Autumn Best Time To Recoup Vitality Lost Through Past Year's Work

Crisis Causing Fewer Homes, Rainey Says

Austin, Nov. 5.—A delay in marriages and establishment of homes due to the national emergency was seen today by President Home P. Rainey of the University of Texas in a panel discussion before delegates to the annual convention of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Rainey expressed the opinion educational trends were shifting toward training 500,000 skilled craftsmen annually for the defense program as compared with 6,000 in the past.

"Since more young men will enter defense work," he asserted, "there will be a delay in marriage and in the establishment of homes. More than 40 per cent of the young married people between the ages of 16 and 25 already live with their parents."

Mitchell Youth Shows Top Pig

Sweetwater, Oct. 31—Merrill Hart of Mitchell county won the grand champion of Sears, Roebuck and company's six-county 4-H club boys' pig show here Friday afternoon. Vernon Edwards of Fisher county exhibited the reserve champion.

The grand champion received a \$10 cash award, in addition to a registered Jersey heifer.

Each of the first place winners from the six counties received a registered Jersey.

Hart's gilt was a Duroc Jersey, Edwards' was a Hampshire. The show was judged by E. H. Regenbreit of the swine husbandry department of the Texas Extension service. He said the boys showed much progress since the 1940 show, of which he was also judge.

Winners in the six counties were:

Edwards, Fisher county; Hart Mitchell county; Merrill Cooper, Nolan; Walter Ellard, Scurry; T. J. Sherrod, Kent; and Roy B. Hart, Stonewall.—Sweetwater Reporter.

"DOES THAT STAR-SPANGLED BANNER YET WAVE"

"Oh, say, does that star-spangled banner yet wave—"

Seen day after day on our Snyder High School grounds is dear Old Glory—symbol of the patriotism of every true American student enrolled in our schools.

To see the stars and stripes reminds us that we still have a free nation in which we can send this generation and all the rest to come if we are able to teach them the rights and love of humanity.

It is necessary now more than ever that we be reminded daily of our country's need of complete patriotism and loyalty and what better way would be than to start in schools and let our children teach us loyalty to our flag and to America—"the land of the free and the home of the brave."

However, as between Greenland and Iceland we prefer to travel.

"The American way of life is full of superlatives; we have the tallest Sky-Scrapers, the fastest trains, the greatest number of automobiles. We spend more per capita on vacations than any other nation. However, due to high speed, we usually crowd our summer vacation with such a high speed program that we fail to secure sufficient real physical relaxation," states Dr. Geo. Cox, State Health Officer.

"For most persons the exactness of office, or factory or of home for a 50-week stretch reflect themselves in the need for improving one's physical tone. However, to expect the majority of vacationists to change their habits regarding the diversions of a summer sojourn perhaps would be asking too much. The point is if one has burned up additional energies and perhaps called on his physical reserve to weather through the 'good-time' vacation, an excellent opportunity now exists to make amends by taking advantage of the stimulating autumn weather.

"In fact, the best season of the year to recoup vitality lost through the past years work now is here. Its possibilities to build up general health and bodily resistance to winter's onslaught can not be over estimated.

"To recoup some of the vigor and abounding health which have been lost due to the strains and stresses of the past twelve months, the following program is suggested: 1. a brisk walk every day; city streets will do, if one is denied the open country; 2. seven to eight hours' sleep, depending upon one's personal requirements, in a properly ventilated room each night; occasional breakovers will not be serious drawbacks, but the habit should be established and maintained; 3. acut down on stimulants, if at present any are being used excessively; 4. a reasonable intake of nourishing food; 5. elimination of self-drugging of any type, relying solely upon the physician for medical treatment, if he considers it to be indicated; 6. proper daily elimination; 7. an attempt to keep worry, even in these troublous times, within bounds; and finally, to make use of the autumn weekends by being in the open as much as possible.

"Putting autumn, as well as plain common sense, to work for your health in this manner, is an experiment which should be helpful as well as healthful to many."

UNITING ENGLISH SPEAKING PEOPLE

"Is it too soon to hope?" asked Henry George in 1877, "that it may be the mission of this republic to unite all nations of English speech, whether they grow beneath the Northern Star or Southern Cross, in a league which by insuring justice, promoting peace and liberating commerce, will be the forerunner of a worldwide federation that will make war the possibility of a past age, and turn to works of usefulness the enormous forces now are dedicated to destruction?"

It wasn't too soon to hope in 1877. It isn't too soon to hope in 1941 for such an ideal. Just now the "enormous forces dedicated to destruction" are bigger and more terrible than at any point in history. But the chances for enlightenment are proportionately huge.—Ex.—

and at the Fred Roe Ranch. Producers who have horses which will meet the following standards should show horses at either of these places. Horses that will not meet the specifications should not be shown.

Specifications for the animals being purchased follow:

- (a) Kind—Sturdy; symmetrically conformed; reasonable well balanced; a good foot; closely ribbed; a short back suitable to take an army saddle; strong legs sufficiently well placed and directed to let him MOVE Straight. Horses must be gentle and allow all four feet to be handled.
- (b) Height—15.0 to 15.3 hands, and up to 16 hands if mature.
- (c) Weight—From 1,000 to 1,200 pounds, according to height.
- (d) Age—4 to 8 years old.
- (e) Sex—Geldings, and a few mares of outstanding quality and substance.
- (f) Color—Bay, brown, black, chestnut, very dark duns and roans when of exceptional quality and substance.

Explanatory Notes. The Half-Bred type is preferred, but any Good horse meeting requirements is suitable. The Poor Keeping type is unsuitable. 15.2 hands (matured) is the ideal height. Three-year-olds will be purchased. A four-year-old should have four lateral teeth in full wear.

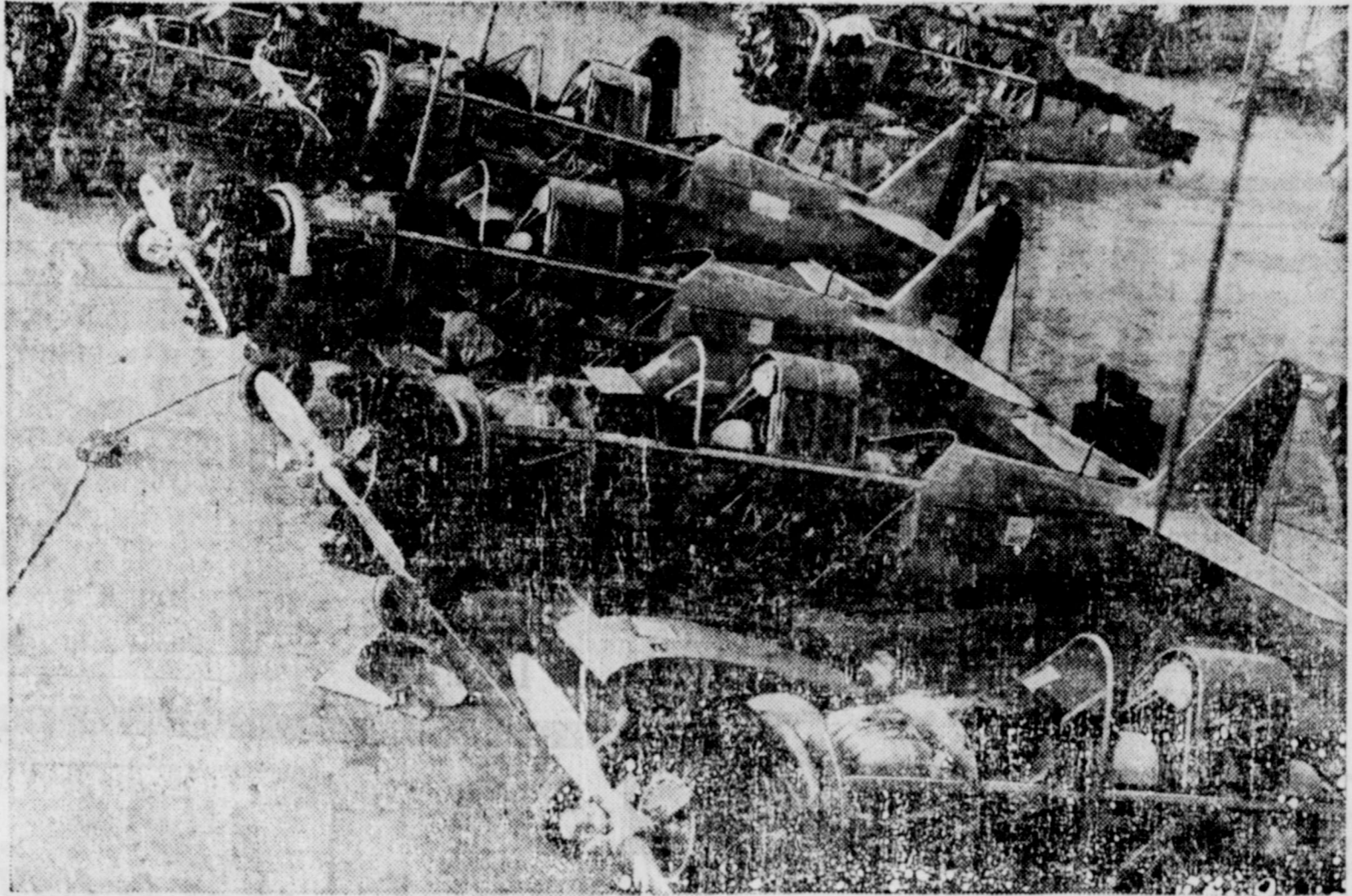
