U. S. Will Aid Blighted Farm Areas

Washington, October 6—The government will extend whatever aid possible through the Farm Credit Administration and the Work Projects Administration to farmers in northeastern Texas and northwestern Louisiana, where unusually short crops are reported because of weather conditions.

Representative Lindley Beckworth (Dem.) of Texas, who represents the Third Congressional District, composed of the counties of Camp, Gregg, Panoia, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt and Wood, has been in correspondence with the various agencies of the government through which aid might be extended to the farmers of this district.

Beer Signs go

NEW STATE LAW EFFECTIVE SOON

Removal of thousands of outdoor beer advertising signs, a requirement of a new state law effective Oct. 2, will begin immediately. The Liquor Control Board announced today.

The statute allows 120 days for full compliance. The first regulatory law of its kind in Texas, it restricts retailers to one exterior sign carrying the word "beer" in letters not more than 12 inches high and no advertising.

Brand advertising is permitted only on billboards and electric signs having a surface of 180 square feet or more—and these cannot be closer than 200 feet to a retail establishment.

O'Daniel Tells Texans Result Of Cotton Bill

Washington, October 6—Senator W. Lee O'Daniel told a Texas radio audience Sunday that the Federal Government had made a ruling permitting exportation to Canada of 1,500,000 bales of American cotton for use in materials bought by the United States. He said:

"A short time ago I told you I had discovered that the Federal Government was buying cotton goods manufactured in Canada from cotton grown in Brazil.

"When this discovery was made, the senator from the cotton-growing state of Mississippi, Jim Eastland, and I introduced a bill to make it unlawful for the Federal Government to spend our taxpayers' money for foreign grown cotton when we have such large stocks of our own American-grown cotton stored in our warehouses which we cannot sell. I had several conferences with some of the federal officials and after we explained our position after introducing this bill, we fully, the Federal Government made a ruling that will permit exporting as much as 1,500,000 bales of our own American grown cotton, so American cotton can be used in Canada instead of Brazilian cotton.

30-Year Test Of Soybeans Is Success

College Station, Tex., Oct. 6—After experimenting with some hundreds of varieties of soybeans for more than thirty years and finding none perfectly adapted to Texas' climate, rainfall and soils, it now begins to appear that the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of A. & M. College is on the threshold of success and Texas farmers may have a new source of revenue.

The department of agronomy of the experiment station gradually is building up a few superior types of soybeans for seed production by farmers of the state. Many obstacles have been overcome by the experiment station and the task is far from complete. Even if the college is able to produce superior hardy beans it will be necessary for landowners first to use them to produce seed for future crops.

Thus successful and consistent production of soybeans in Texas is at least two seasons distant, but E. B. Reynolds, chief of the division of agronomy, believes the farmers eventually will get their share of the million being paid growers of soybeans in the United States.

A crop of 110,000,000 bushels of soybeans will be grown in the United States this year, most of it in the corn belt. That means \$90,000,000 will be put in the pockets of farmers.

The Great Oil Mystery!

Was ever any problem in national affairs handled more unwisely than the notorious gas and oil "shortage" on the eastern Seaboard?

From the beginning Washington, through its bureau savants and their guess men, acted with an unexampled genius for doing the wrong thing.

The result is that the American citizen today wonders distrustfully what it was all about. He still does not understand. He has the uneasy suspicion that somebody in Washington was trying to put over a fast one. Deplorable? Indeed, yes!

But can you blame the American citizen? Or should not blame be put squarely where it belongs, on the shoulders of conniving bureaucrats and their guess men?

If one reviews the known facts in the light of a calm, good-tempered determination to get the truth, no other answer is possible. The administration can thank itself for the bungling of the oil problem and the consequent unrest in the minds of the people.

First we were told there was an alarming shortage of gasoline. Conservation was necessary in the East. The people of the United States must gird their loins—and their jalopies—for sacrifice. We were living in dark hours and we must play our part. That sort of thing! The first way we must play our part was to have gasolineless Sundays; twelve-hour night closing of filling stations; cutting the use of gas and oil by various percentages—in this land of ours, which is not merely promised land but a promised land that came true and is today our glorious heritage—here, where the country does overflow with oil and honey and plenty of corn and wine—here we were threatened with ration cards for our family bus. And why? Were the oil well drying up?

It took a long time to get any clear idea of why we were having an oil shortage. Eventually, somebody admitted that there was no oil shortage at all. There was a shortage of ships to carry the oil from the West to the East; most of the tankers were carrying oil to great Britain.

After that the first peep of protest that came to our attention was a letter from a Liberty reader. It was written in mid-summer and was published in Vox Pop as follows: I am asking Harold Ickes to enlighten the poor dumb public as to why, with plenty of gas in the Gulf States and 19,000 idle tank cars to transport it, there should be a shortage in the Eastern States.

Two months later, Mr. J. J. Pelley, representing the American railroads, made the same statement. With what result? One official in Washington declared that even if we had the oil and the tank cars to transport it, still the people of the Eastern States should ride less, because some day there might really be an oil shortage.

Upon which there came the outcry from the opposition forces that there was only a fake shortage, being dramatized to "condition" the American people for war and rationing.

This was denied with shudders of patriotic virtue. The jowls of the bureaucrats quivered. They weren't angry; they were only

trouble, terrible hurt.

Now comes Mayor LaGuardia to pour oil on the troubled Atlantic Coast. The tank cars, says the Little Flower, will help solve everything. The oil curfew will be soon a thing of the past.

All of which means what, if anything.

It means what we have said here again and again a lack of frankness on the part of some of our employees. Officials and bureaucrats, men of small mental capacity and even smaller spirit, mean men who think it statesmanship to hornswoggle their employers—who are the American voters—those fellows are not ready to trust their bosses with the facts. They act as if we, by whose tolerance they are in office with a weekly pay check, are not quite right in the head. We are to be managed, conditioned, "softened up," led around by the nose!

And what that really means is serious! It means those men do not believe in the will of the people, their intelligence or their authority. They think they have to govern us by subterfuge. Some day they will cast aside the false whiskers, when they think they can govern us by sheer force. They are officials of a democratic government but they believe in totalitarianism. That is why such men are a danger. They are a threat to our free institutions.

This is a country run by the people. We are not infants to be told bogey stories or cajoled with a sugar nipple. We want the facts, and, by the living God, we are going to get them!—Liberty Magazine, October 11.
