Bronte School Has A Splendid Opening Exercise

The Bronte schools opened their doors for their 1938-1939 session Monday morning. The formal opening exercises were held in the assembly hall beginning at nine o'clock.

Superintendent B. B. Covey, through his untiring efforts during the summer had everything in perfect readiness for the opening of the session and therefore everything moved off without a hitch.

The formal exercises were inspirational. Superintendent Covey presiding, the following program was carried out:

Invocation by Rev. J. H. Thompson, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church; Address by Rev. A. V. Bradley, pastor of the Bronte Baptist church; address by L. T. Youngblood, president First National Bank. The program was interspersed with special features. Miss Berda McGibany gave a reading that greatly delighted the audience.

Prof. J. H. Hamblen, school band director and who has general charge of the music for the school, sang a bass solo, "Bells of the Sea" that was indeed pleasing to those present.

Supt. Covey spoke encouragingly and hopefully as to the outlook of the school for the present year. He asked for and encouraged everybody to give their cooperative support to the school; likewise, he spoke positively as to the fact that the students were expected to do their work with a vim and that discipline, not arbitrarily, but impartially and kindly but firmly is to be administered.
