The parkage must not be over 18 inches in length; or not over 42 inches in length and girth combined, and net weight not over 11 pounds. The government asks that the package be not larger than the size of an ordinary shoe box and weight not over six pounds, with not over one package sent each week.

Omit food and send no perishable matter-and be sure to send no matches.

Austin, Texas, September 14-With the nation facing a loss of more than 6 million man days per month in defense industries alone from accidents and illnesses, Dr. Geo. W.
