Co-op Adds Free Delivery to East Part of County

Another step taken by the Coke County Co-op in its service to its patrons is that twice weekly free delivery service to the people in the East part of the county.

The plan as given to The Enterprise by County agent T. B. Hicks is to have a truck deliver meats twice a week, on regular days to Bronte. "This," said agent Hicks, "will put the benefits of the Frozen Locker Plant within reach of the families in the East part the same as those who live nearer the plant. We want to give service." said Mr. Hicks. "With this arrangement, the families in the eastern part of the county can have their meats delivered to them in Bronte on the two regular days each week, and hence makes the conveniences of the Locker Plant within easy access to all.

"Meats and vegetables raised at home and put in frozen food lockers helps to relieve the demand on markets that do not have enough of these products to go around."

Mr. Hicks could add that these products are going to be so scarce next spring, according to the present outlook they will not be available. Everybody Invited to Use Facilities of Canning Center

There seems to be a little confusion with reference to the Community Canning Center at the school house, and the facilities afforded for canning.

Anybody and everybody is not only entitled to use the canning facilities, but are urged to do so, and thus save all the fruit and vegetables possible, for at present, it seems, all such food is going to be seriously needed before another canning season, as a terrible food shortage is now in prospect.

The pea shelling machine is remarkable, for it shells both peas and beans rapidly and thoroughly, if matured. This will save you the work of shelling your peas and beans.

The canning Center is open Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and the hours are from 9 in the morning to 6 in the afternoon. And remember, it is all free—you are not to leave any of your produce as payment, for it is all FREE.

Mrs. I. M. Cumbie received the letter below from her son, Jr., while she was in North Carolina. He tells about his visit to Noel Percifull, which makes interesting reading:

Dear Mother, Jane and Ed: Hello everybody. As I write this, let me assure you that it takes just about the last bit of energy that I have.

The reason, I went ashore day before yesterday to look up Noel. They turned out to be a mansize job. I finally found him, but what a time I had. He was plenty far back in those hills. They had just pulled his company off the front line that day. He was sure surprised to see me. Noel looks very good. No different from the kid we knew at home, except maybe the strain of 90 days on the fighting lines.

We sat around in his tent talking to his buddies. I ask him to come on board our ship. We talked to his C. O. and he granted him a three day pass. Getting back to the ship was another job. We finally made it back to the beach, and a ride out to the ship. I was in for another surprise. There was no ship to be found. We spent the night on another ship, we had to sleep on deck. I am plenty sore as a result. I guess it made very little difference to Noel. He had been sleeping in fox holes since April 1st. The Captain of the ship was very kind. The next morning he served us a fine breakfast. Noel certainly enjoyed the hot cereal and fresh eggs. After spending half a day I found my ship had sailed to a group of nearby Islands. Bad as I hated to say goodbye to Noel, it had to be. He returned to his company, and I started out trying to find the way back to my ship. I finally made it. Believe me I was tired and dirty. I had only had two hours sleep and one meal in two days. When you are not use to this, it tells on you.

BRONTE BOY ASSIGNED TO OCCUPATIONAL AIR FORCE IN EUROPE

15th AAF IN ITALY—2nd Lt. Cecil P. Ash, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Ash, of Star Route, Bronte, Texas, has been assigned to the occupational air force in Europe as a member of the 97th Bombardment Group, a veteran B-17 Flying Fortress unit of the 15 Tir Force. Lt. Ash has served 3 months overseas as a Pilot on a B-17.

His group, the 97th Bombardment Group left the States on June 4, 1942, and sailed for England where it flew the first daylight Flying Fortress mission against Europe on August 17th of the same year. Moving to North Africa in support of the invasion it followed the Army through to the end of the Tunisian campaign. While in Africa the 97th was the first heavy bomb group to bomb France, Sardinia and Germany. It also took part in the first bombing of the Italian Capital, Rome. With the invasion of Italy the group supported the Army beach-head at Salerno and shortly after moved its base to Foggia. From this Base the group participated in 271 strategic missions striking industry, oil and communications. Another highlight of the Group's history was when they were first to land an airplane in Russia on the initial Russian shuttle mission.

The 97th Bombardment Group has chalked up a total of 483 missions in the three years it has been overseas; a record surpassing any other heavy outfit in the air forces. The group has been presented two Distinguished Unit Citations and original members of the organization are authorized to wear 12 battle participation Stars on their European-African-Middle East Campaign ribbon.

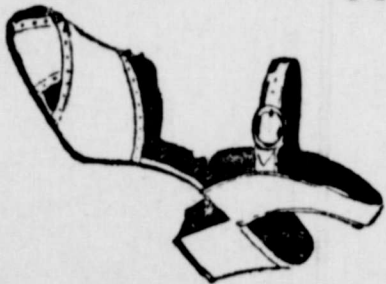

**OFFICE OF DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION
GENERAL ORDER 52**

Effective 12:01 am, June 30, 1945

"No carrier shall reserve, assign or allocate seating or sleeping space on a passenger train more than 120 hours in advance of scheduled departure time of such train. No carrier shall issue a ticket for a reserved seat or sleeping space on a passenger train more than 120 hours in advance of scheduled departure of such train, except in the case of tickets for reservations made prior to the effective date of this Order which have not been picked up."

**OFFICE OF DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION
GENERAL ORDER 53**

"On and after 12 o'clock noon, July 15, 1945, no common carrier by railroad or sleeping car company shall operate or transport any railway car containing sleeping space or sleeping accommodations to a point of distance 450 miles or less from the point of origin of such car, such distance being measured by the shortest distance by railroad over which sleeping cars are operated between such points. . . Each common carrier by railroad shall forthwith cancel all reservations for space after 12 o'clock noon on July 15, 1945."

What about Travel now....

under the new Government rulings?

The Government has curtailed civilian travel by ordering the railroads not to make reservations on passenger trains more than five days in advance of departure and by banning sleeping car service on trips of 450 miles or less.

A lot of people are assuming that, with the European war over, the travel situation on trains should have eased up by now.

But they are finding out that it's harder than ever to get space. They're asking themselves, "Why?"

The reason is simply that the railroads are being called upon to repeat a job of moving over 3,000,000 soldiers. But this time it is to be done in 6 to 9 months whereas originally it took more than 2 years to move these men.

The railroads are still operating with the same number of passenger cars that they had when the war started. Building new passenger cars has not been permitted since Pearl Harbor.

Many Pullman cars have been converted into

hospital cars, and, of course, more Pullmans and coaches than ever are being withdrawn from civilian service to use in the movement of men to the Pacific.

The great bulk of traffic for the Pacific funnels into 4 railroads to ports of embarkation in California. Santa Fe, with its improved facilities, is carrying a large part of this traffic.

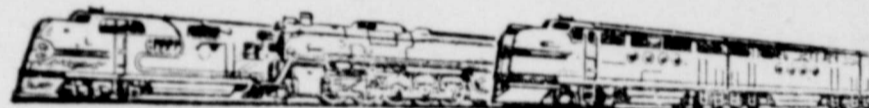
This all adds up to the fact that only a very limited amount of space is left over for civilian travel.

Of course we like to accommodate our friends and make new acquaintances. But you, too, agree that the troops and materials needed to whip Japan *must* come first.

New cars are now on order. Santa Fe has enough new chair cars on order to seat 3186 people. 16 new lunch counter-diners are also on order. A substantial number of new sleeping cars will be placed in service on the Santa Fe as soon as War Production Board orders permit.
