More than 30 prominent registered Hereford breeders of West and Central Texas have entered animals in the auction sale to be held March 4, second day of the Eighth Annual San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo, it was announced last night. The sale will start at 9 o'clock and will be the eighth auction to be held in connection with the show. The stock show acts as agent and is sponsor of the sale. In past years receipts from these sales have aggregated several thousand dollars and several hundred animals have changed hands.

Accommodations and facilities for buyers were improved and enlarged last year when a huge sales ring was constructed in the center of the cluster of livestock barns at the Fairgrounds. This year's sale is expected to attract buyers from over the Southwest in greater numbers than ever before.
