### Coke's Second Oil Well Drilling Near 2000 Feet

Nicholas No. 1 oil well, on the Mrs. Nicholas farm, one mile west of Fort Chadbourne, which is Coke county's oil well No. 2 in the north part of the county, is drilling right ahead.

The erection of the rig was completed Thursday of last week and the well was spudded in late that night. Yesterday morning, just a week after spudding in, the drilling had reached a depth of 1860 feet. However, it was said to be behind its schedule of drilling, notwithstanding the depth to which the drill had gone.

Nicholas No. 1 is being drilled by the Fain-McGaha Oil Company of Wichita Falls.

The drill had encountered blue shale and lime.

**IMPROVING SHELL TEXTURE ON EGGS**

(By County Agent H. E. Smith)  
Thin shells on eggs are contributing greatly to the losses we are now having on eggs. A lot of eggs have shells of such texture that they cannot be packed or shipped without breaking. This condition can usually be corrected through a change in the management program. Usually when green feed begins to dry up, we notice that shells begin to make their appearance. It is suggested that where a person is having this trouble that they add at least three per cent more alfalfa leaf meal to the rations. This should be a good quality dehydrated alfalfa leaf meal. In addition to this, it is suggested that a handful of fresh oyster shell be sprinkled over the top of the mash at least every other day until the shell condition is corrected. It is a good practice in placing shell in small hoppers that only a small amount be placed in the hoppers and that it be changed whenever it becomes dusty or litter a cumulates in the hoppers.

Correcting the shell condition of eggs will mean that more eggs will go to market and losses from breakage will be reduced to the minimum.

**ICELESS REFRIGERATOR FOR PRESERVING THE QUALITY OF EGGS**

(By County Agent H. E. Smith)  
One of the best means of preserving quality of eggs on the farm prior to their being brought into market is to keep them under refrigeration. This can be mechanical or artificial. Very satisfactory results have been obtained through the use of an iceless refrigerator similar to the old type milk cooler. Plans and specifications for this refrigerator can be obtained thru the Extension Service. This is an MS form No. 443 entitled, "Iceless Refrigerator for Holding Eggs to Check Evaporation and Check Temperature." This type of home made refrigerator can be constructed with very little expense and is an excellent means of keeping up the quality of eggs on the farm especially where they are marketed at least twice a week. When the refrigerator is placed on a porch or some place where there is a good circulation of air, the inside temperature reduced to about 20 degrees over the outside temperature.

An effort should be made to get this information in the hands of the people with surplus eggs for sale this summer and encourage the construction of these refrigerators.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton College;" and

"Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of the said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education. Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting

officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or as appointee who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed by this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

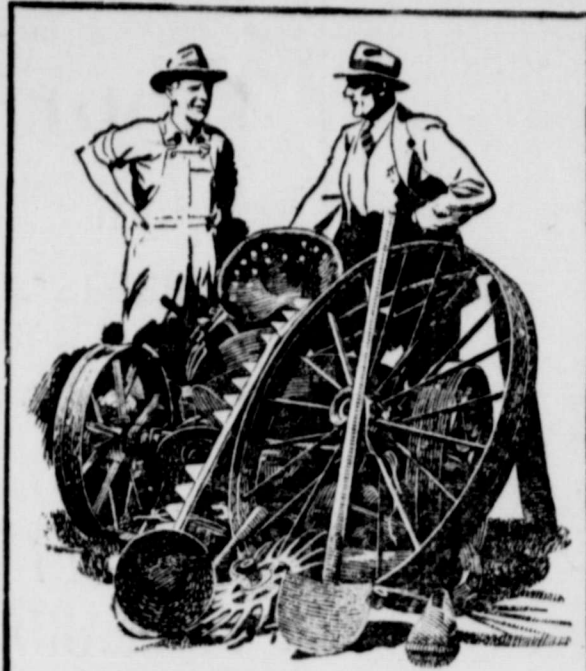
**BRONTE GIRLS SECURE GOOD POSITIONS IN SAN ANTONIO**

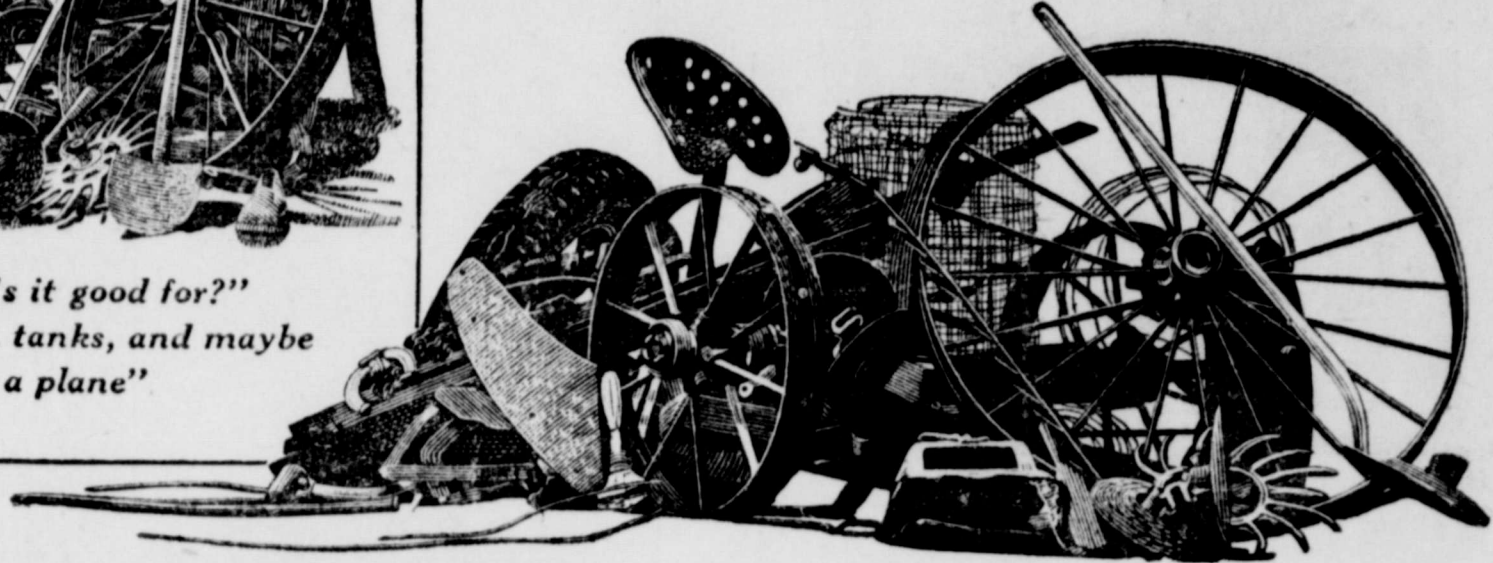

**In the barnyards and gullies of farms and in the basements and attics of homes is a lot of Junk which is doing no good where it is, but which is needed at once to help smash the Japs and Nazis.**

Then—sell it to a Junk dealer, give it to a charity, take it yourself to the nearest collection point, or get in touch with your Local Salvage Committee.

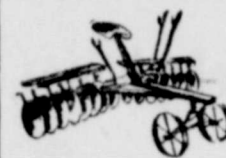

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## War Industry Training Offered Free at San Angelo

Local men and women who wish to obtain training in skilled occupation so that they may make their war contribution and at the same time earn good wages were urged today by L. L. Ruttle, manager of the San Angelo office of the United States Employment Service, to investigate the free training schools now in operation.

These schools are operated jointly by the state and federal governments for the purpose of training people for war jobs. They charge nothing for training, and there are now openings in them for many men and women who wish to prepare themselves for well-paid wartime work, Mr. Ruttle said.

Graduates from National Defense Training schools are needed in such war industries as aircraft manufacturing, shipbuilding, munitions manufacturing and others which exist in Texas. Thousands of trainees who have gone through free schools have been placed in these industries by the United States Employment Service. It is virtually impossible to get a war plant job without training.

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Sheet Metal (including Riveting). Men between the ages of 18 and 65 years, and women between 18 and 45, are wanted to fill classes in these subjects.

The training period lasts from six to 12 weeks, depending on the subject and ability of the trainee to learn it. The trainee may choose the subject in which he is most interested or in which, because of some previous training or experience, he is most likely to make good. The schools in most cases are operated on a 24-hour basis so that employed people may obtain training during the hours of their choice.
