

A spray of lead arsenate, composed the compound to one gallon of water, should be used, Yocum says.

Red spiders, a microscopic mite, is pest showing up in this area of

West Texas. The mite attacks many Lathams, species of plants, including evergreens

and perennial flowering plants.

A stream of water will wash the mite off evergreens. Dusting sulphur will control the organism. The sulphur should be applied when the plant is wet with dew or after sprinkling. A spray of glue is also an effective control measure.

BOYCE HOUSE TALKS TO BRONTE STUDENTS

Because he formerly edited a newspaper in Brady, lived for 10 years in Eastland County and his wife used to live in Coleman County, Boyce House told students of the Bronte High School and upper elementary grades that he felt at home in this part of the State.

The Fort Worth author and newspaper-radio columnist spoke here last Friday morning. House, who wrote the best-sellers, "I Give You Texas" and "Tall Talk From Texas," gave many Texas stories. Perhaps the bestreceived was a yarn he told on his friend, Blondy Cross, San Angelo sports editor.

"When Blondy came out to West Texas," House related, solemnly, "he got a job on a ranch and was told to round up the sheep. He came back several hours later and said he'd had no trouble about the sheep but the lambs had delayed him. The ranchman was puzzled as he knew there were no lambs and so he investigated and found that Blondy had rounded up 17 jack-rabbits.'

House told of his observations while in Hollywood helping on the big Texas motion picture, "Boom Town. The biggest thrill of going to Hollywood, he said, is to get back to Texas where the sunshine is brighter, skies are bluer and the folks are genuine.

NEW SOLDIER MEDAL

A new medal to be awarded soldiers who have served with the Army of Occupation has been authorized by the War Department, according to an official announcement today through the U. S. Army Recruiting Service.

Army men eligible for the award are those who served with occupation forces in Germany, Austria or portions of Italy subsequent to May 8, 1945, and in Japan or Korea after September

2, 1945. Thirty consecutive days of service is required for eligibility to wear the medal or corresponding service ribbon. Credit will be given for service in Italy only for the Section of Venezia Giulia É Zara and the province of Udine, compartment of Veneto.

Pacific veterans eligible are those who served on Hokkaido, Honshu, Shikoku, Kyushu and the surrounding small islands of the Japanese homeland, as well as the Ryukyu Islands and the Bonin Islands.

The design of the medal, which will be made of bronze, has not been selected, officials explained. The ribbon from which it will be suspended will be striped in white, black and red. Issue by the Art Department of the service ribbon for the new medal to authorized persons will be announced at a later date.

Texas-New Mexico airlines have been granted approval to operate airplane service throughout West Texas Eastern New Mexico, parts of Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas. The service will get underway as quickly as possible, officials have announced.
