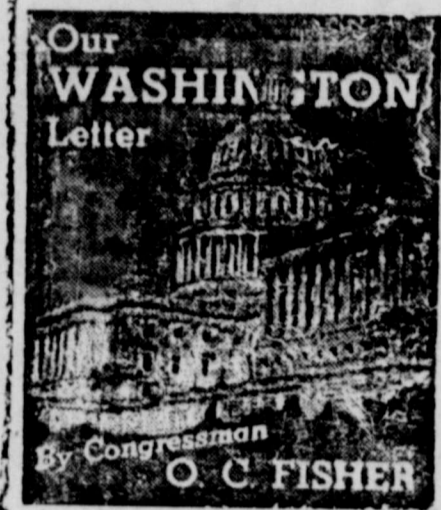

Visit Too Brief—

During the summer recess I visited most of the counties in our district and enjoyed talking with lots of people about problems related to the federal government. I am most grateful for the many courtesies extended to me and regret that shortage of time made it impossible for me to visit in more communities, as I wanted to do. Everyone I talked with seemed united behind the war program and generally satisfied with the progress of the war. There is general demand that Congress, while cooperating with the war program, discharge its full share of responsibility in dealing with domestic problems. Practically everyone wants less red tape and less bureaucracy.

Win the Peace, Too—

The 360-to-29 vote by which the House passed the Fulbright resolution last week can be taken as an indication that the representatives reflect the sentiment encountered when they visited and talked with their constituents. The resolution provides:

"That the Congress hereby expresses itself as favoring the creation of appropriate international machinery with power adequate to establish and to maintain a just and lasting peace among the nations of the world, and as favoring participation by the United States therein thru its constitutional processes."

The resolution now before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, is not specific and does not complete the job by any means. But it does support the demand of the people that "This time we must win the peace as well as the war."

Manpower—And Fathers—

In the Senate, much interest is shown in Senator Wheeler's bill to prohibit, under any conditions, the drafting of pre-Pearl Harbor fathers. Before the committee hearing came General Marshall, Army chief-of-staff; Admiral King, Navy chief, and Bernard M. Baruch. They all opposed the Wheeler bill. They said its passage might hinder the war effort, might prolong the war, and might increase the ultimate cost in lives and suffering.

The House already has passed the Kilday bill, providing that available non-deferrable single men of the nation be exhausted before pre-Pearl Harbor fathers are called.

The Selective Service has promised a searching review of classifications. That may reveal, for example, many thousands on the government payroll, now deferred, who can be re-classified and inducted before Selective Service calls up fathers. Jobs of these rediscovered eligibles might be filled, if need be, by older men. Actually, it may be

Roy Clift, Former Coke Citizen, Dies at Corpus Christi

Sorrow was cast over many hearts in Coke county Monday when the intelligence came by telegram that Roy Clift, formerly of Coke county, but for many years a resident of Corpus Christi, had died in that city Monday morning, at 10 o'clock.

Bruce Clift, a brother, at Robert Lee, received a telegram early Monday that his brother was at the point of death. Mr. and Mrs. Clift, Mrs. Jake Morrow, a sister of Bronte, and Mrs. Inez Cobb, a sister, of Eldorado, who was visiting Mrs. Morrow, at the time, departed from Bronte for Corpus, about the time their brother died, to be with him. Hence they did not know of the death until they reached Corpus that night.

Deceased came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Clift, both deceased, from Chattanooga, Tennessee, in 1900, when he was only four years old. The family settled on what is now the Nicholas farm, near Fort Chadbourne, and improved it. Selling this farm, Mr. Clift bought the tract and improved, where Mr. and Mrs. Jake Morrow live. It is one of the oldest country residences in all this part of the country.

Growing to manhood in and around Bronte, deceased married Miss Brazoria Simpson of Wilmett. To them one child was born, a daughter, Miss Zoe, who was married only about a month ago, who with her mother sorrows over his passing. Three brothers and three sisters also survive. Coke County Coop Association Receives Charter

Travis B. Hicks, Coke County Agent, was in Bronte Thursday afternoon, from Robert Lee, and brought the information that the Coke County Cooperative Association has been granted a charter by the State of Texas, under the laws governing the organization of cooperative Associations. Frank McCabe is president of the organization. Travis B. Hicks is serving as secretary temporarily until a secretary is elected permanently.

The Coke Cooperative has for its chief purpose the buying of ranch and farm feeds and supplies. Its benefits however are available to everyone in Coke county who chooses to avail himself of its services, whether he is a member or not.

No selling of livestock of any kind by the organization will be allowed.

Common corporate stock sells for \$1 per share and this gives the member voting privileges in the organization. Three per cent of all purchases of feed and supplies will be set aside for a stock fund. Preferred stock will be issued in lieu of this 3 per cent as it accumulates.

The organization, Mr. Hicks stated, will be worth to the people just what they make it. The affairs of the Coop will be conducted on strict business principles, namely, pay as you go.

Already the farmers and ranchers of Coke county have bought 18 cars of feed wheat and the 11th car is now being unloaded this week. A purchase of 200 tons of corn has been made and this will arrive within the next 20 days. Seed oats are now being bought for those who want seed oats.

SCARLET FEVER IS DANGEROUS, AND ON THE INCREASE IN TEXAS

Austin, Texas, September 30—Scarlet fever, now considerably above the normal incidence in Texas, is one of the more disabling and dangerous diseases usually associated with childhood, although actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Scarlet fever is an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. First symptoms include sore throat, vomiting, fever, and headache. These are followed by the red rash which gives this disease its name," Dr. Cox stated.

"Scarlet fever is an acute and infectious disease. Three to five days after exposure to the disease the first symptoms appear and a day or two later the rash appears. Complications may cause prolonged disability and death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may have sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may become involved, causing life-long invalidism.

"A child with any kind of sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly. If scarlet fever is present, the treatment recommended will do much to alleviate discomfort and reduce the possibility of complications," Dr. Cox asserted.

EQUALS 144 WORLD TRIPS FOR EVERY PERSON IN COKE COUNTY

Taking all of Coke County's 4,500 people around the world in sleeping cars more than 144 times would be a tremendous undertaking, yet that is actually about the size of the troop movement job reported today by The Pullman Company.

Since Pearl Harbor, Pullman has carried 14,000,000 troops a distance of more than 15 billion passenger miles in its sleeping cars, the company reports. These figures are said to cover mass military movements alone, and do not include the heavy travel of furloughed men and others.

Many of the boys from Coke County, like servicemen from all parts of the country, are getting their first Pullman rides, according to George A. Kelly, vice president of the company. Now most of them are making six or seven trips by Pullman, as the intense training program of the armed services necessitates that many moves or more prior to embarkation for points abroad, he said. In addition, the Army and Navy believe in all the comfort possible for the members of the armed forces, he declared, and about two thirds of all military movements by rail are by Pullman sleeper.

Pullman is now carrying more than 800,000 troops every month in mass movements, it is revealed by Mr. Kelly, who pointed out that in addition to this heavy and steadily increasing military passenger burden, civilian travel itself is also at a record-breaking level. He believes that Pullman's passenger-mile volume for 1943 may exceed the 1942 all-time high of 19 billion by 30



Industrially, We've Got It—

The President's war report to Congress didn't give the Axis anything to cheer about.

From May, 1940, to September 1 this year, the nation had delivered 123,340 airplanes, 349,000 airplane engines, 53,000 tanks, and other equipment in parallel quantity. Heavy production developed only this year—52,000 planes the first eight months, for example.

Last week-end, WPB's Donald Nelson offered some aviation figures further proving our industrial progress—a new record of 7,612 combat planes produced in August, and of an average weight of 7,800 pounds as against 3,800-pound plane average in August, 1941. No wonder Tojo last week announced plans for partial evacuation of Tokio, "so as to improve its defenses."

Similarly, Secretary Knox's report on the building up of the Navy to size and power unequalled by any other war fleet in history, should prove to the Japs that they cannot win. Hitler already knows that he can't.

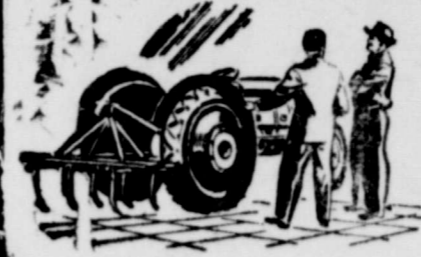

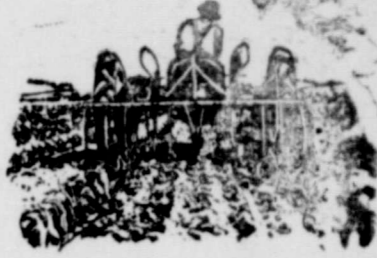

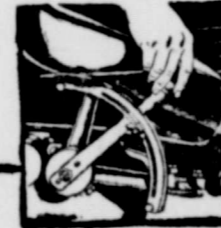

America needs millions of women to take over war jobs... to stay with those jobs... to help speed the day when our fighting men will return victorious!

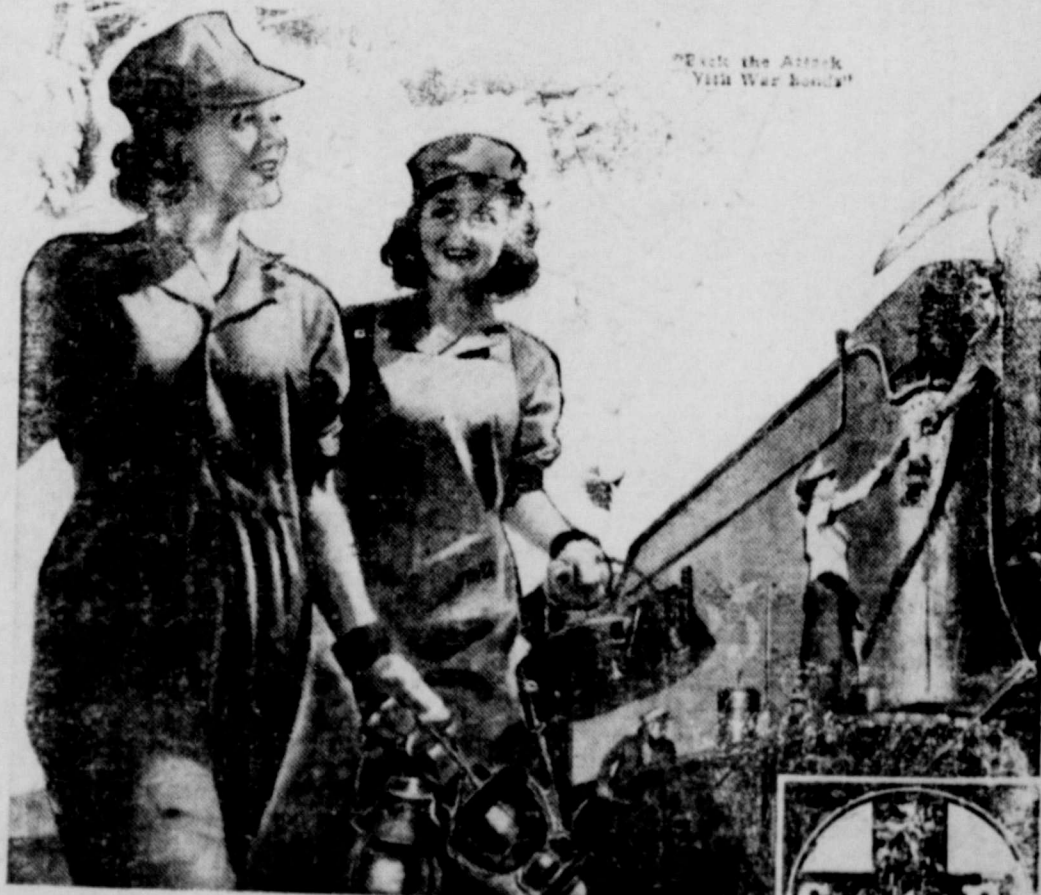
Santa Fe women are answering this call all along the line.
