## W. A. Glenn, Old Time West Texan, Dies, Buried Here

One by one, the oldtime pioneers of West Texas are passing—indeed, their ranks are thinned until not many of this heroic generation remain.

W. A. Glenn, more than fifty years a resident of West Texas, died Sunday evening, May 28, 1939, at the home of a son, Hermon Glenn, at Ben Ficklin, near San Angelo. Interment was in Fairview cemetery, at Bronte, Monday afternoon, following religious services at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Carrie Williams, in Bronte.

Religious services were conducted by Rev. J. E. Eldridge, pastor of the Bronte Baptist church. The religious services were simple and quiet and beautifully impressive. The church choir sang softly the hymns of the church—just such songs as always bring comfort and strength to the human heart when it is under great stress, and the minister spoke hopeful words concerning the resurrection—such words as always reassure the soul when it is under cloud and shadow and loneliness and sorrow.

Deceased was a native Texan. He was born at Elkhart, Texas, July 4, 1853. But, more than a half century ago, he came with his family to West Texas and settled at Ballinger where for many years he farmed and engaged in the gin business. In his gin operations, he made quite a broad acquaintance throughout Runnels and Coke counties. About twenty years ago Mr. Glenn came with his family to Bronte and made his home here since that time, until recently he went to be with his son at Ben Ficklin, where the lamp of his life went out and he passed on forever from this great West Texas land which he loved so dearly, to "the land where we'll never grow old."

May 29, 1884, deceased and Miss Ollie Swaim, who died April 2, 1937, were united in marriage at Moody, Texas. To them six surviving children were born. The daughters are Mrs. Carrie Williams, Bronte; Miss Gladys Glenn, Abilene; Mrs. F. G. Guitard, Waco; the sons are C. C. Glenn, Bronte; James Glenn, Maverick; Hermon Glenn, San Angelo.

A brother also, Dan Glenn, Palestine and a sister, Mrs. W. H. Hewitt, Houston, survive, neither of whom was present for the funeral.

It was approximately forty years ago—to be exact in 1900—the writer first met W. A. Glenn. He was then in the strength of his years—he and his wife were busy rearing their children and building their (Continued on last page)

## HISTORY OF THE BRONTE ENTERPRISE

Following is the theme of Miss Merle Ash on her graduation from Bronte high school last week. We print the theme not only because we are directly interested of course, but also it contains history that can thus be preserved.

"The Bronte Enterprise" is the name of the local newspaper of Bronte. It was established in the year of 1907 by Mr. C. H. Bently who came to Bronte from Tennessee at the time the railroad had just entered the town. At this time the town was small but gradually growing. Mr. Bently gave the paper its present name.

Due to the drouth and crop failure of 1909 and 1910, the town did not grow much and naturally the newspaper didn't either. Mr. Bently sold the paper and plant to D. M. West who then resided at Miles and owned a paper there. Mr. West employed Mr. C. W. Goff, once an editorial writer of leading dailies, to help him carry on both publications.

Mr. West kept the paper until 1912 and then sold the publication to T. R. Butler. Mr. Butler had been a resident of Bronte and was engaged in the drug business. He published the paper awhile but soon sold it to A. J. Nelson.

The paper continued until about 1916 and then suspended publication. About 1918 Mr. J. D. Scott, who now resides at Lubbock, Texas, bought the plant and began the publication of the local paper again. George Scott, son of J. D. Scott, owner of the paper in 1918 was the man after whom the American Legion of Bronte is named, he being the only Bronte boy who went over seas and did not return.

In 1920 Mr. J. D. Scott sold the plant and business to Mr. W. C. Redman. In January, 1923 Mr. Redman sold a half interest to D. M. West, who was pastor of the Baptist church. He assumed the job as editorial manager. Later in the year Mr. West bought Mr. Redman's interest and became sole owner.

Mr. West began modernizing the printing plant. In 1924 he installed new type faces, a modern country newspaper printing press and other equipment, finishing the installation of a modern printing plant by installing one of the latest models of type setting machines.

At the establishment of the newspaper, it was printed on a large job press. It was rather difficult to read and it took a long time to get the paper printed. When Mr. West bought the paper in 1910, he installed a Washington hand press which would print two pages at a time. The present equipment is modern.

Mr. West bought the present business home of the Enterprise in 1924 and moved into it. The paper has operated continuously ever since.

The circulation has increased. At the present it covers all of the Bronte territory.

The Bronte Enterprise, owned by D. M. West, is one of the attractions of Bronte.

The pictures were made available through A. C. Williams, president of the Federal Land Bank at Houston. M. A. Butner, secretary-treasurer of the local Farm Loan Association, expressed himself as more than delighted both with the pictures and the large and interested way in which the large number attending, enjoyed the show.

The pictures included the following: Big Bend National Park; Scenes in the Davis Mountains; Fat Stock Shows at Fort Worth and Houston; Cowboys' Reunion at Stamford; Champion Fat Calves, Horses and Hogs at the Fat Stock Shows; Rose Festival at San Antonio, and Butchering dressing and trimming hogs. Every picture was of fullest interest and the large numbers in attendance were pleased with the pictures, which were not only instructive and full of information but also provoked much delight in the minds of those who saw the pictures.

Mr. Butner speaking to The Enterprise gave some interesting information relative to the Bronte Farm Loan Association and its activities:

There is at present 136 Land Bank Loans in force, amounting to \$319,450.00. There are 53 Commissioner's loans which amount to \$83,300.00. This is indeed a goodly sum the farmers of this part of the country are using of federal money, and at low rate of interest, which makes it possible for them to keep their farm homes.

Mr. Butner expresses appreciation to one and all for the interest they showed in the picture show Saturday afternoon.

**Equine Encephalomyelitis Or Sleeping Sickness In Horses**

(Continued from last week)  
While this paper was being typed, the November 1938 issue of Science came over my desk. In it there is an article of great importance in furthering our knowledge on the possible reservoirs of virus of encephalomyelitis. This article entitled "The Occurrence in Nature of 'Equine Encephalomyelitis' in the Ring-Necked Pheasant," by Ernest Edward Tyzzer, Andrew Watson Sellards, and Bryon L. Bennett records the recovery of the equine virus from 3 pheasants, received October 6, 1938, from a locality in Connecticut. The virus was found to be of the eastern equine type. There were reports that many dead, wild birds as well as pheasants, were found following the hurricane of September 21. The birds studied were more or less paralyzed. The virus recovered from these birds was inoculated into quail and these birds were also found to be susceptible. The finding of the virus of equine encephalomy-

ylitis in birds in nature is the first proof that we have had that this disease exists naturally in species other than the horse and man.

I would like to quote you the summary of this article: "Summary: The recognition of a series of cases of equine encephalomyelitis in pheasants adds valuable information concerning the distribution of this disease, and the designation 'equine' becomes an unfortunate misnomer. Indeed, it may be seriously questioned whether the horse or other domestic animals play any essential role in assuring the perpetuation of this disease. The present demonstration of the natural occurrence of the infection in game birds and the experimental evidence obtained by Remlinger and Bailly of the susceptibility of migratory birds to certain strains of encephalomyelitis suggest an easy mode for the wide distribution of this virus. A search for spontaneous infection in migratory birds is indicated. Extensive surveys will be required in order to know just how widely the infection is spread in nature. It may be only under accidental circumstances or when the infection rises to a certain level that it overflows and becomes a serious problem as regards the horse and even the human being.

During October this year we received reports of the occurrence of a disease amongst wild ducks in Montana in an area where sleeping sickness was prevalent at the time. The symptoms exhibited by the ducks consisted of paralysis or weakness of the wings and legs, later prostration, and eventually death in many cases. These

symptoms were suggestive of encephalomyelitis such as we had often seen in experimentally inoculated birds and although botulism and alkali poisoning had been considered, we were still very desirous to determine if possible whether or not the virus of sleeping sickness might be the causative agent.
