Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kirchman received a letter the other day from their son, Leslie, who is in the marines. Leslie was hurt and was at the marine hospital at New Orleans. The letter below shows that Leslie is "game," and is living up to the spirit of the average Coke County boy who goes into the service of his country.

The letter follows:

New Orleans, La.  
March 18, 1942.

Dearest Folks:

Will drop you a few lines to let you know that I am getting along o. k.

How is everyone getting along at home? I received your letter alright and was glad to hear from you! I had not had a letter in a month or so.

I was not badly hurt and I will be getting out of the hospital about Saturday. I don't know whether they will send me back to New York or not. New York is my home port. I am not allowed to tell anything about what happened—so don't worry, for I will come through alright wherever I go. I have not remained in one place more than two days since I left Little Creek. I don't know where for you to address me, but wherever I go I will let you know where to write me.

Well, mom, this is about all I know this time and I will let you know where I go from here.

Bye bye, with love,  
Toad.

### Aged Citizen Dies at the Home Of His Son

J. C. W. Beaty died unexpectedly at the home of his son, L. W. Beaty, three miles northwest of Bronte, Friday morning, March 20, 1942, at the ripe age of ninety years.

Deceased was born in Missouri but came to Texas when he was two years old, and was a resident of Texas for eighty-eight years.

Interment was in Bronte cemetery, Sunday afternoon, following religious services at the Bronte Church of Christ, conducted by Elder J. P. Crenshaw, Church of Christ minister from San Angelo.

### Former Bronte Boy Dies at Ozona, Suddenly

Friends of the boy's parents and grandparents were grieved when the news came Thursday morning that Mervin McLaughlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. McLaughlin, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Fletcher, died suddenly, at the family home, at Ozona, early that morning. The Ozona Stockman gave the following account of the boy's unexpected death, and his popularity there in the school and the other circles in which he moved: "Mervin, one of the most popular students on the campus of Ozona High School, was apparently in the best of health yesterday, according to his parents. He had played tennis with companions for a time after school hours Wednesday afternoon and ate a hearty supper.

"He had retired around ten o'clock but his father came home about 10:30 and the lad got up to help the elder McLaughlin to unload a truck load of feed. This task was completed and the pair returned home at midnight.

Hearing an unusual noise in the night, Mrs. McLaughlin was awakened. She ran to her son's bedside to find him dying. He lived but a few minutes after his mother reached him.

"Young McLaughlin was a junior in Ozona High School. He was a member of the championship football team at the beginning of the season, but early in the season suffered a broken leg in a practice session, which put him out of athletics throughout the football season. He had recovered enough, however, to play basketball this season, and was an accomplished tennis player.

"He was born October 19, 1924. Surviving are the parents and one sister, Louise McLaughlin, freshman student in Ozona High School.

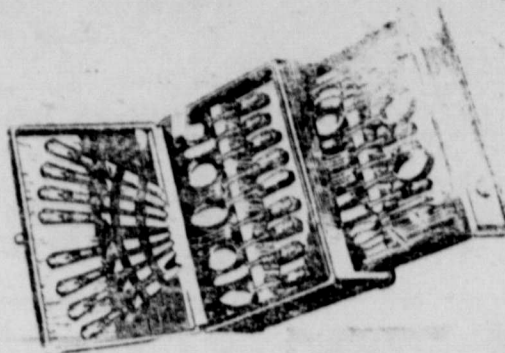

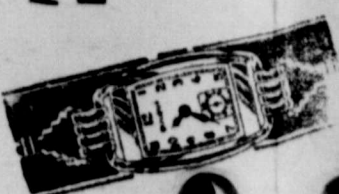

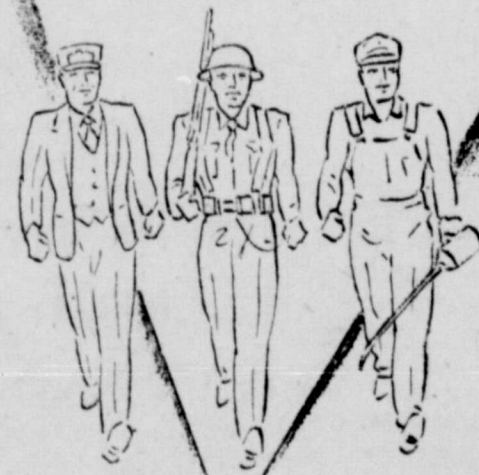
