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## Bronte Schools Enroll 362 Pupils First Day

The Bronte schools entered upon their 1939-1940 session, Monday morning, September 11, under most favorable and happy auspices.

Much of the preliminary work of launching the school into its work had been accomplished by superintendent B. B. Covey and members of the faculty in registering some of the pupils of the schools last week.

Formal opening exercises were held in the school auditorium from nine to ten o'clock Monday morning. Rev. C. R. Hardy, pastor of the Methodist church, was the speaker of the occasion. Rev. Hardy extended congratulations to the superintendent, other members of the faculty, the board of trustees, the parents and members of the student body, in the happy circumstances in which the school began its year's work. The speaker also gave emphasis to the necessity of cooperation all along the line, on the part of every one concerned.

At some length, yet not tediously, Superintendent Covey outlined as to the school's regulations, its ideals and so forth and expressed the fact that it was expected of everyone that he would do right.

The new members of the faculty were presented and received a cheering welcome. The new teachers are Mrs. Dooley, Miss Duckworth, Mr. Teague and Mr. Horn.

Superintendent Covey informs The Enterprise that 362 pupils were registered the first day. Quite a number of new pupils were recognized and welcomed—the largest number, perhaps, coming from the Marie school, which school has formed a working coalition with the Bronte schools for this year.

It was a matter of much satisfaction to the large number in the audience to note the acoustics of the auditorium have been greatly improved during the summer by the work that had been done to remedy the acoustics which were desperately bad. But, now, one in the audience can hear distinctly what the speaker at the platform may say.

So, the schools are off to a good start for the year—may it continue so and when the last days shall come next spring may the school year have been all that each and all who are interested may have hoped for it to be.

## Bank Installs Photographic Account Machine

That the First National Bank in Bronte is in the forefront and its president, L. T. Youngblood, and associates, proposes to keep it that way is evidenced in the bank's last acquisition in the matter of completely modern accounting methods.

The bank has purchased and installed a recordak, which is indeed a wonderful machine and has wrought wonders in the matter of perfect work in the accounting department of any bank or other business institution that installs same.

The recordak operates on the principle of the moving picture machine and film. A check, or note, or other legal instrument of which the bank desires to keep an unending and unquestionable record, is run through the machine. A miniature film is made of the check, or other instrument. The film is developed. Then, it can be run through the recordak, which enlarges the film to the same size of the check or instrument in question. And there, plain as daylight, is the "life-size" photograph of the instrument in question. No guessing, no wondering, about any check or instrument that may have been lost in the due process of business transactions. There the check, or note, is in "life-size" photostatic form, showing everything that was on the face of the original check or note, or instrument.

Wonders indeed are coming to pass these "latter days."

## School Home Ec. Girls Complete 34 Projects

Bronte High school offered this summer for the first time home projects in homemaking under the direction of Mrs. Marie B. Wilson. Twenty-nine girls completed thirty-four home projects during the summer months.

Some of the projects were: raising chickens, canning surplus foods, improvement of yards, bedrooms and kitchens. Many summer and school wardrobes were also completed by the girls.

Other projects completed during the summer by the girls included four bedroom clothes closets, six bedrooms improved, six pieces of furniture were made and some kitchens were improved.

As a result of the canning project 78 pints of meat, 1729 pints of vegetables, 1307 pints of fruit, 416 pints of jelly and preserves, 302 pints of sauer kraut and pickles were canned. A total of 3832 pints of food were preserved. In addition to this many meals were prepared by the girls.

In addition to the individual projects each group of girls completed a group project of improving the homemaking department. In this project curtains were made, furniture refinished and reupholstered.

The summer project work was brought to an end by exhibits of completed work shown in openhouse Wednesday, Sept. 6.

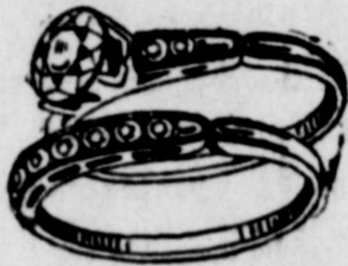
