## Blackwell Methodists Launch Annual Revival, July 8; Pastor Leads in Meeting

Wherever there is an "old-fashioned" Methodist church, there is always an "old-fashioned" summer revival. In these days of war and modernism, there is such a Methodist church at Blackwell. It is a church that holds to the old ideals, both as to church activ-

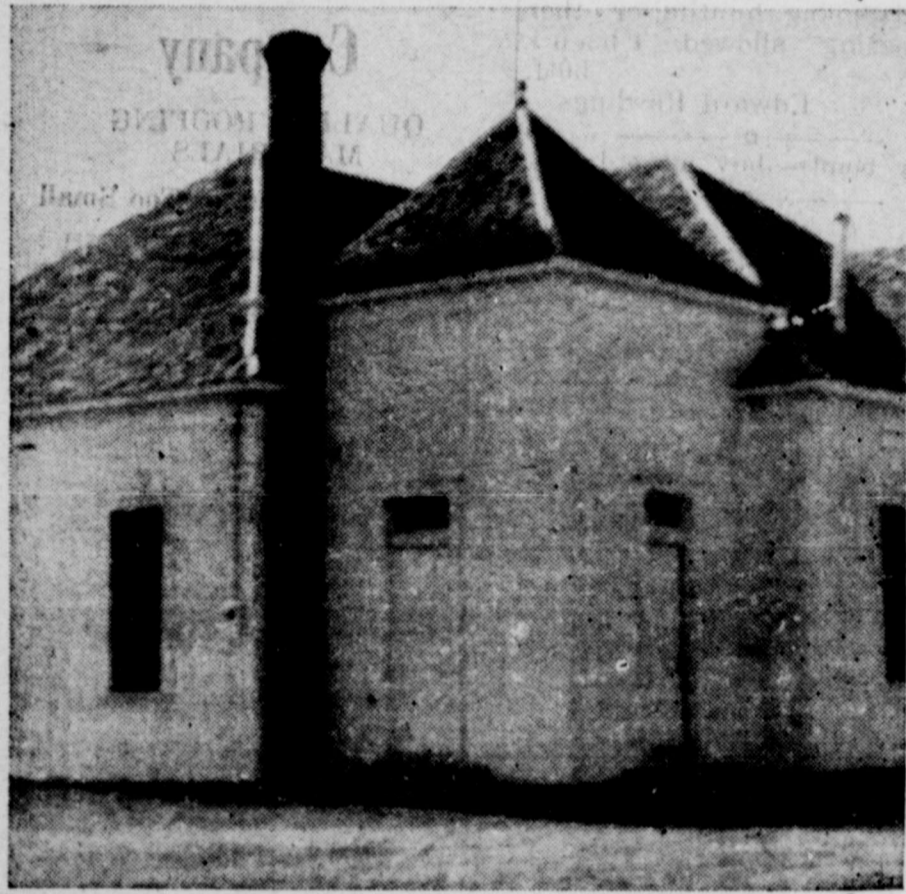
erected in 1911. Four charter members of the organization survive. They are Mrs. Will Whiteside, Mrs. J. F. Pinkard and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Raney. In 1914 the Methodist Episcopal Church bought the building and the society became a Methodist Episcopal church. Rev. Cal C. Wright, now district superintendent of the Abilene district of the Methodist church, was one of the first pastors coming to the Blackwell charge of the new church.

At present the membership of the congregation is 185, with an active resident membership of 120. In 1939 a substantial and beautiful native Stone Annex was built in order that the class session of the church school might be more effectively carried on.

The church has been fortunate in having capable and consecrated ministers as pastors and the work of the church has always gone on smoothly and progressively.

But with the coming of Rev. and Mrs. Gaede, interest in the church and its work revived and the membership is now looking forward with the pastor and wife, to the prospective Annual Revival. It has been said by ministers that when the pastor of a church leads in the revival meeting of the church, it is evidence of a healthy and happy state of the church.

### MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

**IMPORTANCE OF CLEAN MILK IS STRESSED BY STATE HEALTH OFFICER**

Austin, Texas, June 29—In giving support to the celebration of June as dairy month, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today that in the midst of war food problems, including shortages of manpower, equipment, and feed for some dairy herds, the State of Texas joins the nation in a special salute to the dairy industries for carrying on in the face of difficulty and actual hardships to produce one of our essential foods.

"Milk has been called the most nearly perfect food because it contains in easily digested form many elements required for body nourishment," Dr. Cox said. "The milk proteins promote body development and growth and generate energy. The minerals, especially calcium, assist in the growth and maintenance of bones and teeth. The vitamins, which are essential to growth and health, give protection against the attack of many infections."

The state health officer specifically warned that if milk is not clean and properly handled, it is an excellent medium for growing germs. Cleanliness in the milking process and in the milk container is very essential. All milk handlers should be healthy, and all equipment should be properly washed and sterilized and protected from flies and dirt.

The State Health Department has long urged that the consuming public insist upon either pasteurized milk or raw milk produced under approved conditions.

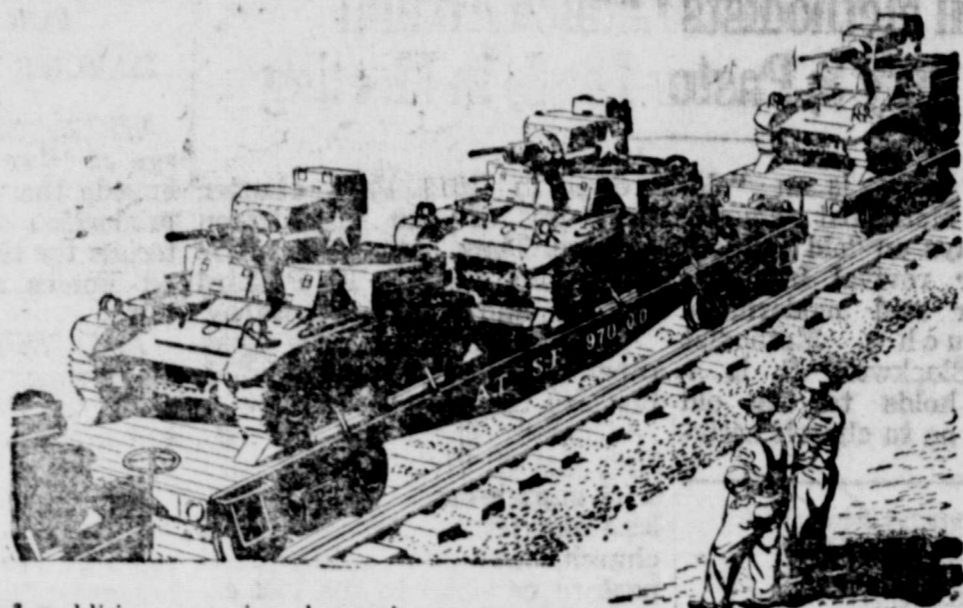

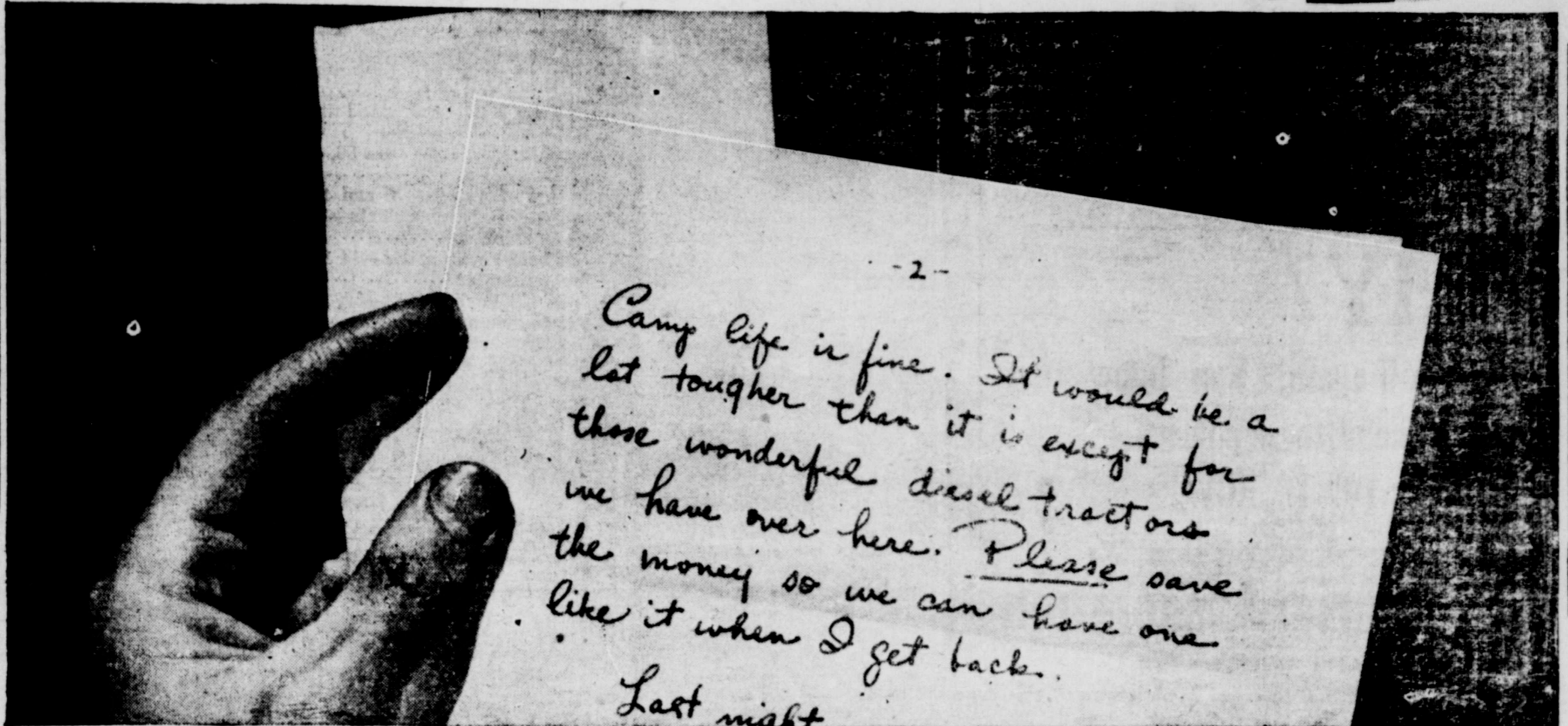

### AGRICULTURAL WORKERS

Employers in Coke County will be permitted to hire male workers without referral by the United States Employment Service under authority of the Area Director of the War Manpower Commission and the Abilene Area Management-Labor Committee. This constitutes a special arrangement under the Priority Referral Program of the War Manpower Commission, which goes into effect at midnight, June 30, L. L. Tuttle said, and is subject to change if operating experience and national manpower needs dictate.

No local office of the United States Employment Service is located in Coke County, he said, and undue hardship would be imposed upon workers if they were required to make a trip to San Angelo to secure a job.

It was emphatically pointed out, however, that while these arrangements permitted a worker to seek employment within the county without having to be channelled through the Employment Service, that the Employment Stabilization regulations were still in effect and that any worker now employed or employed during the preceding 60 day period in an essential industry could not be hired except upon the presentation of a Statement of Availability. Tuttle also said that while workers would not be required to go through the USES when seeking a job inside the county that they should understand that no such arrangement exists in counties in which an office of the USES is located and that in these counties no employer should hire a male worker except upon referral of the USES.
