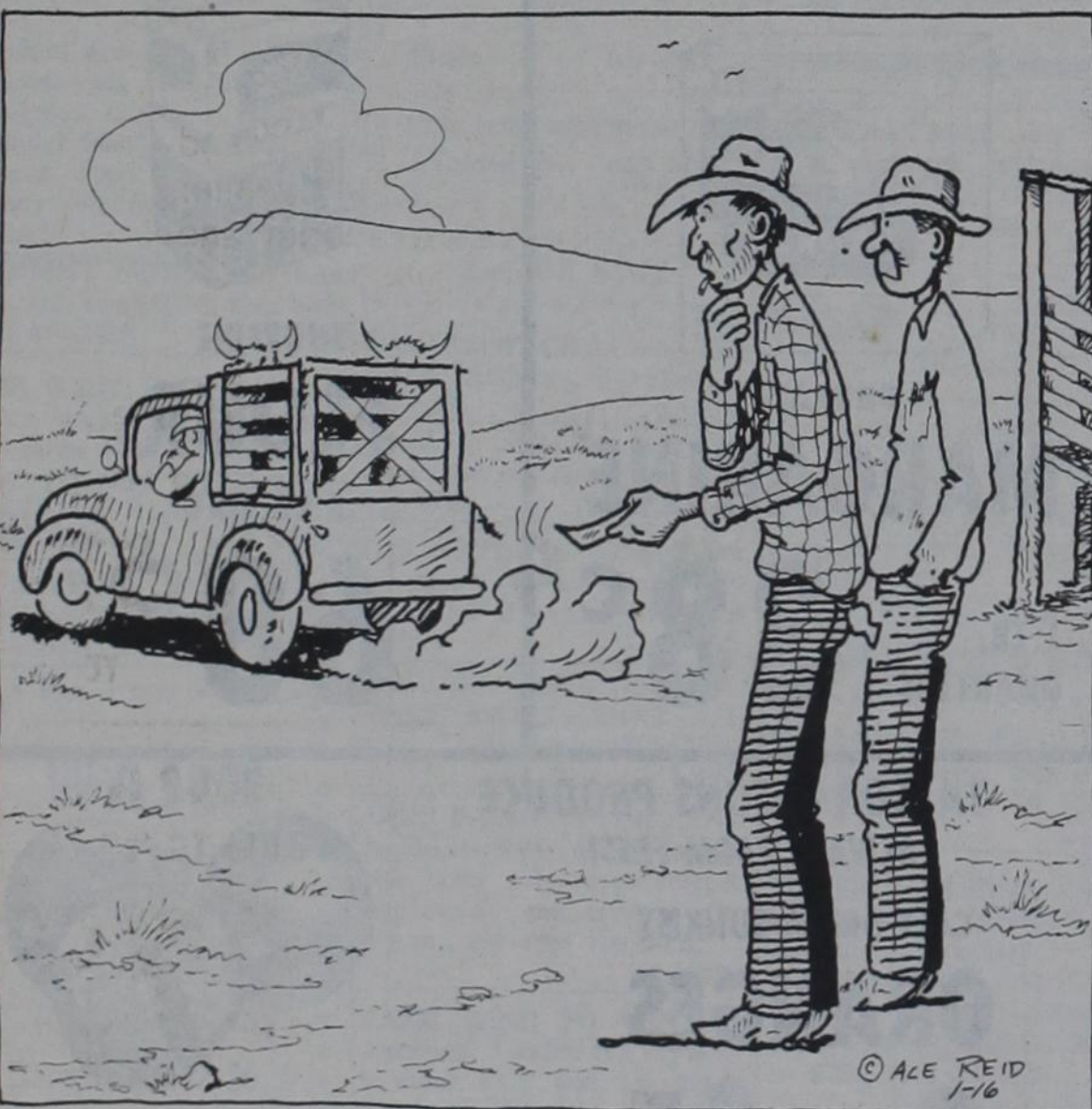

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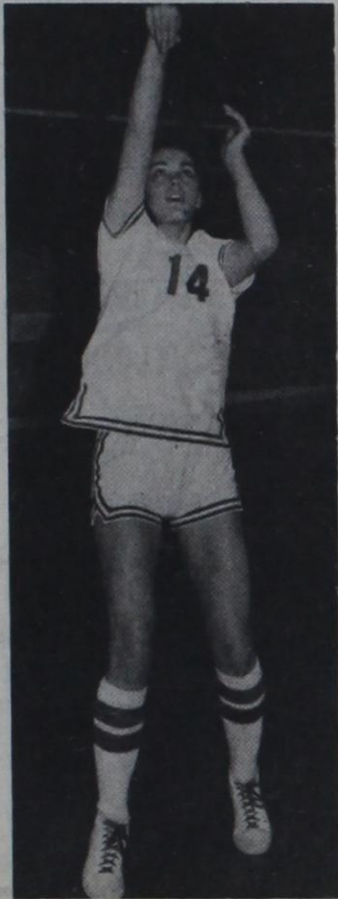

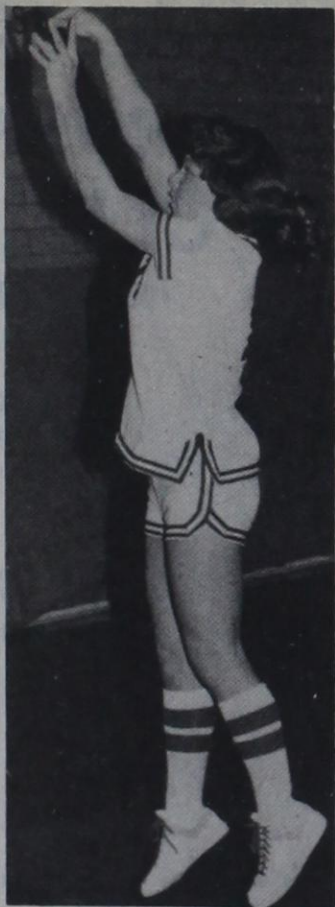

The last time Dimmitt and Abernathy met was in the semifinals of last year's Region I Tournament in Lubbock. The Bobcats won that one, 61-57.

Friday the two teams will meet again, but this time it's in the opening game of the District 2-AAA race.

Game time is 8 p.m. in Abernathy, and the bout is expected to be one of the highlights of the district title run.

The two teams met twice last year — in the regional semis, and in a pre-season game which Abernathy won, 68-60.

The Bobcats and Antelopes are picked to finish first and second, respectively, in the district by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC).

The two teams have developed a good rivalry over the past few years, and Dimmitt Coach Ken Cleveland expects Abernathy to be "playing 10 foot tall" in Friday's contest.

Cleveland said the tall Antelopes have a well-balanced team.

"That's what makes them tough," he said. "One of their strong points is that they really go to the boards — they get a lot of rebounds."

Dimmitt, now 20-0, also floors a well-balanced squad, with three starters averaging double figures.

Expected to start for Abernathy are Ed Teal, 6-3 post; Larry Perkins, 5-10 guard; Sammy Galloway, 6-0 forward; Allen Lester, 6-5 post; and Cletus Irlbeck 5-6 guard.

"Teal moved in this year," Cleveland said. "He is averaging 18 points and 16 rebounds a game. That's a lot of rebounds. He's a good basketball player."

"Larry Perkins is a good outside shooter," Cleveland said. "He can hit if you let him shoot."

"Galloway averages 16 points and 12 rebounds a game. He's the boy that beat us last year at Dimmitt, and almost beat us at regional. His main strength is that he

really crashes the boards and gets a lot of offensive rebounds.

"Lester is a good second-shot fellow also," Cleveland said. "Irlbeck has been a starter for three years. He's their ball handler. He is all over the floor and can hurt a team."

For the Bobcats, Kevin Cleveland is averaging 21 points a game, John Smith 16 points, Jeff Watts 12 points and eight rebounds, John King eight points and nine rebounds, and Fermin Gonzales six points.

Coach Cleveland expects a hard-played physical ball game.

"They play very aggressive. They foul a lot, and our kids will have to not let that get under their skin," Cleveland said.

"We hope to keep our

players out of foul trouble, and we'll really have to box out on defense."

In the girls' game, Coach Jimmy Hoyle's young Bobbies are expected to have their hands full when they go up against the highly touted Lady Lopes.

The Abernathy girls are currently ranked No. 10 in the state by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. The only Class AAA team in the area with a higher ranking is Slaton, No. 7.

The Bobbies have already run up against the Lady Lopes once — in the third-place game of the Canyon Tournament a month ago. Abernathy won that one, 66-36.

Playing a Top 20 team will be almost "business as usual" for the Bobbies, who met six state-ranked teams in their pre-district schedule.

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# Can Swiftettes do it again?

For the past few years the big question in Nazareth has been, can the girls do it again?

And every year the question has been answered with yet another state basketball championship, an unprecedented six all together.

As the question pops up again this year, coach Joe Lombard and his Swiftettes are hoping to answer it with a seventh consecutive Class A state crown.

The Swiftettes, now 17-2, opened their District 6-A title run Tuesday with an 88-12 win over Happy. The Swiftettes play at Cotton Center Friday, then they meet Amherst and Lazbuddie and on Jan. 25 they host Sudan.

Although Lombard and the Swiftettes like to take things one game at a time, the Sudan clash will be lingering in their minds.

Sudan ranked No. 1 in Class A in the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches poll, returns four of five starters, has a new coach at the helm, and will pose a definite threat to Nazareth's six-year dominance in the Class A ranks.

Sudan played the Swiftettes closer than anyone in the playoffs last year, losing the

two district meetings by a total of only six points. Following a 47-42 bi-district win over Whitharral, the Swiftettes blasted opponents by as much as 30 points all the way to the state championship.

This year the two powerhouse teams could meet three times, twice in district play (Jan. 25 at Nazareth, Feb. 11 at Sudan), and possibly again in the Region I finals at Levelland. The team which wins there goes on to Austin.

"Definitely Sudan is the team to beat," Lombard said. But Lombard isn't overlooking Nazareth's other district opponents.

As for Sudan, "this year

they are bigger and more disciplined," Lombard said. "They are not likely to score as many points, but they will play a more controlled game and execute their offense better."

"We are capable of playing different styles this year. We'll have to out rebound them for sure, and our post players will have to play good games against them."

"The key to us winning will be our rebounding and containing their post players, 6-0 and 5-10."

Nazareth's posts are 5-7

senior Annette Hoelting (averaging 8 points and 5 rebounds a game), and 5-8 junior Renee Ramaekers (averaging 11 points and 6 rebounds).

Shari Schilling, a 5-8 junior, (11 points and 5 boards a game.) comes off the bench to provide an extra spark for Nazareth.

Senior forwards Rhonda Hoelting (averaging 9 points, 4 assists and 3 steals) and Sharon Birkenfeld (9 points) provide the outside scoring attack for the Swiftettes, along with point guard Leona Gerber (10 points a game).

Depth will be an aid to the Swiftettes this season, as they like to use their "run and jump" press and keep the pressure applied on defense.

Miss Schilling comes off the bench to help, along with sophomore forward LaDawn Schmucker, and freshman Ramona Heiman.

Depth, a good press, Lombard's always disciplined offensive attack and intimi-

dating defense, plus improved rebounding could carry the Swiftettes a long way this year. But, can they win a seventh state title?

"Anything and everything is possible if you want it badly enough," Lombard said. "We won't be able to do it with just five. Everyone will have to play well every game."

"I'm confident we can win state again," said Rhonda Hoelting. Miss Hoelting said the advantages of having won six times will be a help.

"We know what it's like to be there, and we should play calm and cool in the big games."

Lombard's key to success in the past (159-15) win-loss record and four state titles) has been to produce a team which plays consistently with poise, discipline and confidence. This year's edition of the Swiftettes should be the same.

Can the Swiftettes win again? It's possible, and if you consider their past record, it's quite likely.

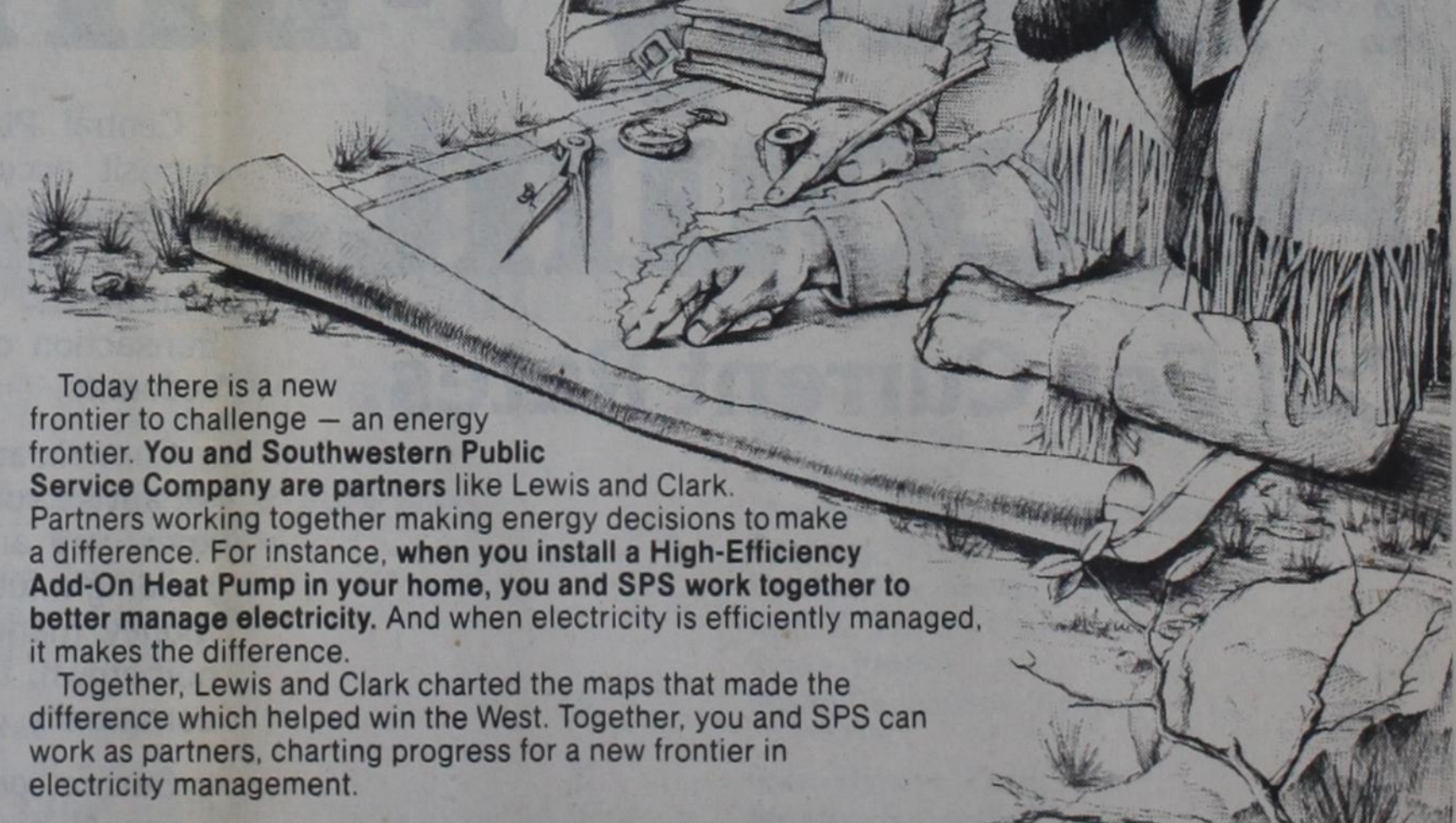

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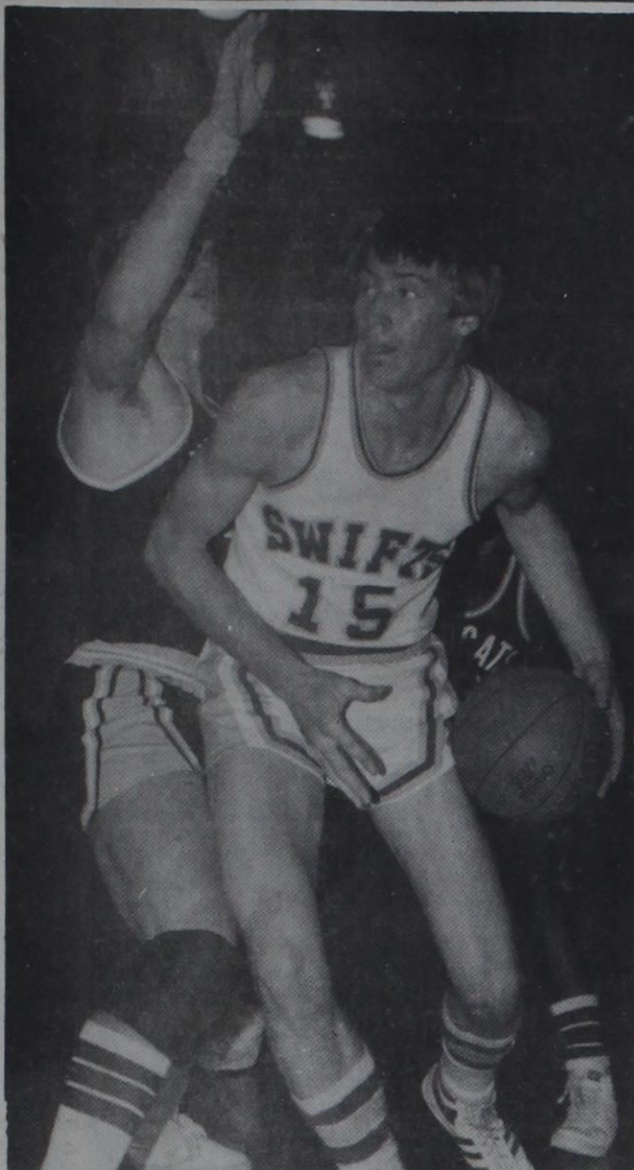

Hart's girls got off on the right foot Tuesday night as they opened District 5-AA play with a 47-44 win over Farwell.

The Lady Longhorns brought an impressive 11-3 record into the Tuesday contest, finishing second in two tournaments and winning consolation in another.

Lady Horn Coach Ken Hoskins feels that depth and overall ability to score will be his team's strong points in their run for a first-ever district championship.

"I think we're as good as anybody in the district right now," Hoskins said. "It will be a good race, and I don't see anybody going through undefeated."

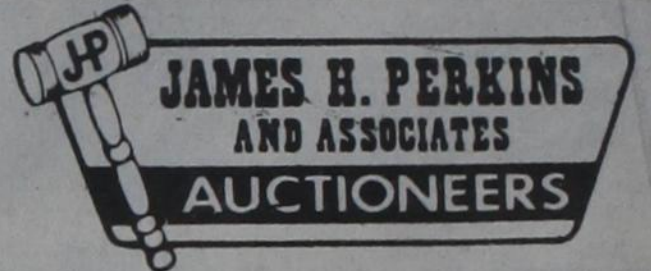
