COUNTY KITCHENS BECOME TIN MINES FOR WAR ITEMS

Women of Coke county can "mine" tin sufficient for 148 1 1-2-ton Army trucks this

These figures were compiled by J. A. Stewart, vice-president of the American Can Company, on the basis of canned foods consumed by civilians in the county during 1943. On the basis of last year's consumption civilians will open approximately 371.751 cans of food. This year, he said. According to a table recently issued by Washington, 2.500 cans provide tin sufficient for one 1 1-2-ton Army truck.

Meanwhile, the armed forces consumed approximately three and needs for the current year are expected to rise to three and a quarter billion cans, Mr. Stewart said.. He pointed out that with a greatly increased number of the armed forces in overseas duty, more canned foods will be needed because the can has proved the most practical container for the shipment of foods abread.




