closed that more than a million tons of supplies went over those beaches during the first hundred days after invasion began, and in addition hundreds of thousands of troops landed there. For 21 days ofter D-day, Colonel Kuhre did not remove his clothes one time, and thousands of his men worked day and night to supply a great invasion army without even having a harbor from which to unload.

I heard an officer say that he saw an American Red Cross nurse on the beaches on the day following D-day. Those nurses have done a magnificen job, working with the medical

A few miles inland and down the beach toward Cherbourg we passed a new cemetery with acres and acres of white crosses. We stopped there and walked through the cemetery road-

"The first to fall are buried nearer the beach". Colonel Talley, Commander of the Normandy area, told us.

Out a little ways from the middle path, and alongside the graves of privates and corporals and others, I saw this simple inscription on one of the 4350 crosses:

"Leslie J. McNair 0-1891"


