


MIDWEST EXPOSITION PLANS COMPLETED

Grounds and buildings of the Midwest Exposition at Sweetwater will be alive with activity for the next two weeks as preparations go forward for the 1939 fair, which opens on Tuesday, October 24, and continues through Saturday, October 28. According to President Austin Jordan and Secretary George Barber the fair will be larger and much better in every department than it was last year. Exhibits of FFA chapters, 4-H club boys, club girls and club women will vie with community exhibits in attracting attention of the thousands of fair visitors. The Hereford cattle. dairy cattle sheep, goats and poultry exhibits are expected to reflect progress of the eight counties participating, namely: Nolan, Fisher, Scurry, Mitchell, Coke, Runnels; Taylor and Jones. Three new departments have been added: a quilt show, a flower show and an art exhibit.

Distribution of the 3,000 premium catalogues was started last week and any person in the eight counties involved who de-

ties are expected to dclare a half holiday on the opening afternoon of the Exposition.
