Coke County Livestock Association Holds Annual Father and Son Meeting

The directors of the Coke County Livestock Association met with the fathers of the FFA and 4-H Club members in the school house at Robert Lee, Friday night.

C. E. Arrott, chairman of the directors, explained that the meeting was to outline the show and the feeding program for this fall and next spring, and to elect new directors. Mr. Arrott made a very important and impressive talk about the importance of the boys and girls feeding pigs, lambs and calves to help produce the meat that is needed by our nation in its war effort. He appealed to the DADS to support these young people and encourage them in every way possible.

H. E. Smith, County Agent, outlined the feeding program to be followed in the county this year and the show which will be held in the spring. The County Agent, then gave the figures that concern the amount of foods in forms of meat that would be necessary to feed the COKE COUNTY BOYS IN THE ARMED FORCES. The amount would be so great that the boys and girls could not produce the total but they can produce the exact required amount of BEEF, PORK AND MUTTON that would be needed. To meet this goal they will have to fatten 51 calves to 800 pounds, 380 lambs to 100 pounds, and 124 hogs to 250 pounds. The show will be on a commercial basis and only fat animals will be shown. The agent stressed the importance of the boys and girls feeding their animals on a commercial basis, select good type feeders (not fancy show stuff) and feed as much home grown feed as possible, and put as economical a gain as possible on the animals.

Mr. D. B. Collingworth, Vocational Agriculture teacher of Robert Lee, gave a good review of the amount of fat animals that were shown in last year's show and how these numbers compare to this year's goals. He made a very interesting explanation of the value of shearing pelts on the feeder lambs and what these would be used for by the army.

O. A. Faith, Vocational Agriculture teacher from Bronte, made a good talk on the importance of the entire cooperation of every one in putting over a program such as the one being undertaken.

Mr. Arrott then opened the meeting for the election of new directors. Mr. Arrott was re-elected chairman; Mr. Raymond Schouler was elected as vice-chairman, and Mr. Collingworth was elected secretary-treasurer. Directors elected were Chas. Copeland, Blackwell; De Lamar Sheppard, Edith; J. S. Walker, Silver; A. B. Sheppard, Divide; Bryan Gartman, Sanco; James Arrott, Tennyson; F. S. Higginbotham, Bronte; H. G. Smith, Wildcat; Jess Eads, Fort Chadbourne, R. L. Reid, Robert Lee, O. A. Faith, Bronte, and H. E. Smith, Coke County.

The newly elected officers met immediately after the general meeting adjourned, and worked out the method to be followed in conducting the show and DONATION SALE to raise funds to sponsor the show. The date of sale was set at November 7, 1942. All producers who have not returned their pledge cards are urged to do so at once or contact the director nearest to them. The show will be held (By H. E. Smith, Cooperative Extension Service Agent for Coke County.)

Chadbourne Singing Day of Song and Happy Fellowship

The Coke County singing convention met at Fort Chadbourne Sunday for its annual singsong meet. The convention meets every three months, but the meeting at this time was the annual meeting at which time the organization elected its officers for another year.

Mrs. Maggie Thomas, who suffered burns when her home was destroyed by fire, Monday evening of last week, died in a hospital in San Angelo, Saturday at noon.

Interment was in Bronte cemetery Sunday afternoon, after religious services at the Bronte Baptist church, conducted by the pastor, assisted by Rev. Lester Haines, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church.

It was a shocking tragedy to the family and the many friends of deceased and her family. It was one of those occurrences to which mankind is heir and which always occurs when least expected. A large concourse of people attended the funeral. Deceased was 69 years old and is survived by seven children, all of whom were present for the funeral.

BENEFITS, COMMODITY DISTRIBUTION TO COKE COUNTR FARMERS

How the commodity distribution program helps Coke County farmers as well as underprivileged families was pointed out in a report released today by P. M. Miller, Abilene, Texas, Acting Area Supervisor for the Agricultural Marketing Administration.

Over \$5,242.16 worth of commodities which were distributed in Coke County from July 1, 1941, to June 30, 1942, represent additional farm markets created by the program, the report showed.

"Farm products often come to market during season in such heavy supply, prices would be ruinous to the farmers if the Agricultural Marketing Administration did not step in and buy part of the crop," Mr. Miller explained.

"The Department of Agriculture feels that commodities thus obtained could not be put to better use than in helping build health and morale among our underprivileged and undernourished families.

"Foods issued to needy families in the county are purchased by AMA and turned over to the State Department of Public Welfare for distribution."

MIGRATORY FARM LABORERS WILL GET GASOLINE FOR TRAVEL

All farm laborers will be able to buy sufficient quantities of gasoline to take them and their crews from one job to another, according to L. L. Tuttle, Manager of the San Angelo office of the United States Employment Service.

The only requirement, Mr. Tuttle said, was that the worker have in his possession a United State Employment Service referral card, which simply directs him to his next place of employment. This card must be presented to the gasoline station manager in order for the worker to obtain any quantity above

"There are thousands of cotton pickers, and other types of migratory farm workers traveling throughout the country by automobile and some of them are under the impression that if they arrive at a destination to assist in saving the crops, they will not be able to return to their homes. This is an erroneous idea. Ample provision will be made for the return of all migratory workers from their destinations to their respective communities", Mr. Tuttle said.

It was emphasized by Mr. Tuttle that in view of the foregoing, it is highly important that all workers who travel by automobile from one farm job to another to secure a referral card immediately. Besides, it is essential, when they finish one job, to have another referral card which will take them on to their next place of employment.

MORE MEN AND WOMEN NEEDED AT FACTORY, TO BUILD AIRPLANES

Texans who can not participate in the war on the fighting battlefronts will still have plenty of opportunity to serve on the production battlefront, officials of North American Aviation, Inc., announced today.

Thousands of additional Texas men and women will be required in the anticipated heavy employment program at North American's Texas Plant, Personnel Director Nate Molinarro said.

"We are confident that Texans will respond, as they have in the past," Molinarro said. "We expect to be able to meet all our personnel requirements from Texas and the adjoining states of the Southwest."

"North American has a big order for manpower and womanpower, but we know Texas can fill it. In the months immediately ahead, we'll need more and more Texans to build airplanes to support the Texans who are writing such magnificent chapters of heroism on the fighting fronts."

Molinarro pointed out that North American had transferred only "a relative handful" of key personnel from its parent factory in California to form the nucleus for its Texas organization in 1940. Since that time, he added, more than 95 per cent of the men and women in the Texas factory have been Texans or residents of the adjoining

southwestern states. More than half of the factory's supervisory personnel today are Texans, a majority of whom had had no previous experience in the aircraft industry before coming to North American.

"Today," he pointed out, "the men transferred from the California plant are in the minority even in the key supervisory personnel of the factory."

Pre-employment training is highly desirable and necessary for applicants for the thousands of jobs to be filled in the big plane plant, Molinarro said. He pointed out that as the war effort is intensified, it will be continually more important that new workers come into the plant with sufficient pre-employment training to enable them to adapt themselves quickly to the vital job of "getting 'em built to keep 'em flying."

North American Aviation does not endorse any aircraft training school, and does not guarantee employment to the graduate of any training course.

National defense schools in Texas, operated by various colleges and local school boards in cooperation with the state department of vocational education, are doing a fine job of training workers for war industries," Molinarro pointed out. "This training is free to the students. There are also a number of reputable private aircraft training schools in which the necessary pre-employment training can be obtained. Each graduate of a training school, whether
