Lt. Richard I. Collier of Abilene, son of Mrs. Cova Collier, also of Abilene, is reported missing in Africa since October 16, according to the report received by his wife, the former Miss Charlotte Collins of that city.

Mrs. Collier received the information Saturday night. The grandmother of Lt. Collier, Mrs. R. M. Cumbie, and other

relatives here, were at once advised. Sunday morning, Irvir Cumbie carried his mother and his sister, Mrs. Mae Wilkins, to Abilene and they spent the day with the wife and mother of Lt. Collier. And Monday Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Cumbie spent the day in Abilene.

October 24 a baby son, who was named Richard Robert, was born to Lt. and Mrs. Collier at the Hendrix Memorial hospital in that city.

Lt. and Mrs. Collier, daughter of Capt. and Mrs. R. A. Collins of Abilene, were married in June 1941. He was graduated at Hardin-Simmons University in 1941 and before enlisting in the service he taught and directed high school bands at Anson, Cisco and Corpus Christi. Before entering the service he taught as a civil service instructor in aeronautics at Lincoln, Nebraska.

"Dick," as everyone in and around Bronte called him in his boyhood days, was inducted into service, and sent to Jefferson Barracks, Missouri. He re-

## Free Moisture Test of Maize, Offered Farmers

One of the most generous offers The Enterprise has read in some time is that of the C. L. Green Milling and Grain Company in this issue of The Enterprise, offering to give free test for moisture in maize.

The offer is altogether voluntary on the part of Mr. Green, owner and manager of the company—and he does it purely that he may aid the farmers of this section who desire the aid he offers.

As The Enterprise understands it. FSA loans on maize means a profit of 29 cents a bushel to the farmer over present market prices. The farmer must do as Mr. Green suggests in ad and then get the Farm Loan Agency to send the maize to the C. L. Green Milling & Grain Company, at Winters. The Mill Company has a moisture testing machine that is quite a unique machine which registers exactly the amount of moisture in the grain. When the maize has been tested, the report will be sent to the AAA Agency, then the loan is closed, based on the showing of the test as to the amount of moisture.

DETAILS OF COTTON PURCHASE PROGRAM AVAILABLE SOON

Full parity price to farmers for their 1944 crop of upland cotton is assured under the new Commodity Credit Corporation Purchase program regardless of whether or not it is under a government loan, C. N. Webb, Chairman of the Coke County AAA Committee, said today.

The CCC will purchase all upland cotton for which a loan rate schedule has been announced, offered to it up to June 30, 1945. The cotton will be priced: (1944 crop middling 15-16 inch, basis gross weight flat cotton at Memphis, Tenn.) October, 21.90 cents per pound; November, 21.95; December, 22.00; January, 22.05; February, 22.10; March, 22.15; April, 22.20; May, 22.25; and June, 22.25.

The five-point increase per month has been added to the price as allowance to the farmer for storage and carrying charges.

Other highlights of the purchase program are:

1. Premiums and discounts are the same as those of 1944 loan program, based on Middling 15-16 purchase rates, gross weight.
2. Location differentials for warehouse points will be based on freight rates to the Group B mill area of the Carolinas except in eastern Mississippi, eastern Tennessee, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Alabama where a zone system will be in effect as under the loan program.
3. Purchasing agents, mostly local warehousemen,

will be approved by CCC.

4. Purchase agents will buy at CCC prices if warehouse receipts and sales agreement are turned over to them within 10 days after issuance. Agent's fee of 50 cents per bale will be paid by CCC.
5. Purchase will be made only from farmers who produced cotton in 1944. Cotton must be stored in CCC-approved warehouses.
6. Farmers with cotton in loan may sell it to CCC by repaying their loan.

The CCC is making these purchases to carry out provisions of legislation enacted by Congress directing the president to make "all lawful action" to assure producers parity prices for their cotton.

**S-SGT. ARCHIE PITTMAN,  
CREW CHIEF ON  
BOMBER'S 100TH MISSION**

An Eighth Air Force Liberator Station, England:

S—Sgt. Archie C. Pittman of Bronte, Texas, is a crew chief in the B-24 Liberator group commanded by Col. Albert J. Shower of Madison, Wis., which recently completed 100 bombing missions against enemy targets in the exceptionally brief time of 140 days.

During this time, Col. Shower and his group "showered" over 10,000,000 pounds of high explosives onto enemy occupied in Germany and the occupied countries.

This group is a part of a combat wing which was cited by Lt. General Doolittle, Commanding General of the Eight Air Force, for extraordinary heroism and outstanding performance of duty in smashing a bridge of vital importance to the enemy by descending to the extremely low and dangerous altitude of 6,500 feet. Col. Shower led the wing on this occasion.

The group also has the distinction of having the first allied heavy bomber to land in France, when on June 14, Lt. Charles W. Grace of Kalamazoo, Mich. and his co-pilot Lt. Arthur L. Prichard of Onaway, Mich. set their big Liberator down safely on a new fighter landing strip, after the other eight members of the crew had bailed out.

The outstanding bomber in the group is a Liberator nick-
