For a day's dietary, one should have a pint to a quart of milk; one egg; 1 serving of meat, poultry, fish, or cheese; 1 serving Irish or sweet potatoes; 1 serving green or yellow vegetable; 1 serving citrus, tomatoes, raw cabbage, strawberries, or melons; 1 other serving fruit; 1 serving whole grain products; other cereals and bread as desired. butter or margarine with vitamins added; some sweets; 6-8 glasses of water.

The government is asking the American farmer to dedicate the remaining weeks of 1942 to an intensified scrap hunt. Steel mills need more heavy scrap and the farms are one of the best sources of this type of metal. We need your further help in this farm drive, and in aiding our salvage committees to continue this effort throughout the next few weeks. Mats and other material to help you are being prepared and will be mailed soon. All salvage committees are being instructed to continue to make available to the farmer all their transportation facilities and manpower, and to cooperate with you in every possible way. GETTING AN EDUCATION

A new rating—aviation electrician's mate—bringing to 50 the number of different specialists in the Navy, was announced this week through the San Angelo Navy Recruiting Sub-station.

Recruiter In Charge Ben Nowak pointed out that men already skilled in the type of work done by any of these 50 types of specialists, ranging from carpenters to office workers, can be enlisted with petty officer ratings, while unskilled men are eligible for technical schools offering training in each of these trades. Thus, Nowak declared, you can complete your education

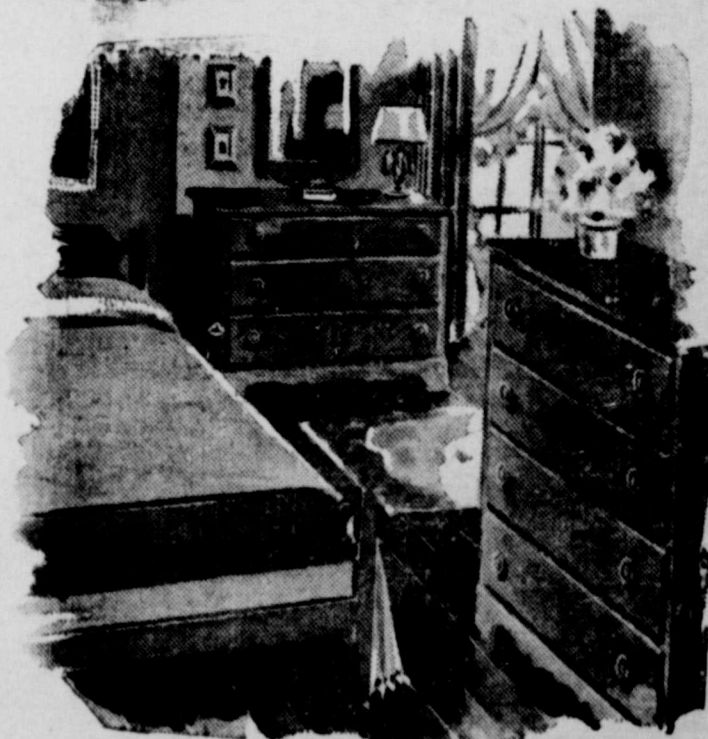
while drawing Navy pay. For more information about these opportunities, men between the ages of 17 and 50—regardless of their draft classifications—should see the Navy recruiter, who is on duty in the San Angelo post office building every day in the week.
