WINTER ILLNESSES DANGEROUS TO CHILDREN

Austin, Texas, October 19.—Young children may suffer as much from winter illnesses as they do from those commonly known as "summer complaints," in the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and his advice to parents is to guard babies and young children against these winter health hazards.

Influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, and asthma are included among those diseases which may be dangerous winter

illnesses among young children since they affect the respiratory or breathing system. Such diseases as pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold, they may follow as an after-effect of measles or whooping cough, or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. These diseases of the respiratory system are more prevalent in winter than summer and are much more difficult to combat than digestive ailments such as summer complaint.

closed that more than a million tons of supplies went over those beaches during the first hundred days after invasion began, and in addition hundreds of thousands of troops landed there. For 21 days after D-day, Colonel Kuhre did not remove his clothes one time, and thousands of his men worked day and night to supply a great invasion army without even having a harbor from which to unload.

I heard an officer say that he saw an American Red Cross nurse on the beaches on the day following D-day. Those nurses have done a magnificent job, working with the medical staff.

* * *

A few miles inland and down the beach toward Cherbourg we passed a new cemetery with acres and acres of white crosses. We stopped there and walked through the cemetery road-way.

"The first to fall are buried nearer the beach", Colonel Talley, Commander of the Normandy area, told us.

Out a little ways from the middle path, and alongside the graves of privates and corporals and others, I saw this simple inscription on one of the 4350 crosses:

"Leslie J. McNair 0-1891"
