Sweetwater To Have Celebration July Fourth

Sweetwater, June 26, Anywhere from five to 10,000 people in this section of West Texas are expected to attend the July 4th free celebration at Lake Sweetwater next Tuesday, sponsored by the local Board of City Development.

The day's program gets under way at 9:30 with golf matches, followed by long distance swimming contests for boys and girls at 10, basket picnic at noon and amateur boat races at 2 p. m. A bathing beauty revue to select "Miss Sweetwater" for 1939 is to be held at 7:30 and the celebration closes with a dance on the roof of the Blue Bonnet Hotel at 9:30. An amateur camera contest is scheduled to run throughout the day.

Thrills galore are promised in the boat races, open to any owner of a boat in West Texas who has not raced for money prizes. There is to be 12 divisions: three races of a mile each for boats of small horsepower and nine of five miles each for boats with more powerful motors, including inboard, outboard vs. inboard, and aqualane race and a free-for-oil. Prizes to winners range from one quart of oil to five gallons of gasoline plus four quarts of oil plus a 2-lb. tube of grease.

As a fitting climax to the celebration at the lake, "Miss Sweetwater" is to be crowned at the close of a bathing beauty revue to be held on the lawn near the lake club house. Some 12 to 15 girls are to compete for the title, which carries with it a beautiful loving cup and a trip to Mineral Wells July 14-15 to compete for the honors of "Miss Texas" and a trip to both the San Francisco and New York expositions. Winner of second place gets \$10 and winner of third \$5 in cash.

Lou Wolfson, executive director of Casa Manana at Fort Worth will crown the winner. He and Miss Lauretta Jefferson, dance director of Casa Manana, will attend the revue and select one of the girls to represent Sweetwater in the Fort Worth "Texas Sweetheart No. 1" contest. She may or may not be the winner of the local revue.

Ray Maddox and his 10-piece orchestra will play for the dance, which is open to the public. A grand march of beauty entries is scheduled for 10 p. m. and the dance will close at 1:00 a. m.

In addition to the taxes, interest and penalty, there will be such court costs as may accrue.

Such taxes constitute a lien created by the Constitution against the property, and this lien will be foreclosed in a proper suit instituted for that purpose.

to notify the mill, and the entomologist will call on them immediately, Mr. Fox said. Working with county agents, Mr. McCann will make regular calls to the various communities, inspect cotton crops, give the farmers advice on insect control and assist them in spreading the poison.

"We are offering this free service," Mr. Fox said, "because insects each year are cutting a

wide swath into the farm income. Insect control has become a serious problem on West Texas farms in recent years, and steps must be taken immediately if the farmers' incomes from the staple are to be saved."

Mr. Fox urged cotton raisers to take advantage of Mr. McCann's services, and asked that they get in touch either with their county agent or directly with the mill.
