DALLAS, July 1—Purchases of Series E Savings Bonds through Saturday, July 16, will be credited to county and state quotas in the opportunity drive. Mr. Adams said that Texas would substantially exceed its drive quota of \$36,950,000 if sales continue at their present rate. FIVE POLIO PRECAUTIONS ARE LISTED FOR PARENTS

Warning that the 1949 polio season is "just around the corner," the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today issued a list of precautionary measures to be observed by those in charge of children during the epidemic danger period which usually runs from May through October, reaching its peak during the hot, mid-summer months. The five easy-to-follow health rules for children are:



- 1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-fatigue caused by too active play or exercise, or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only beaches or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food...

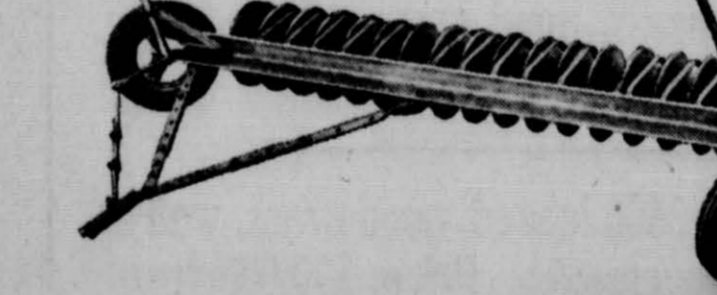

SPORTS AFIELD By Ted Kesting

Bats are probably the most unearthly looking creatures in the modern world. The "Flying Mice" have always been thought of as symbols of mystery presagers of dire events. In reality, the bat is one of our friendliest neighbors. He is harmless (excepting the tropical vampire bat) and in the temperate zone mostly very beneficial to man. The phelistic-looking bat is a mammal—not a bird—and it is the only mammal that can maintain sustained flight. The "wings" are thick membranes connecting front and back legs, somewhat on the order of the flying squirrel. However, the flying squirrel glides, while the bat actually flies. As a wizard of night flight, the bat is tops according to Writer Joe Austell Small. Guided by his own system of radar, the little mammal darts, swoops and zooms through the black night with hardly even an accident. Tiny squeaks, too high pitched for the average human ear, emanate from his throat constantly during flight. When these hit an object ahead the sound bounces back and is picked up partly by his highly sensitive ears, but mostly by sensitive nerves in the delicate skin of his bare wings. Automatically these signals are interpreted and the flight instantly by-passes obstacles. Bats do have small eyes, and in general their keenness of sight does not equal that of other mammals, but to be "blind as a bat" is not to be blind at all. Their ears seem to be specially tuned to pick up the buzz of flying insects, on which most bats feed. The bat does not resemble, nor act like any other creature in the animal world. Little is known about its migratory habits. A recent study of bat cave in Comal County, Texas, indicated that females come to the cave every year to give birth to their young. The majority of the males evidently congregate elsewhere. Bats have a litter of one to four, depending on the species. The young are well developed at birth, and in several weeks are able to fend for themselves. The young squeak, like any other mammal.

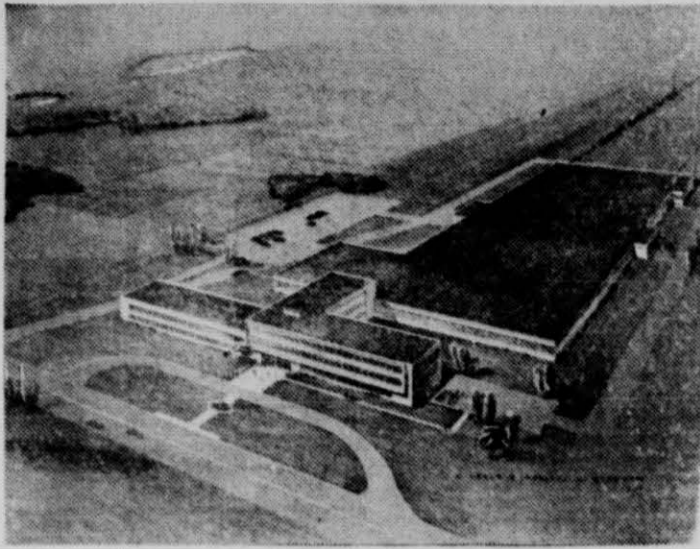

Construction of a 2½ million dollar general office building, laboratory, and parts warehouse, and establishment of a multi-million dollar research program in farm equipment were announced today by Frank R. Pierce, President, Dearborn Motors Corporation, Detroit.

Dearborn Motors is the national marketing organization for Ford Tractors and Dearborn Farm Equipment.

The new buildings will be located on a 45 acre site at 15-Mile Road near Coolidge, east of Birmingham. Construction will get underway shortly.

Architects are Giffels and Vallet, Inc., Detroit; transfer of real estate involved was handled by Max Brock, Inc.

Main unit will be a three-story office building with approximately 85,000 square feet of office

space. Laboratory and warehouse will be in a separate building of 65,000 square feet.

"The decision to go ahead with this major building program reflects the confidence we have not only in the future of Dearborn Motors, but in the future of American Agriculture and business generally," Pierce said.

The laboratory will house the expanded product research, development and testing activities of Dearborn Motors under the direction of Ralph E. Hunt, manager of Dearborn's engineering and manufacturing division.

"The Dearborn engineering and manufacturing staff already has made noteworthy progress in introducing precision manufacturing and high standards of quality control in the production of our farm machinery," Pierce said.

"Likewise considerable work has

been done to widen the applications of existing farm implements, and to develop power applications for farm jobs that are not yet mechanized.

"Tangible results of this work are evident in the wide range of implements now in the Dearborn line. Public acceptance based on performance is excellent.

"The job ahead is two-fold: to expand basic research in new methods of agriculture mechanization, and to expand and improve present methods."

The firm's testing farm, Deer Lake Hills Farm, Clarkston, will continue to play an important part in product field testing operations. Also, Dearborn Motors Testing Corporation will continue to use testing areas in various sections of the country with varying climatic and soil conditions.

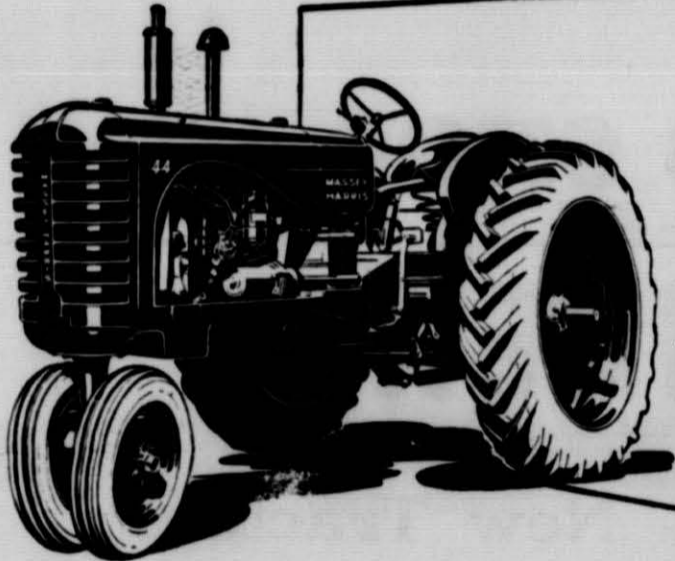
