## YARBOROUGH MADE GREAT RECORD AS ASST. ATTY. GENERAL

Forty million dollars in cash and mineral rights that District Judge Ralph Yarborough of Austin won for the State Permanent School Fund while he was assistant attorney general—1931 to 1937—constitutes one of the main features of the record on which he is running for attorney general, Yarborough declared in

a speech at San Angelo a few nights ago.

"It was my privilege, while assistant attorney general, to carry the banner of the people into sixty battles in the courtroom," Yarborough said, "in one case, recovering \$1,073,500 for the school fund—the second biggest cash judgment ever collected by the state."

Yarborough promises to take an active part in the trial of major cases involving the rights of the people; to enforce the laws against trusts, monopolies and combinations in restraint of trade, and to try the \$17,000,000 anti-trust suit now pending.

Judge Yarborough was born in Henderson county, graduated from Tyler high school, earned his way through Sam Houston State Teachers College, and the University of Texas law schools by waiting on tables at a student boarding house, teaching one-room schools in the piney woods, by waiting on tables as a student working as a harvest hand in the wheat fields and as a tank-builder in the oil fields. He is judge of the 53rd district court and presiding judge of the 32-county

## One Minute Sermon BY REV. A. V. BRADLEY

WHY DOES GOD PERMIT GOOD PEOPLE TO SUFFER?

"Yet man is born unto trouble, as the sparks fly upward."—Job 5: 7.

"Man that is born of woman is of few days, and full of trouble."—Job 14: 1.

The problem of suffering is an age-old problem. The mystery of pain has baffled scientists for centuries. Some say, "If God is loving, kind, tender, all-powerful, why does He permit good people to suffer?" Why does He not give the world peace, happiness and health? Why is not health contagious rather than disease?

Countless numbers of tragedies are happening. Why lions die in war, or suffer untold pain from it. The Titanic does not God intervene and keep them from happening. Millions with sixteen hundred losing their lives. Drouths and famines have caused thousands to lose their lives. The New London school tragedy caused the death of hundreds of innocent children. Loved ones toss on beds of affliction for years with excruciating pain. Why all this, when God has all power to keep it from happening? you ask. If only the evil suffered perhaps, we could explain the problem; but pain, disease and disasters are no respecter of persons and conditions. The choicest of saints suffer. Fanny Crosby, the blind song writer, thanked her Lord for her affliction; it kept her close to His side. Robert Hall, a noted preacher, never preached without suffering great pain. Paul indicated that he had some kind of suffering great pain. Paul indicated that he had some the Lord." Jesus on the cross, cried out in pain and agony, "My God, My God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

The Christian explanation to this is that God is not responsible for man's carelessness. The Titanic could have been saved, if they had heeded the message that came before the disaster. The New London happening could be explained, as some one was careless with the gas and heating system. God is not to blame. Nowhere in the Bible do we find Christians exempted from suffering. "In this world ye shall have tribulations." If tragedies only struck the wicked, then, if you were a Christian, you could get into an airplane and jump a thousand feet to the ground, and God would have to suspend the law of gravitation in order to protect your life. You could drink poison, and God would have to perform a miracle to cure you. You could step in front of an automobile, and say, "I am a Christian, you can't hit me," but God would again have to stop the law of speed to save you. No, the Lord gave each one of us enough brain to think these things out for ourselves. "Whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth." There are times when we need punishment. Some things come upon us to enrich and mellow our lives. "It is good for me that I have been afflicted," said a writer, and we explain it in this poem:

"Not till the loom is silent,  
And the shuttle ceases to fly,  
Shall God unroll the canvas,  
And explain the reason why;  
The dark threads are as needful,  
In the weaver's skilled hand,  
As the threads of gold and silver,  
In the pattern he has planned."
