Visitors will be taken on inspection trips through the camps and work projects.

The CCC gives every boy between the ages of seventeen and twenty-three a chance to work, to love, to learn, to build.

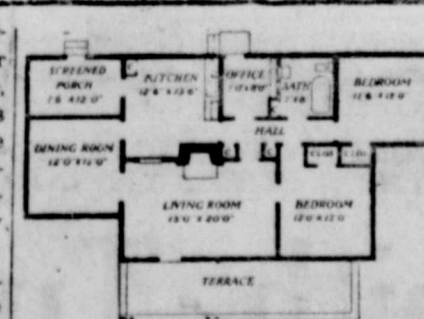
Low-Cost Home Answers Private Or Defense Need



RECOMMENDED by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for either city or country residence, this "House of the Month" is planned to appeal not only to the prospective owner of a low-cost private home but also to the developer planning to build in quantity to fill defense housing needs.

It was designed by Ernest Langford, architect and head of the Texas State School of Architecture, and was one of the plans selected at President Roosevelt's Conference on Home Ownership.

Both for beauty and to insure long life, the use of pure white lead paint is recommended, not only for the original coats but also for repainting in future years. This old reliable paint, approved by Government experts, is outstanding in its durability, and keeps an even surface throughout its long lifetime at a minimum maintenance cost.



The bedrooms, living room and dining room have cross ventilation. An insulated stove in the kitchen, together with mechanical ventilation, will keep this room comfortable in hot weather. And insulation under the roof or in the first floor ceiling will keep the whole house comfortable, and will save fuel cost a winter.

The floor plan layout is about ideal. A hall gives access to every room in the house except the dining room. The living room, dining room and kitchen are well related to one another, and the same relation holds for the bedrooms and bathroom. Large windows provide plenty of light and air. The screened porch suggests many convenient uses.

MEASLES EPIDEMIC ON THE UPSWING THROUGHOUT TEXAS

Austin, Texas, March 25.—The annual spring upswing in measles prevalence is evident from reports to the State Health Department by more than 300 city and county health officers throughout the State.

The prevalence of measles was 338 per cent higher than normal prevalence for last week, figured on a seven-year median, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. There were 1,416 cases reported for the eleventh week of the year, ending March 11, and the median number of cases for the week over a seven-year period since measles is a disease was 420.

which should always be given careful nursing, with isolation of the patient to protect others against the disease, and since it is characteristic of the disease that it usually becomes more prevalent in the spring season, the State Health Department issues his warning to the parents of Texas children—guard your children against mistaken for a common cold, this disease, put them to bed immediately, call your family physician, and see that cases are promptly reported to the local health officers, and that your home is properly placarded.

The stage of measles preceding the eruption is frequently mistaken for a common cold, and as the disease is highly communicable at this stage the germs are widely spread because as a rule, we take no common-sense precautions either in treating or protecting others from a common cold. Measles causes a congestion and inflammation of the respiratory tract, the delicate membrane that lines the eyelids and the accessory sinuses—these conditions make complications of

the disease fairly common. Complications may take the form of bronchitis, pneumonia, and acute inflammation of the middle ear.

This disease is particularly dangerous in the very young children. It is a serious mistake to expose a small child to measles so that he will have it before school age, because the mortality rate for measles and its complications is much lower

among children of school age than younger children.

The very young children who have recently recovered from respiratory diseases or who are undernourished should be given the opportunity for protection if they are exposed to measles. Prevention or modification of measles is a very successful procedure if the physician is given opportunity within a short time after exposure to the disease.

DEBT ADJUSTER TO HOLD MEETING FOR BURDENED FARMERS

Mr. Guy H. Tomlinson, who has charge of farm debt adjustment work in District XV, will be in Robert Lee on Friday, March 28, for the annual meeting of the Coke county Farm Debt Adjustment Committee. The meeting will be held FSA office and all farmers who are burdened with more debts than they can ever pay are invited.

"One of the best things a farmer can do to withstand the shock of the European war and our defense effort," Mr. Tomlinson said, "is to get his financial house in order. Struggling along under a top-heavy debt load these uncertain times is like trying to cross a swollen and flooded stream in an overloaded rowboat."

He explained that the farm debt adjustment committee which is composed of local men, helps farmers and their credit-

ors to work out an agreement which brings the farmer's debts within his ability to pay.

Most creditors have found it more to their advantage to grant adjustments in the debts of over-burdened farmers and permit them to continue farming rather than foreclose on their land or chattels, according to Mr. Tomlinson. Services of the farm debt adjustment committee, which works under auspices of the Farm Security Administration, are free and confidential.
