## STATE HIGHWAY NO. 158 BETWEEN BRONTE AND ROBERT LEE TO BE COMPLETED

The assurance of the completion of State Highway No. 158 between Bronte and Robert Lee has been given by the announcement in Austin of the State Highway Commission's approval of a State Highway WPA Project on a five mile section of this highway. This section is from the Mountain Creek Bridge, within the City limits of Robert Lee, East five miles and calls for grade, drainage, structures and surface or a finished job. On the completion of this program, which will take about ten months, we believe that we have the assurance that the Commission will approve another program from the East end of this five miles into Bronte on a finished basis, thereby giving us a surfaced highway from Bronte to Robert Lee.

It being the policy of the Highway Commission to surface all highways as soon as possible after the caliche has been finished, we are reasonably assured that highway No. 298 from Robert Lee South to its intersection with the present hard surface and highway No. 109 from Bronte East to Ballinger will be hard surfaced this Summer or soon thereafter. Therefore with the completion of the Bronte-Robert Lee Highway No. 158 we should not have any highways left in Coke County to work except Highway No. 158 West to Sterling City and Highway No. 208 North to Colorado City.

Referring to the Sterling City Highway No. 158 and to the Colorado City Highway No. 208 and the possibility of their early completion, I see no reason why we should not be able to continue this Highway Program that we have now in operation. For the past five years we have averaged \$100,000.00 per year, for the year ahead, 1940, if we get that which we anticipate, it will amount to more than \$100,000.00. I believe that we can continue this average and if we do, within the next five years we will have gone a long way on the completion of the Sterling City highway No. 158 and the Colorado City Highway No. 208. However we have a hard fight ahead of us and it is going to take time, patience and lots of hard work to get the job done, but with the continued effort we will succeed.

For your information I quote a part of a speech delivered by Brady Gentry, Chairman of the State Highway Commission, his speech in part:

"There are 26,000 miles in the Texas highway system. Of this mileage, 3,500 miles might be termed "paper" designations. The Highway Commission, by official action, has signified that roads in this classification should be constructed to give the state a well-rounded system of roads, but no funds are available for their improvement.

There are 5500 miles in the State system that have no surface of any kind.

An additional 5,500 miles are obsolete when considered in the light of present traffic needs and should be rebuilt immediately.

There are only 12,000 miles in the State system today that can be classed as adequate to meet existing traffic demands.

It would cost more than \$400,000,000.00 to bring the present system up to modern standards, yet the highway department has only \$25,000,000.00 for construction. On this basis, it would require sixteen years to give Texas a modernized highway system.

In addition, about 400 miles of the present adequate highways annually will become obsolete.

To extend highway facilities where needed badly, Texas should add another 400 miles yearly to its primary road system. If these two items above mentioned were met, the entire revenue of the Highway Department would be consumed annually."

Take in consideration the above statement as made by Hon. Brady and you will see what difficulties confront us in securing highway construction in Coke County. However if we continue the present average of \$100,000.00 per year, we will complete all highways in Coke County long before the sixteen years are ended, but we must keep in mind that the hard work for this completion of our highways lays ahead of us and not behind.

### INFLUENZA ON INCREASE IN TEXAS; PREVENTIVE RULES

Austin, Texas Feb. 1—Reports from widely separated parts of Texas to the State Health Department indicate that influenza is on the increase. Recent snows and markedly colder weather account for the upswing in influenza prevalence, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Influenza is believed transmissible from person to person through mucous discharges from the nose and throat. To protect yourself and others from contracting influenza or colds, here are precautions to be followed:

Influenza is highly infectious. Practically everyone is susceptible to it. No matter how many times you may have had influenza, you may contract it again. Therefore, keep away from people who are sneezing, coughing or sniffing, or who are actively ill with colds, influenza or pneumonia.

Keep away from crowded places.

Never use towels, glasses, or personal articles other than your own to which the cold germs might adhere, and always wash your hands before eating. Keep yourself as fit as possible. Drink plenty of water, eat simple nourishing food, exercise out of doors every day, dress according to the weather, and get plenty of sleep in a well-ventilated room.

If you feel an attack of flu, or even what you may think is an ordinary cold, coming on, go to bed. If the cold becomes worse, send for your physician and follow his directions. A cold can too easily develop into a fatal mistake.

### WEST CENTRAL TEXAS LIVESTOCK SHOW OUTLOOK FINE

Abilene, February 1.—With entries already received from F. F. A. and 4-H club members of seven of the 13 counties eligible to show in the West Central Texas Livestock Show in Abilene February 14-15, officials of the exposition are predicting the largest number of exhibits in the history of the show and are already making arrangements for extra stall space at the West Texas Fair Grounds.

"Entries received indicate that approximately 400 lambs, 150 calves, and 200 hogs will be exhibited," J. L. Moore, show manager, said recently. "This will be a substantial increase over last year and is an excellent indication of the improved program of F. F. A. and 4-H club work in the area."

The show will open at 9 a. m. February 14, with judging of the Taylor County division, a new addition to the program. At 1:30 p. m., the Taylor Hereford Breeders Association will hold its first annual auction sale under direction of Earl Gartin, auctioneer.

February 15, judging of animals will begin at 9 a. m. and auction sale of the champion and reserve champion animals will be held at 1:30 p. m.

Counties which have already sent in entries for the show are: Callahan, Mitchell, Taylor, Fisher, Nolan, Haskell and Coleman.

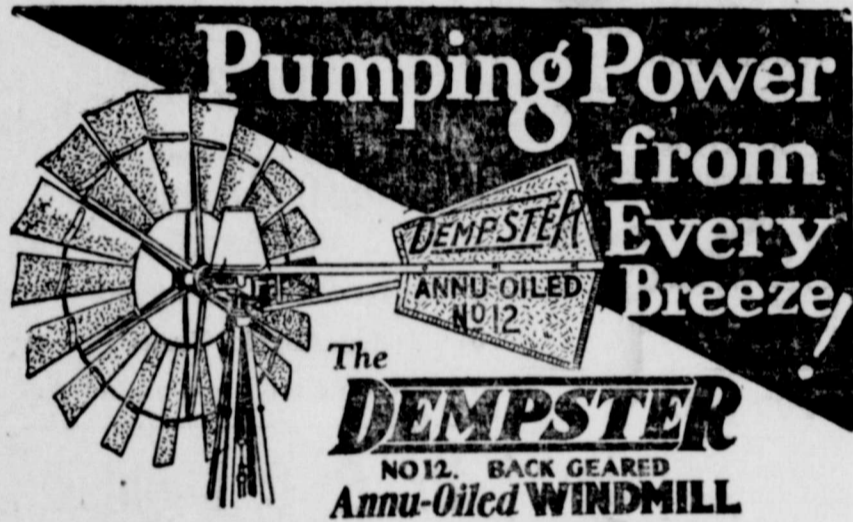
