## Hail Does Considerable Damage in Two Nearby Communities, is Report

The rains fell at intervals over the week end. One of the heaviest downpours was Saturday afternoon—then again Sunday afternoon.

Saturday afternoon the hail in the Hayrick community to the northwest of Bronte, and in the Kickapoo church community, to the north of Bronte, was heavy. In the former community, far as The Enterprise has learned, there was much damage to the fruit and growing gardens. A. M. Wynne suffered heavily in the loss of apricots from the trees. In the same community Earl Brock had a brooder house blown over by the heavy winds, in which he had 14 hens and 265 baby chicks. All the hens and chicks, too, were killed.

In the Kickapoo community the hail was heavy, with also a heavy downpour of rain. Mrs. M. A. Butner had a wonderful garden, with beans in bloom. The garden was destroyed, according to reports, by the pellets of hail.

The rains fell at different times during the first part of the week which have been most beneficial to the weeds and grass and also has put the ground in season for planting, and the farmers are losing no time, in getting their field seed in the ground.

## South Opposed Major Naval Bills, Fisher Reveals in Brady Speech

Brady, Texas, April 17.—Citing the Congressional Record for his authority District Attorney O. C. Fisher of San Angelo, candidate for Congress, linked Congressman South with stands taken by pre-war Isolationists in Congress, in a radio speech here today.

The speaker charged South had opposed some major pre-war Naval appropriations, including the Billion-dollar Naval Expansion bill of 1938, "even as the war hovered close to our shores."

Congressman South had spoken here last week, in which he defended his pre-war Congressional record.

Taking note of South's reference to "rabble-rousing opportunists," Fisher said "simple candor and good faith with the people" impelled him to take issue with the Congressman.

Citing the record, the District Attorney pointed to two Administration-sponsored major Naval appropriation measures opposed by South, wherein he accused South of having gone "contrary to the advice and judgment of the President and of our Military and Naval experts."

These measures included an appropriation in 1936 for laying down two \$51,000,000 battle-ships, which was upheld by a House vote of 212 to 73.

The candidate referred to opposition to the President's Naval Expansion program as having come chiefly from Isolationists in Congress. Opposition to the Neutrality revision proposal, he said, "was led by such well-known Isolationists as Senator Wheeler in the Senate and Hamilton Fish and Vito Marcantonio in the House."

## "Observance of the Sabbath," Minister's Theme

The Rev. Lester Haines announced that he is going to begin a revival meeting Sunday, April 26, at Tennyson Methodist church. All the people in and around Tennyson are especially urged to attend this meeting. Speaking of the meeting Rev. Haines said: "Men on this earth never reach the point where they no longer need to confess their mistakes to God, and as that is true it is also true that from time to time we need a reviving of our spirits. In a period of stress and world strife when so many calls are being made upon God it is especially urgent that we keep as near to Him as possible. To that end this meeting is dedicated."

## Plea: Increased Cotton Acreage Allotment to West Texas for War Purposes

The West Texas chamber of commerce is asking the U. S. department of agriculture to allot, on or before June 1, the then unplanted cotton acreage of the 1942 national allotment to those territories which, after that date can still successfully plant and produce cotton. By such a reallocation formula, said a WTCC petition sent to Secretary Claud R. Wickard, West Texas, latest of all planting territories and ideally suited to cotton production, can meet the agriculture department's urging for full planting of allotted acreage to meet war needs for increased fibre and oils.

This year's national acreage allotment has been set at 27,400,000 acres. The petition by the regional chamber pointed out that invariably final plantings in the belt have been far under the allotments, due to unseasonable weather, diversion of cotton lands to other crops, and other factors. Last year the falling off totaled 4,200,000 acres, more than doubling that of 1940.

In West Texas, said the petition, cotton of the 1941 crop was planted as late as July 1, and the region went on to produce 60 per cent of the entire state's 2,555,611 bales ginned prior to March 15, 1942. It was asserted that 19 million available cotton acres in West Texas, and with only 4,355,341 acres allotted for

Stephen F. Austin is known as the "Father of Texas."

The first Secretary of State of the Republic of Texas was Stephen F. Austin, appointed by the first President, Sam Houston.

The first popularly elected administration of the Republic of Texas was inaugurated when the first Congress of the Republic met at Columbia in October 1836.

The first national election held in the Republic of Texas, September, 1836, resulted in the overwhelming victory of Sam Houston over Henry Smith and Stephen F. Austin.

David G. Burnet was named Provisional President of the new Republic of Texas at Washington - on - the - Brazos, where the first government headquarters of Texas were established in March, 1836.

The Congress of the United States accepted the Texas State Constitution on December 29, 1845, which date has been declared by the United States Supreme Court as the actual date of annexation.

The Homestead Law, which provides that Homesteads cannot be taken for debt other than debt contracted in payment for the homestead, was passed by the first congress of the Republic of Texas. It now exists in the constitution and statutes of the state.

Mirabeau B. Lamar, second president of the Republic of Texas, is sometimes referred to as the "Father of Education in Texas" because of the constructive public education legislation which he sponsored.

The slogan of Texas educators, "The cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy," was first spoken by Mirabeau B. Lamar, second President of the Republic of Texas, in his first address to the Texas Congress.

It has been well said: "Oil is where you find it." Bronte citizens believe there is 'oil in them thar hills' near here. And the deep well now being drilled northwest of town, many believe here, will soon prove their contention.

This old waddie had the great pleasure of meeting an old friend here a few days past, in the distinguished person of Bob Campbell, who, now, ranches northwest of town. Bob used to range around Sherwood, Ozona and San Angelo. Bob is a true Texan; a fine gentleman of the old days. ## CADET TRAINING IS OFFERED YOUNG MEN WHO CAN QUALIFY AS SUCH

### SUGGESTIONS FOR INDIVIDUALS PREPARING FOR THE AVIATION CADET QUALIFYING EXAMINATION (MENTAL SCREENING EXAMINATION)

(Editor's note: The Enterprise is in receipt of the information below from the Aviation Cadet Procurement Department Officer at Lubbock, with request that same be published—so that every boy who is interested in flying may have the information given.)

The purpose of the Aviation Cadet Qualifying Examination, is to select men for aviation training who have the aptitudes, skills and knowledge which will enable them to succeed as Bombardiers, Navigators or Pilots in the Aircrew and to become officers in the United States Army Air Forces.

The Qualifying Examination does not measure the sort of specific information or knowledge which can be gained from a few weeks or a few months of special education or training.

It is the policy of the Air Corps however, to encourage men who are planning to take the test to gain as much fundamental training as possible in those studies which are related to the technical side of aviation, which prepares men for success in the ground school, and which develop comprehension, critical judgment, and qualities of leadership. Study and training along these lines will also help to prepare the individual for the qualifying examination.

#### The Following Fields of Study are Suggested as Desirable:

1. Study the scientific method and the basic laws and principles of the physical sciences, especially general science, the weather, and elementary physics. Such study will make it easier for the individual to comprehend and apply principles of flight, to understand the operation of his equipment, and to learn many of the special technical skills which members of the air crew must possess. Knowledge of the applications of the sciences and a background of general scientific information is desirable.

2. Study mathematics, with special emphasis upon speed and accuracy in fundamental mathematical operations. A study of algebra and elementary trigonometry is helpful, but ability to handle simple calculations involving ratios, proportions, decimals, percentages, fractions, and simple formulas is of primary importance. Familiarity in the interpretation and use of tables, graphs, charts and other methods of summa rizing data is desirable.

3. It is necessary for the Cadet to read technical material with comprehension and understanding. He must grasp the meaning of what he reads, be able to apply principles, make interpretations, and see relations to other problems. It is very

desirable that he learn to read and study in this way.

4. In order to be alert to changes in the world in which he lives and to understand the significance of new developments, the cadet should study current history and the background of social and scientific progress. He should have a knowledge of world geography and be able to understand maps. He should be familiar with the changes and developments in science, government, military and world affairs which it is necessary to know in order to comprehend the present world conflict and the purpose of our war effort. Such a background is desirable in the men who are to be trained as officers and leaders in the Army. Other studies will probably be of value but are not essential as the subjects mentioned above.

### AMERICA'S SAFEGUARD FOR ITS FUTURE IS IN ITS HEALTH PROMOTION

Austin, Texas, April 23—Commenting today on the widespread interest and cooperation shown by Texans in the observance of Texas Children's Week, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said that America has no better safe-guard for her future than the promotion of good health in the youth of today.

"Americans have done a great deal in the past to make the United States a better and safer place in which to live the all-important years of childhood," said Dr. Cox, "but in spite of all this, American childhood has not yet been made safe as it can be."

Dr. Cox pointed out that the national emergency naturally adds to the health hazards that already exist an urged parents of every child in Texas to make sure that their children have been immunized against such preventable diseases as diphtheria and smallpox.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that although most babies are born physically sound, the foundation for future health is laid in the first six years of life. All parents must realize that raising child health standards is a job for them especially, Dr. Cox said and added that it is better to keep them from being sick than to try to save their lives when they are ill.
